BYLAWS

Bylaws of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church General Assembly Corporation A Non-profit Religious Corporation Organized and Existing Under the Laws of the State of Tennessee

ARTICLE 1-RELIGIOUS CORPORATION

1.01 Purpose. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church is a spiritual body comprised of a portion of the universal body of believers confessing Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. As an ecclesiastical body, the Cumberland Presbyterian Church is a connectional Church which includes all of the judicatories of the Church. The highest judicatory of this ecclesiastical body is the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (referred to in these Bylaws as "the Church"). This corporation has been formed to serve and support the Church by holding real and personal property of the Church, employing staff to serve the Church, and performing other secular and legal functions.

1.02 Ecclesiastical Authority Not Limited by Corporate Powers. The enumeration in state statutes or these Bylaws of specific powers which may be exercised by the Commissioners, Board of Directors, or the officers of the corporation when acting in their corporate capacity shall not limit their authority when acting in their ecclesiastical capacity for the Church.

1.03 Church Authorities. The doctrine of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, expressed in the Confession of Faith, Constitution, Rules of Discipline, and Rules of Order of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, shall have precedence over any inconsistent provision of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE 2-TERMINOLOGY

2.01 Delegates. The corporation's delegates shall be called "Commissioners."

2.02 General Assembly. A meeting of the Commissioners shall be called a "General Assembly."

2.03 President. The corporation's president shall be called the "Stated Clerk."

2.04 Ecumenical Representative. A person who is not a member of a Cumberland Presbyterian Chuch or presbytery but who supports the mission of a denominational entity and is elected to a term of service on that entity shall be called an "Ecumenical Representative."

ARTICLE 3-OFFICES

3.01 Location. The principal office of the corporation in the State of Tennessee shall be located in Shelby County, Tennessee. The corporation may have such other offices, either within or outside the State of Tennessee, as the General Assembly or the Board of Directors may direct from time to time.

ARTICLE 4–COMMISSIONERS

4.01 Commissioners. The Commissioners shall have the powers and authority described in the corporation's charter and these Bylaws. Included among them are the power to:

- a. Elect the elected members of the Board of Directors.
- b. Approve any amendment to the corporation's charter except an amendment to delete the names of the original directors; to change the name of the registered agent, or to change the address of the registered office;
- c. Elect and remove the Moderator, Stated Clerk, and the Engrossing Clerk.
- d. Fill vacancies on the corporation's various boards, agencies and committees, and on the boards of any subsidiaries;
- e. Approve the merger or dissolution of the corporation, or the sale of substantially all of the corporation's assets; and
- f. Transact such other business of the corporation as may properly come before any meeting of the Commissioners.

4.02 Selection of Commissioners: Number and Qualifications. Commissioners shall be selected by the presbyteries. A presbytery shall be entitled to send one minister and one elder for each 1,000, or fraction thereof, active members (including ordained clergy) in the presbytery. Each elder selected as a Commissioner must be serving as a member of a session at the time of the General Assembly at which he or she will serve. A Commissioner shall continue to serve until no longer qualified or until his or her successor is selected and qualified. The clerk of each presbytery shall certify the presbytery's duly elected commissioners, youth advisory delegates, and alternates to the Stated Clerk in a manner provided by the Stated Clerk.

4.03 Youth Advisory Delegates. Each presbytery may select not more than two youth advisory delegates who should be from 15 through 19 years of age. Advisory delegates may serve as members with full rights on General Assembly committees, but shall not vote as Commissioners.

4.04 Annual Meeting and Notice. The Commissioners shall meet annually at a date and time established by the General Assembly. The meeting shall be continued from day to day until adjournment. Written notice of the meeting shall be mailed to the stated clerks of all presbyteries and published in the Cumberland Presbyterian at least sixty (60) days prior to the proposed meeting.

4.05 Special Meetings and Notice. The Moderator, or in case of the Moderator's absence, death, or inability to act, the Stated Clerk, may with the written concurrence or at the written request of twenty Commissioners, ten of whom shall be ministers and ten elders, representing at least five presbyteries, call a special meeting of the Commissioners. If warranted by a change of circumstances, a called special meeting may be cancelled by the Moderator, or in case of the Moderator's absence, death, or inability to act, the Stated Clerk, with the written concurrence of at least ten of the Commissioners who requested or concurred in the call of the special meeting. Written notice of any special meeting shall be mailed to the stated clerks of all presbyteries, to all Commissioners, and to their alternates at least sixty (60) days prior to the meeting. The notice shall specify the particular business of the special meeting, and no other business shall be transacted.

4.06 Place of Meeting. The General Assembly may designate any place within or outside the state of Tennessee as the place for an annual meeting. If the Commissioners fail to designate a place for an annual meeting, or if an emergency requires the place to be changed, the Board of Directors may designate a place for the annual meeting. The Moderator or the Stated Clerk, as the case may be, when calling a special meeting shall designate the time and place of the meeting in the notice of the meeting.

4.07 Quorum. Any twenty or more Commissioners, of whom at least ten are ministers and ten elders, entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum at any General Assembly. When a quorum is once present to organize a meeting, business may continue to be conducted and votes taken despite the subsequent withdrawal of any Commissioner. A meeting may be adjourned despite the absence of a quorum.

4.08 Voting. Every Commissioner shall be entitled to one vote, which must be cast by the Commissioner in person; no proxies are permitted. All corporate actions shall be taken by majority vote except as otherwise provided by the corporation's parliamentary authority. Voting for members of the Board of Directors shall be non-cumulative.

ARTICLE 5-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

5.01 Authority. The Board of Directors shall manage the business and affairs of the corporation except for any power or authority which is reserved to the Commissioners or delegated to any other agency of the corporation. The Board of Directors is authorized to amend the corporation's charter only to delete the names of the original directors; to change the name of the registered agent; or to change the address of the registered office.

5.02 Composition of the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall consist of seven (7) members, who shall be the directors of the corporation. Six (6) members shall be elected by the Commissioners and the Stated Clerk shall serve by virtue of office. All members, whether elected or ex officio, shall have all of the privileges of office.

5.03 Qualification for Election. Each person elected to the Board of Directors shall be a natural person who is a person in good standing of a presbytery or local Cumberland Presbyterian Church. No two directors shall be from the same presbytery, provided, however, that a director who moves from one presbytery to another may continue to serve until the expiration of his or her term of office.

5.04 Election and Tenure. The elected members of the Board of Directors shall serve terms of three (3) years each. The terms shall be staggered so that two (2) directors shall be elected each year. Each person elected shall serve until his or her successor has been elected and qualified.

5.05 Action of Board in Emergency or By Default. If, for any reason, the General Assembly fails to fill a vacancy on the Board of Directors at the next General Assembly, then the Board of Directors may fill the vacancy by majority vote of the members then in office.

5.06 Meetings. The Board of Directors shall meet annually or more often at such time and place as it may set. Special meetings may be called by or at the request of the Stated Clerk or any three directors at any place, either within or outside the state of Tennessee.

5.07 Notice. Notice of any meeting shall be given at least five (5) days before the date of the meeting, except that notice by mail shall be given at least ten (10) days before the date of the meeting. Notice may be communicated in person; by telephone, fax, or electronic mail; or by first class mail or courier. Except as specifically provided by these Bylaws, neither the business to be transacted at nor the purpose of any special or regular meeting of the Board of Directors need be specified in the notice of the meeting.

5.08 Notice of Special Actions. Any meeting of the Board of Directors at which one or more of the following actions shall be considered must be preceded by seven (7) days written notice to each member

that the matter will be voted upon, unless notice has been waived. Actions requiring such notice are: amendment or restatement of the corporate charter; approval of a plan of merger for the corporation; sale of all or substantially all of the corporation's assets; and dissolution of the corporation.

5.09 Officers of the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may have such officers of the board as it may deem appropriate.

5.10 Quorum and Voting. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board of Directors. When a quorum is once present to organize a meeting, it is not broken by the subsequent withdrawal of any of those present. A meeting may be adjourned despite the lack of a quorum. The vote of a majority of the members present at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors unless a greater vote is specifically required by the Charter or the Bylaws.

5.11 Conference Meetings. Any or all the members of the Board of Directors or any committee designated by it may meet by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment which permits all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other simultaneously. A member who participates in a meeting by such means is deemed to be present in person at the meeting.

5.12 Action by Written Consent. Whenever the members of the Board of Directors are required or permitted to take any action by vote, such action may be taken without a meeting on written consent, setting forth the action so taken and signed by all of the members entitled to vote,

5.13 Emergency Actions. If the Board of Directors determines by a vote of three-fourths of all its members that an emergency exists of such magnitude as to threaten the work of the whole Church, or of all boards and other agencies of the Church, and that the emergency requires action before the next meeting of the General Assembly, then the Board of Directors shall exercise the powers of the Commissioners in such emergency.

5.14 Compensation. Members of the Board of Directors shall receive no compensation in their capacity as members of the Board of Directors. Members may be paid their expenses, if any, of attendance at each meeting of the Board of Directors.

5.15 Removal of Directors. An elected member of the Board of Directors may be removed by the Commissioners for misfeasance or if he or she is no longer qualified to be elected to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE 6-WAIVER OF NOTICE

6.01 Written Waiver. Any notice required to be given to any member of the Board of Directors or a Commissioner under these Bylaws, the Charter, or the laws of Tennessee may be waived. The waiver shall be in writing, signed (either before or after the event requiring notice) by the person entitled to the notice, and delivered to the corporation.

6.02 Waiver by Attendance. The attendance of a member of the Board of Directors or a Commissioner at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of the meeting, unless the person attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting was not properly called or convened.

ARTICLE 7-MODERATOR AND VICE-MODERATOR

7.01 Nomination and Election. At the beginning of each annual meeting the General Assembly shall elect a Commissioner to serve as Moderator until the next annual meeting. Nominations for Moderator shall come from the floor. One nominating speech, not to exceed ten minutes, shall be permitted on behalf of each nominee. If there is more than one nominee, the election shall be conducted by written ballot. A committee appointed and supervised by the Stated Clerk shall receive the ballots, count them, and certify the election. If no nominee receives a majority of the votes cast, a run-off election shall be conducted. Only those leading nominees who together received a majority of the votes cast on the preceding ballot shall be included in the run-off election.

7.02 Nature of Office. The Moderator of the General Assembly is the ecclesiastical head of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church during the tenure of the office and a spiritual representative of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church wherever God leads. The Moderator receives a precious gift and great opportunity for service in the Church: the freedom to go anywhere and to listen to the mind, heart and spirit of the denomination and to speak with and to the Church. The office of Moderator has great honor and respect, and the person elected to the Office is a priest, prophet, and pastor of the Church at large. The Moderator prays with and for the work of the Spirit of God in the life of the denomination at every opportunity. The Moderator participates in the life and work of the Church as far as possible, and pays particular attention to ecumenical relations, especially with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America. Judicatories, congregations, and others are urged to invite the Moderator, and the Moderator is encouraged to attend meetings of Church entities and judicatories to observe the life and work of the Church at every level.

PRELIMINARY MINUTES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

- a. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings of the General Assembly.
- b. The Moderator shall appoint, with the consent of the General Assembly, such special committees as are needed;
- c. The Moderator shall serve as chairperson of the General Assembly Program Committee and as a member of the Place of Meeting Committee;
- d. The Moderator shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the General Assembly.
- e. The Moderator shall serve as an advisory member of the Ministry Council during tenure in office.
- f. The Moderator shall observe the places and times God is calling the Church to service, assess the need for a Denominational response to God's call, and report items that concern the General Assembly.
- g. The Moderator shall wear the official cross and stoles of office during the term of office.

7.04 Expenses of Office. Any allowance budgeted by the General Assembly to offset the expenses of the Moderator shall be administered by the Stated Clerk. Persons issuing an invitation to the Moderator are encouraged to agree in advance on arrangements for the payment of travel expenses. Upon the Moderator's retirement from office, a gavel and a replica of the Moderator's cross shall be presented to the Moderator.

7.05 Vice-Moderator. The General Assembly shall elect a Vice-Moderator in like manner. The Vice-Moderator shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the Moderator of the General Assembly and perform the duties of the Moderator in the event of the Moderator's disability or absence from office for any reason.

7.06 Removal. The Moderator or Vice-Moderator may be removed by the General Assembly whenever in its judgment the removal would serve the best interests of the corporation.

ARTICLE 8-STATED CLERK

8.01 President. The Stated Clerk is the principal executive officer of the corporation and shall also have the titles of "president" and "treasurer".

8.02 Nomination and Election. The Nominating Committee may nominate the serving Stated Clerk for re-election. If the Nominating Committee declines to nominate the serving Stated Clerk for re-election, or if the Stated Clerk has vacated the office, resigned, or declined to be re-nominated, then the Corporate Board shall conduct a search for and nominate a candidate to the General Assembly. In either event, further nominations may be made by the Commissioners. The Commissioners shall elect the Stated Clerk by majority vote.

8.03 Term of Office. The Stated Clerk shall be elected to a term of four (4) years. The regular term of office begins on January 1 and ends on December 31. There is no limit on the number of terms which may be served by an individual Stated Clerk.

8.04 Duties. The Stated Clerk shall be concerned with the spiritual life of the Church and with maintaining and strengthening a united witness for the Church. The Stated Clerk shall also generally supervise and control the business affairs of the corporation and see that all orders and resolutions of the General Assembly are carried into effect. In fulfillment of these duties, the Stated Clerk shall:

- 01. Have responsibility to provide for the orderly governance of the Church in accordance with the Constitution, Rules of Order and Rules of Discipline.
- 02. Maintain records of the corporation and respond to requests for official records of General Assembly actions and interpretations of its actions.
- 03. Represent the Church when an official of the General Assembly is needed.
- 04. Represent the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in establishing and maintaining relations with other Churches, particulary those of the Presbyterian and Reformed tradition, and in addressing common concerns.
- 05. Sign all documents on behalf of the corporation or the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.
- 06. Represent the corporation or the Church in litigation or other legal matters affecting the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, including the selection and employment of legal counsel.
- 07. Make suitable arrangements for General Assembly meetings, including researching possible meeting sites, contracting for facilities, and arranging space for committee meetings and sessions of the General Assembly;
- 08. Provide for printing and other communication needs of the General Assembly while in session.
- 09. Call meetings of the Place of Meeting Committee and the Program Committee.

- 10. Prepare and distribute an information form to be completed by Commissioners for the Moderator's use in making committee appointments.
- 11. Advise the Moderator in the appointment of committees.
- 12. In consultation with the Moderator, refer all matters to come before the next General Assembly; and provide copies of all such referrals to the Commissioners and advisory delegates before the General Assembly convenes.
- 13. Prepare and distribute preliminary minutes and an agenda for General Assembly meetings which shall provide time for the consideration of any appropriate business, including memorials from a judicatory or denominational entity delivered to the Stated Clerk in writing by April 30.
- 14. Supervise the recording and publication of minutes and a summary of actions taken by each General Assembly.
- 15. Make copies of General Assembly minutes available to ordained ministers, licentiates, candidates, commissioners, clerks of sessions, members of denominational entities, schools of the Church, synod, and presbytery clerks, to the Stated Clerk's exchanges and other interested persons in order to encourage lower judicatories and persons in the Church to implement the actions of the General Assembly.
- 16. File the minutes of each General Assembly with the Historical Foundation as a permanent record.
- 17. Maintain and update annually the Digest of the General Assembly actions.
- 18. Represent the Church at large on the Ministry Council.
- 19. Provide support services for the Moderator and all denominational entities.
- 20. Receive and make any appropriate response to communications to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church or General Assembly.
- 21. Maintain a name and address file on congregations, session clerks, pastors, and other leadership of congregations with statistical information about congregations, presbyteries, and synods.
- 22. Solicit, receive, publish, and disseminate annual reports from churches.
- 23. Review reports by denominational entities and assist them in complying with correct reporting and budgeting procedures and in avoiding duplication of work.
- 24. Hold, report annually, and distribute as authorized by the General Assembly or the Ministry Council the Contingency Fund and all other General Assembly Funds not entrusted to the care of a denominational entity.
- 25. Call the Judiciary Committee into session or by other means secure the advice of the committee on appropriate matters.
- 26. Communicate with presbyteries and synods on behalf of the General Assembly and attend their meetings from time to time.
- 27. Provide training for presbytery and synod clerks and orientations for General Assembly commissioners.
- 28. Generally perform duties as are prescribed in the Constitution or directed by the General Assembly.

8.05 Removal. The Stated Clerk may be removed by the General Assembly whenever in its judgment the removal would serve the best interests of the corporation.

ARTICLE 9-OTHER OFFICERS

9.01 Secretary. The chief executive officer of the Ministry Council shall, by virtue of office, be the secretary of the corporation, and shall in general perform all duties incident to the office of secretary.

9.02 Engrossing Clerk. The Engrossing Clerk shall be elected by the General Assembly to a term of four (4) years. The regular term of office begins on January 1 and ends on December 31. There is no limit on the number of terms which may be served by an individual Engrossing Clerk. The Engrossing Clerk shall serve as Stated Clerk pro tempore during the meeting of the General Assembly in the event the Stated Clerk is absent or unable to serve. The Engrossing Clerk shall perform such other duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors or the General Assembly.

9.03 Additional Officers. The corporation may have such additional officers as it may from time to time find necessary or appropriate.

ARTICLE 10-ORGANIZATION AND RELATIONSHIPS

10.01 Generally. The following are denominational entities related to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

01. Subsidiary corporations: Board of Stewardship, Foundation and Benefits of the

- 02. Related corporations: Bethel University; Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home; Historical Foundation of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America.
- 03. Commissions: Chaplains and Military Personnel.
- 04. Committees: Committee on Nominations; Joint Committee on Amendments; Judiciary, Our United Outreach; Place of Meeting Committee; Program Committee; Unified Committee on Theology and Social Concerns.

10.02 Election and Tenure. The following qualifications and rules relate to service on any denominational entity.

- 01. Unless elected as an Ecumenical Representative, no person shall be qualified to serve except a member in good standing in a presbytery or local congregation of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.
- 02. No person who is employed in an executive capacity including Chief Executive, Vice-President, Team Leader, Director, or equivalent in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church is eligible to serve on a denominational entity. No employee of a denominational entity is eligible for service on the same denominational entity.
- 03. Each person shall be elected for a term of three years unless elected to fill the remainder of an unexpired term. However, if a person elected to serve on a denominational entity where residence in a particular synod is a qualification for election shall move to another synod while in office, the term to which he or she was elected shall terminate at the close of the next meeting of the General Assembly. When nominating persons to boards and agencies, priority consideration be given to persons whose individual life and/or church involvement demonstrates a commitment to support Our United Outreach.
- 04. Members of the Committee on Nominations may not be elected to a consecutive term. All other persons may serve up to three consecutive terms for a total not to exceed nine years in office.
- 05. A Cumberland Presbyterian who has served on any entity is not eligible to serve on the same entity (except for an authorized consecutive term) until at least two (2) years have elapsed since the conclusion of the previous service.
- 06. A Cumberland Presbyterian who is serving on any entity is not eligible to serve on another entity until at least one (1) year has elapsed since the conclusion of the previous service.
- 07. An Ecumenical Representative who is serving or has served on any entity is not eligible to serve on any other entity (except for an authorized consecutive term on the same entity) until at least one (1) year has elapsed since the conclusion of the previous service.

10.03 Resignation or Removal.

- 01. Any person serving on a denominational entity who is no longer qualified or eligible to serve shall be deemed to have resigned.
- 02. Any person serving on an incorporated denominational entity may resign by delivering written notice of resignation to the secretary or an executive officer of the denominational entity, who shall promptly report the resignation to the Stated Clerk. Any person serving on an unincorporated denominational entity may resign by delivering written notice of resignation to the Stated Clerk. A resignation is effective when delivered unless some other effective date is specified in the written resignation.
- 03. No member who continues to meet the standard requirements for election or appointment to any denominational entity shall be removed from office except for misfeasance. Removal of a person elected by the General Assembly shall be by vote of the General Assembly.

10.04 Board of Stewardship, Foundation and Benefits. The corporation shall elect the eleven (11) directors of the Board of Stewardship as provided in its charter.

10.05 Historical Foundation. The corporation shall elect six (6) of the twelve (12) directors of the Historical Foundation as provided in its charter. The corporation shall elect the directors of the Historical Foundation in such a manner that, immediately following any election, there shall be at least one (1) member from each synod and no person shall be elected if the election would cause two directors from the same presbytery to be serving simultaneously. The remaining six (6) directors shall be elected by the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America.

10.06 Memphis Theological Seminary. The corporation shall elect the twenty-four (24) directors of Memphis Theological Seminary as provided in its charter. The corporation shall elect the directors in such a manner that, immediately following any election, there shall be eleven (11) directors who are members of denominations other than the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

10.07 Ministry Council.

- 01. The corporation shall elect the fifteen (15) directors of the Ministry Council as provided in its charter.
- 02. The corporation shall elect the directors of the Ministry Council in such a manner that immediately following any election, there shall be three (3) directors from each synod; at least six (6) but no more than nine (9) directors who are ordained clergy; and no more than nine (9) directors of the same gender.
- 03. The Stated Clerk and Moderator shall be designated as Advisory Members to the board of directors of the Ministry Council. In addition, the corporation shall elect three (3) Youth Advisory Members who shall be between the ages of 15 17 be elected for 1-year terms, with eligibility for re-election for one additional term.

10.08 Commission on Chaplains and Military Personnel. The commission shall consist of three (3) members elected by the corporation.

ARTICLE 11-COMMITTEES

11.01 General. The corporation shall have the committees provided for in these Bylaws and such other standing or special committees as the General Assembly may create from time to time. Except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, the Moderator, in consultation with the Stated Clerk, shall appoint all committees.

11.02 Committees of Commissioners and Youth Advisory Delegates. Prior to each General Assembly, the Moderator, in consultation with the Stated Clerk, shall organize the Commissioners and Youth Advisory Delegates into the following committees: Chaplains/Missions/Pastoral Development, Children's Home/Historical Foundation, Higher Education, Judiciary, Ministry Council/Communications/ Discipleship, Stewardship/Elected Officers, and Theology and Social Concerns. Each committee shall consider such matters expected to come before the General Assembly as are referred to it by the Stated Clerk. Any denominational organization, the work of which is affected by a matter before a committee, shall be entitled to address the committee.

11.03 Committee on Nominations.

- 01. The committee shall consist of ten (10) persons elected by the corporation in such a manner that, immediately following any election, the committee shall have at least one minister and one lay person from each synod. It is preferred but not required that no two members shall be from the same presbytery.
- 02. Approximately one third of the members of the committee shall be elected each year by the General Assembly and shall serve one term not to exceed three years.
- 03. The committee shall meet not earlier than February 15 each year and shall nominate to the General Assembly qualified persons to fill all vacancies to be filled by vote of the General Assembly, including vacancies on the Committee on Nominations, unless another method of nomination is provided in these Bylaws. The report of the committee shall list the names of nominees, the presbytery if a minister, and the presbytery and the local congregation if a lay person. The Committee on Nominations shall be intentional in nominating persons who represent the global nature of the Church.
- 04. Presbyteries and synods and their moderators and stated clerks are requested to assist the Committee on Nominations by recommending persons for any position by providing the name and qualifications of the potential nominees to the Stated Clerk no later than February 1 on a form to be provided by the Stated Clerk. Nominations from the floor shall also be in order.
- 05. No person shall be nominated for election by the General Assembly unless the nominee has within the past year given his or her consent to the nomination.

11.04 Joint Committee on Amendments. The Judiciary Committee shall appoint as many as five of its members to act in committee with an equal number of members of the Judiciary Committee of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America. Upon the request of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church or the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, this Joint Committee shall prepare for the consideration of both general assemblies proposed amendments to the Confession of Faith, Catechism, Constitution, Rules of Discipline, Directory for Worship, and Rules of Order.

11.05 Judiciary Committee.

01. The committee shall consist of nine (9) persons elected by the corporation in such a manner that, immediately following any election, the committee shall have at least four members (4) who are ordained ministers and at least three (3) members who are licensed attorneys-at-law. The Stated Clerk shall be staff liaison to the committee,

attending its meetings and providing resources and counsel.

- 02. The committee shall meet at least annually upon the call of its chairperson or the Stated Clerk.
- 03. The committee shall provide advice and counsel to the Stated Clerk. Upon the written request of any judicatory or denominational entity made to the chairperson or Stated Clerk, the committee shall render an advisory opinion on matters of church law or procedure. The chairperson shall secure the views of all members of the committee and write the advisory opinion based on the majority view of the members. The committee shall not render legal opinions on matters of civil law nor otherwise engage in the practice of law.
- 04. At least one member of the committee shall attend each meeting of the General Assembly to advise with its officers and Commissioners on matters of church law or procedure. At the Moderator's request a member of the committee shall be available to advise the Moderator during the business sessions of the General Assembly.
- 05. The committee shall be a commission within the meaning of section 2.5 of the Rules of Discipline to hear and determine appeals from synods.
- 06. The committee shall have oversight of and responsibility for ecclesiastical decisions made by a body acting in the place of a presbytery with respect to mission work and mission fields. The oversight and responsibility exercised by the committee shall be the same as that exercised by a synod with respect to a presbytery under its care, specifically Constitution 8.5, a, b, and c

11.06 Our United Outreach Committee.

- 01. The committee shall consist of five (5) persons elected by the corporation in such a manner that, immediately following any election, the committee shall have one person from each synod. Seven (7) additional members will include a member of the Ministry Council, a member of the Corporate Board, a member of the Board of Stewardship, Foundation and Benefits, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Historical Foundation, and a Cumberland Presbyterian member of the Boards of Trustees of Bethel University, the Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home, and Memphis Theological Seminary. The executives of the above named denominational entities shall serve as non-voting, Resource/Advocacy members. In addition, the corporation shall elect three (3) Youth Advisory members who shall be between the ages of 15-17 and be elected for one (1) year terms, with eligibility for re-election for one additional term.
- 02. The Office of the General Assembly will be responsible for the expenses of the representative of each synod. The represented denominational entities will be responsible for the expenses of their representatives and executives.

11.07 Place of Meeting. The committee shall consist of the Moderator, the Stated Clerk and a representative of the Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministries.

11.08 Program Committee. The committee shall consist of the Moderator, Stated Clerk, Director of Ministries, Assistant to the Stated Clerk who serves as secretary, the pastor of the host church, four elected representatives designated by the Ministry Council from among its ministry teams, and one representative designated by each of the following: Bethel University, Board of Stewardship, Foundation, and Benefits, Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home, Historical Foundation, Memphis Theological Seminary, and the Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry. The committee will begin planning for two years prior to the meeting of a particular General Assembly.

11.09 Unified Committee on Theology and Social Concerns. The committee shall consist of eight (8) members elected by the corporation, the Stated Clerk, and the President of Memphis Theological Seminary. At least one member of the committee other than the Seminary's president shall be a Cumberland Presbyterian member of the faculty of Memphis Theological Seminary.

ARTICLE 12-INDEMNIFICATION

12.01 Indemnification. The corporation shall indemnify any director, officer or employee who is, or is threatened to be, made a party to a completed, pending, or threatened action or proceeding from any liability arising from the director's, officer's or employee's official capacity with the corporation. This indemnification shall extend to the personal representation of a deceased person if the person would be entitled to indemnification under these Bylaws if living.

12.02 Costs and Expenses Covered by Indemnification. Indemnification provided under these Bylaws shall extend to the payment of a judgment, settlement, penalty, or fine, as well as attorney's fees, court costs, and other reasonable and necessary expenses incurred by the director or officer with respect to the action or proceeding.

12.03 Limitation on Indemnification. No indemnification shall be made to or on behalf of any

person if a judgment or other final adjudication adverse to that person establishes his or her liability:

- 01. for any breach of the duty of loyalty to the corporation;
- 02. for acts or omissions not in good faith or which involve intentional misconduct or a knowing violation of law; or
- 03. for any distribution of the assets of the corporation which is unlawful under Tennessee law.

ARTICLE 13-TRUSTEE FOR THE CORPORATION

13.01 Trustee. The Board of Stewardship, Foundation and Benefits of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, a nonprofit corporation existing under the laws of the state of Tennessee, holds certain real property and other assets of the Church as trustee for the use and benefit of the Church. The Board of Stewardship may continue to hold such real property and other assets, but after the adoption of these Bylaws, it shall hold those assets as trustee for the use and benefit of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church General Assembly Corporation.

13.02 Other Assets. Other, additional property may from time to time be conveyed to the Board of Stewardship to be held by it as trustee for the corporation. All assets held by the Board of Stewardship as trustee for the corporation shall be held at the pleasure and direction of the General Assembly.

ARTICLE 14-PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

14.01 Designation. The parliamentary authority of the corporation in all meetings shall be the latest revised edition of the Rules of Order as set out in the Confession of Faith and Government of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. In matters not provided for in the Rules of Order, the parliamentary authority shall be Robert's Rules of Order, latest revised edition.

14.02 Standing Rules. The following shall be Standing Rules for meetings of the General Assembly and may be suspended as provided in the parlimentary authority. (see Rules of Order 8.34c)

Standing Rules

1. Unless otherwise determined by the General Assembly or by the Stated Clerk in the event of an emergency, the annual General Assembly shall meet on the third or fourth Monday of June at two o'clock in the afternoon to organize, elect a moderator and transact business, and shall close on Thursday or Friday of the same week.

2. Reports of all standing and special committees shall be considered in the order established by the Moderator in consultation with the Stated Clerk. Committee reports may be presented orally or in writing provided to all Commissioners and youth advisory delegates. Those presenting committee reports shall have the opportunity to make remarks and give explanation, such presentations not to exceed ten minutes unless time is extended by two-thirds vote taken without debate. All committee recommendations shall be submitted in writing.

3. All materials from denominational entities for consideration or action by a General Assembly shall be submitted to the Stated Clerk at least thirty (30) days before the meeting of General Assembly.

4. Resolutions and memorials proposed for adoption by individual commissioners rather than denominational entities or judicatories of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church shall be introduced no later than the close of business on the second day of a meeting of General Assembly, and, when introduced, shall be referred by the Moderator, in counsel with the Stated Clerk, to the appropriate committee or committees for report and recommendations to the Assembly.

ARTICLE 15-REPORTS AND AUDITS

15.01 Congregational Reports. Annually by December 1, the Stated Clerk shall send to session clerks statistical forms for reporting congregational data. Session clerks shall mail the completed forms to presbytery clerks by February 1. The presbytery clerk shall mail the composite statistical report for all congregations of a presbytery to the Stated Clerk by February 10.

15.02 Institutional Reports. In order to be considered for inclusion in the General Assembly budget, all denominational entities shall deliver to the Stated Clerk an annual report including a concise description of the organization's work during the previous year and a line item budget for the forthcoming year. Financial reports should be condensed as much as possible while conveying all essential information on the organization's operations. All denominational entities except academic institutions on a fiscal year are requested to maintain their books on a calendar year.

15.03 Reporting Schedule. An electronic copy and two written copies of the annual report signed by two officers of the organization shall be delivered to the Stated Clerk by March 15 each year. Organizations requesting funds from Our United Outreach shall submit multi-year program budgets to the Our United Outreach Committee.

15.04 Audits. Organizations and operations included in the General Assembly budget shall be audited annually by a certified public accountant. Copies of the auditor's report, including any recommendations for changes in the procedures relating to internal financial controls, shall be delivered to the Stated Clerk. Organizations with total receipts of \$100,000 or less are not required to have an audit but shall submit their books and financial statements to the Stated Clerk annually.

15.05 Bonds. Each organization or person whose financial records are required to be audited shall have a fidelity bond in an amount adequate to protect all funds held by the organization or person.

ARTICLE 16-AMENDMENTS

16.01 Manner of Amendment. Except as provided below, these Bylaws may be amended or repealed only by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the votes cast in a duly constituted meeting of the General Assembly. No portion of the Bylaws may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors. Fair and reasonable notice of any proposed amendment shall be provided as required by state law.

16.02 Extraordinary Actions. In order to be effective the following actions must be approved by (1) the affirmative vote of two consecutive General Assemblies, or (2) a ninety percent (90%) vote of a single General Assembly.

- 01. Terminating the existence of a denominational entity named in Bylaw 10.01
- 02. Creating a new denominational entity other than a temporary committee or task force.
- 03. Decreasing the Our United Outreach budget allocation to a denominational entity by more than 40% of the amount distributed to it during the previous calendar year; or
- 04. Taking any other actions which would cause a drastic change in the mission or structure of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

THE REPORT OF THE MODERATOR

I. TRIBUTE TO FORMER VICE MODERATOR BUDDY POPE

I am deeply grateful for the opportunity given me to serve as Moderator of the 188th General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. I was honored to serve with Vice Moderator, Reverend Buddy Pope, of Columbia Presbytery. During the fall, Buddy attended several presbytery meetings in my place. We talked regularly to make sure that we were on the same page in representing the General Assembly to the larger church, and in listening to the needs and will of the church. I was deeply saddened to hear of Buddy's death, after an acute illness, late in 2018. I was able to attend the visitation and give my personal condolences to his wife and children, and to express appreciation for his service to his church. His family expressed to me how grateful Buddy was for the privilege of serving as Vice Moderator of the 188th General Assembly. Though he is not here to say so, I know that he would want me to let you know how humbled and thankful he was for the opportunity to serve in this office.

RECOMMENDATION 1: That the 189th General Assembly formally express its appreciation for the life, ministry, and service of Reverend Buddy Pope as Vice Moderator of the 188th General Assembly, and that the clerk be instructed to send notice of our appreciation to Buddy's family at his earliest convenience.

II. CONNECTIONALISM

I am deeply grateful for the gracious welcome I received in attending many Presbytery meetings, the meeting of the Ministry Council in August, and the Board of Stewardship in March. It is always encouraging to worship with Cumberland Presbyterians and to see the work of our church in its varied manifestations.

In my travels, I have sought to encourage our connectionalism as a church, a goal I expressed when I was nominated for office last spring. It is gratifying to see that connectionalism in action. On the other hand, it is always disappointing when we see some churches and ministers who do not take advantage of the strengths that such connections afford us all. In my own presbytery, I was shocked to learn that almost 40% of the churches failed to make a single contribution to our presbyterial budget in 2018. That is a sign of disaffection that we must all be working to overcome.

III. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

In observing the work of the church, I have come to believe that our Constitution's description of advisory members is inadequate for several reasons. The current language, in section 3.0, Judicatories of the Church, reads as follows:

"3.07 Other ministers [who are not members of the body] who are present in a meeting of presbytery or synod may or may not be seated by action of the body as advisory members, which if granted gives them the privilege to speak to any matter before the body. Persons so seated shall be introduced to the presbytery or the synod by the moderator."

This is the only statement on the use of advisory members in the Constitution. In addition to this statement, the practice of presbyteries electing youth advisory delegates to the meeting of General Assembly is also spelled out in the Bylaws of the General Assembly Corporation, section 4.03. While the paragraph from the Constitution does a fairly reasonable job of describing long-standing practice in our denomination when it comes to middle judicatories, I don't think it is adequate for several reasons.

1. There is no recognition that visiting elders should be afforded the same courtesy as ministers. One of the geniuses of Presbyterian polity is its parity of ministry between ordained ministers and elders. There is no reason, in the courts of the church, to distinguish between them. When an elder, serving as a denominational official, attends presbytery or synod meetings to speak on behalf of the wider church, that person should be afforded the same respect and recognition as any visiting ordained minister.

2. The practice of youth advisory delegates, so beneficial to the work of the General Assembly for many years, should be encouraged at all levels of church judicatories, including local church sessions.

3. There is nothing in the Constitution that addresses the status of assistant and associate pastors with the session of the church they serve. Some Presbyterian denominations grant assistant pastors advisory status in the session, and associate pastors full voting membership on the session. In discussions, the actual practice is often that assistant and associate pastors are granted advisory membership on the session, but there is no provision that explicitly grants them that right.

4. In one presbytery I visited during the year, the stated clerk, who is an elder, is usually granted permission to speak as necessary at the beginning of each presbytery meeting, since the clerk is usually not a member of the body. At other presbytery meetings I have witnessed elders and lay persons who are making reports on behalf of the presbytery's boards and/or standing committees who have to request permission to speak. This should not be necessary for anyone representing one of the presbytery's standing boards or committees.

For all of the reasons outlined above, I would like to propose the following constitutional amendment to this meeting of General Assembly, to replace the current section 3.07 quoted above.

"3.07 Every judicatory of the church has the prerogative to seat persons as advisory members, with full privilege of speaking to any issue before the judicatory, but no vote. The following persons shall be granted advisory membership in the stated judicatory:

a. Presbytery approved and installed assistant and associate pastors will be advisory members of the session they serve.

b. Elected officers of any judicatory (stated clerk, engrossing clerk, treasurer, etc.) and official representatives from any standing committee or board of the judicatory will be advisory members of that judicatory, if they are not members of the body, without the need to request permission to speak.

The following persons may be approved as advisory members of a judicatory, but are not required to be seated as such. Persons so seated shall be introduced to the judicatory by the moderator:

a. In middle judicatories, visiting ordained Cumberland Presbyterian ministers from other presbyteries/synods.

- b. In middle judicatories, visiting elders from other presbyteries/synods.
- c. In any judicatory, youth advisory delegates elected to serve.
- d. Representatives from higher judicatories.
- e. Officers from the Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry or other auxiliaries.
- f. Attorneys employed by the judicatory.

g. Visiting ministers or leaders from other denominations with whom the judicatory is in partnership.

No judicatory should feel obligated to seat advisory members, but should grant this privilege in a way that serves the mission and ministry of the church. Persons who are not regular or advisory members of any judicatory may be granted permission to speak to the judicatory on majority vote or consent of the judicatory."

RECOMMENDATION 2: That the General Assembly approve the proposed amendment to substitute a new section 3.07 for the existing 3.07 in the Constitution of the CPC/CPCA, and that the proposed amendment be forwarded to the Joint Committee on Amendments for their review and counsel.

IV. GRATITUDE

I am grateful for the assistance of stated clerk Michael G. Sharpe, engrossing clerk Vernon Sansom, and assistant to the clerk Elizabeth Vaughn for their help in carrying out my duties at the 188th General Assembly, and over the past year. Their counsel and friendship was vital to any success I may have had.

I had the honor of serving my church through teaching and leading our seminary, Memphis Theological Seminary, for 21 years. In that time, I was blessed by relationships with colleagues and students and trustees and friends of the seminary who have enriched my life beyond measure. I continue to pray for the work of Memphis Theological Seminary, and for those who are now in position to lead our seminary into the future. If it hadn't been for my work and travels on behalf of Memphis Theological Seminary, I may never have had the opportunity to be elected moderator.

THE REPORT OF THE STATED CLERK

I. THE OFFICE OF THE STATED CLERK

The Constitution, the Rules of Discipline, the Rules of Order, and the General Assembly Bylaws (found in the front of the General Assembly Minutes) list the many responsibilities for the person who holds the position of Stated Clerk, the primary task is to maintain and strengthen a united witness for the Church. The Stated Clerk shall also generally supervise and control the business affairs of the Corporation, and see that all directives of the General Assembly are implemented.

The Office of the General Assembly also provides budgeting, accounting, and support services for commissions, committees, agencies and task forces without executive assistance.

Additional services and activities provided through the office of the Stated Clerk this past year include:

• Providing assistance to the Unification Task Force and the Evaluation Committee.

• Developing and maintaining a web presence for the following General Assembly Committees/ Commissions without staff: Nominating Committee, Unified Committee on Theology and Social Concerns, Commission on Military Chaplains and Personnel, Our United Outreach Committee and the Unification Task Force.

• Creation of spring and fall Denominational News Updates, a compilation of talking points obtained from each board and agency that may be shared by visiting denominational staff and the moderator when making visits to presbyteries and in other settings. The updates are also shared with presbytery clerks.

• Development of a Travel Chart, to assist with the coordination of travel plans by denominational staff to meetings of presbyteries. The travel chart is also shared with presbytery clerks.

• Hosted the annual conference for Presbytery and Synod Clerks.

A significant portion of the Stated Clerk's time has been spent responding to various judicial and legal questions affecting local churches and presbyteries. The Clerk is appreciative for advice provided to this office from both the Permanent Judiciary Committee and from Mr. Jamie Jordan who serves as legal counsel for the Office of the General Assembly.

The Stated Clerk is grateful to the Church for calling him to serve in this position and appreciates the support of the Church for the Office and for the person who holds this position.

II. STAFF

Ms. Elizabeth Vaughn serves as the Assistant to the Stated Clerk, a position that requires her to maintain accurate records of ministers, probationers, congregations, record income and expenses and to authorize payment of all items in the Office of the General Assembly budget. The Church is fortunate to have a person with such knowledge, efficiency and dedication to work. The Stated Clerk and the Assistant to the Stated Clerk are currently the only employees of the Office of the General Assembly.

Reverend Vernon Sansom continues to serves as Engrossing Clerk and is to be commended for the accuracy in recording the minutes of the General Assembly. Vernon also leads the orientation session for those who serve as chairperson and co-chairperson for each General Assembly appointed Committee and provides valuable assistance in the preparation of committee reports at each meeting of the General Assembly.

III. ECUMENICAL RELATIONSHIPS

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church has historically been involved in ecumenical relationships. Through co-operative ministries, chaplains for the military and veteran's hospitals are endorsed, migrant workers and persons in Appalachia are served, and missionaries are sent into a variety of countries. Through ecumenical partnerships disaster relief funds are distributed. Through working co-operatively church school and camping materials are developed. The Cumberland Presbyterian witness is more effective through participation with other Christians in these and various other ministries.

A. CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN AMERICA

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church have one heritage, one Confession of Faith and share in several co-operative relationships and ministries such as the Historical Foundation, the United Board of Christian Discipleship, youth ministry, and the Unified Committee on Theology and Social Concerns. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church also participate with other Reformed bodies in ministry. Although working through partnerships, the witness of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church would be greatly enhanced through a union of the two denominations.

B. WORLD COMMUNION OF REFORMED CHURCHES

Both the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in a America are members of World Communion of Reformed Churches (WCRC). The WCRC was formed in 2010 by a merger of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches and the Reformed Ecumenical Council. The WCRC represents approximately eighty million members of two hundred thirty denominations from one hundred seven countries, including Reformed, Congregationalists, Presbyterian and United Churches. Resources and updates from the World Communion of Reformed Churches are available on their website: (www.wcrc.ch).

Reverend Christopher Ferguson serves as general secretary of the WCRC and offices in Hanover, Germany where the headquarters for WCRC is located.

IV. THE CORPORATE BOARD

In the called meeting in December 2007, the General Assembly elected a new board of directors for the General Assembly Incorporation, thus the Corporate Board was formed. The responsibilities for the Corporate Board are listed in the General Assembly Bylaws, Article 5.

The Corporate Board met as needed by conference call this past year, actions included: appointment of the GA Evaluation Committee as directed by the 188th General Assembly.

The Center Interagency Team (CIT) comprised of the Center's Principle Executive Officers, continues to be responsible for oversight of the day-to-day maintenance and property needs at the Denominational Center. Current CIT members include: Mike Sharpe (Office of the General Assembly), Robert Heflin (Board of Stewardship, Foundation and Benefits), Susan Gore (Historical Foundation), and Edith Old (Ministry Council). The Shared Services budget covers the cost for maintaining the Center offices and property (see page 122).

V. COMMUNICATIONS

The Office of the General Assembly received memorials from the following Presbyteries: del Cristo, Missouri and Nashville (see pages 126-128 of the Preliminary Minutes) and have been referred to the appropriate General Assembly select committees for consideration.

A Petition from Arkansas Presbytery was received (see page 138), but because the petition presents the same question as one which remains within the control of the assembly (a referral from the 188th General Assembly re: Human Sexuality), the General Assembly Permanent Committee on Judiciary advised the clerk that it would not be in order for the Arkansas Petition to be considered by the General Assembly in its 2019 meeting (see page 99 of the Preliminary Minutes).

VI. ENDORSEMENTS FOR MODERATOR

The Reverend Shelia O'Mara, Presbytery del Cristo and the Reverend Michael Clark, Murfreesboro Presbytery have been endorsed as Moderator of the 189th General Assembly.

VII. MINUTES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Office of the General Assembly continues to make the minutes of the General Assembly available on a CD, and mailing them to persons requesting them. The resource center also prints and sells a few printed copies of the General Assembly Minutes each year. For information contact Matthew Gore, mhg@cumberland.org. It is permissible to download and print a copy of the minutes from the website (www.cumberland.org/gao).

VIII. STATISTICAL INFORMATION

The annual congregational report forms are sent to the session clerk on December 1, and due in the office of the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery on February 1, and all reports are to be in the Office of the General Assembly by February 10.

In 2018 a two hundred and two congregations failed to report, thus statistics are not accurate. The statistics for a non-reporting congregation may be several years old, but it is the latest information available. The General Assembly Office continues to shorten and simplify the reporting process. Efforts also continue to further simplify online reporting for those able to utilize the technology. Hard copies of the report forms will still be made available for those congregations who do not have access to the internet.

The 178th and 179th General Assembly directed "that each presbytery request that its Board of Missions or similar agency, as they minister to the needs of the churches within their presbyteries, remind the churches that it is important that they submit annual reports which are part of our history and offer assistance when needed in preparation of these reports." If a congregation fails to receive a report, a duplicate form can be requested from the Office of the General Assembly or one may be printed from the web site (www.cumberland.org/gao), and going to the section on congregational reports.

THE REPORT OF THE MINISTRY COUNCIL

To the 189th General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church meeting in session at the Embassy Suites and Conference Center, Huntsville, Alabama.

I. MINISTRY COUNCIL

A. INTRODUCTION

The Ministry Council (MC) serves as the primary long- and short-range program planning agency of the Church, striving to ensure that all segments work on a unified mission and that human and material resources are utilized to carry out ministries of the Church in an effective manner. The Ministry Council is accountable to the General Assembly (GA).

Due to the scope of the work related to denominational ministries under the MC, our report has historically been quite lengthy, necessitating the division of the report to multiple GA committees. Since 2017, with the goal of providing crucial information in a concise manner, our report to GA has been significantly condensed. This report focuses on recommendations to the GA. A more detailed annual report, created as a supplement to this Report to the 189th General Assembly, reflects in greater detail the work of the MC and its four Ministry Teams (MT). The supplement is available on our web page *cpcmc.org/mc/ga19-supplement/. We encourage Commissioners and others at GA to visit both the Ministry Council booth and the Ministry Exchange to meet elected members and staff and to share ideas for enhancing ministries.*

1. Ministry Council (MC) Elected Membership and Terms

MC elected members are subject to GA requirements of endorsement by presbytery (clergy) or church (laity), as well as geographical (synodic) and gender representation. It is our belief that God calls people from across the denomination to serve in leadership roles, and that the limited number of Personal Data Forms and related endorsements on file in the Office of the General Assembly does not reflect the abundance of qualified leaders within the Church. The MC respectfully reminds Commissioners of an action of the 186th General Assembly that urged each presbytery *"to proactively recruit and encourage qualified leaders to prayerfully consider opportunities to serve as elected board members at the denominational level, to include the Ministry Council and all other denominational entities."*

The initial three-year terms of Karen Avery, Carla Bellis, Tsuruko Satoh, and Reverend Mike Wilkinson expire in 2019. All are eligible for an additional term of service; however, Karen Avery and Tsuruko Satoh asked not to be re-nominated due to family and work responsibilities. Both Ms. Avery and Ms. Satoh brought helpful insight and experience to the MC, and their unique perspectives will be sorely missed. The third three-year term of Reverend Troy Green expires in 2019, and he is ineligible for an additional term at this time. Reverend Green has been an active and enthusiastic servant leader on the MC, proactively encouraging new and returning members during their tenure on the MC and has been a strong advocate for MC/ MT staff. The MC and staff deeply appreciate his service and sacrifice over the past nine years. Reverend Lanny Johnson's third three-year term expires in 2020; however, he has recently moved outside the bounds of the synod, and thus cannot continue to serve on the Council. Reverend Johnson's good humor, institutional memory and unflagging, enthusiastic support of the MC and staff will also be greatly missed. The second one-year term of Youth Advisory Member Leighann Morgan concludes with this GA. She is ineligible for a third one-year term. We express appreciation to Ms. Morgan for her dedicated level of engagement in the work of the Church and her two years of service on the MC. Terms of Youth Advisory Members Sydney Holder and Madison Holland conclude with this GA. They are each eligible to serve an additional one-year term. The MC is the only denominational entity with Youth Advisory Members.

2. Ministry Teams plan and implement the program ministries of the Church and are made up of both Staff and Elected Team Members. Ministry Teams report to the MC. MT members are elected by the MC and reflect GA term limits.

Communications Ministry Team (CMT) elected member Reverend Steven Shelton was hired as the new CMT Leader in June 2018, leaving his term unfulfilled, dropping CMT's membership to three after Reverend Jim McGuire's replacement was unable to join the CMT as planned. At its February 2019 meeting, the MC elected Joyce A. McCullough (Manchester CPC, Murfreesboro Presbytery) and Reverend Neal Wilkinson (White Oak Pond CPC, Missouri Presbytery) bringing elected membership up to five. An additional member will be added in 2020 bringing the team back up to a full six elected members.

Discipleship Ministry Team (DMT) elected member Reverend Nancy McSpadden completed two terms and, for health reasons, has chosen not to serve a third term. Reverend Josefina Sanchez also completed two terms and has chosen not to serve a third term as she explores new types of ministry. DMT is grateful for their experience and contributions. At its February 2019 meeting, MC elected Reverend Jesse Thornton to serve a second term; Jonathan Bellis (Orange CPC, Missouri Presbytery) to replace Nancy McSpadden, and Reverend Abby Prevost (Welti CPC, Hope Presbytery) to replace Josefina Sanchez.

Missions Ministry Team (MMT) elected member Reverend Victor Hassell has completed three terms. MMT is thankful for his passion for missions and contributions to the work of the Church. Dominic Lau completed two terms and asked not to be re-elected due to study and work demands. Reverend Cardelia Howell-Diamond was hired as the new Coordinator for Women's Ministry and thus is no longer an elected member. MMT appreciates the energy and enthusiasm they imbued into the work of the MMT. At its February 2019 meeting, the MC elected Dean Reichenbach (Smithville CPC, Murfreesboro Presbytery) and Karen Patten (Faith CPC, West Tennessee Presbytery) to serve on the MMT. Reverend Brittany Meeks and Reverend Chris Warren were re-elected for a third term.

MC re-elected Reverend Duawn Mearns and Reverend Sandra Shepherd to third terms on the **Pastoral Development Ministry Team (PDMT).**

The MC elects MT members in accordance with GA requirements: that individuals have current personal data forms and recommendations from their presbytery (clergy) or pastor (laity) on file with the Stated Clerk prior to GA. A complete list of MT members appears at *cpcmc.org/mc/*.

Staff Team Members are employees of the MC (alphabetical order):

• **CMT:** Publications Manager/Editor Matthew H. Gore; Senior Art Director Sowgand Sheikholeslami; and CMT Leader Reverend Steven Shelton.

Brown; Coordinator of Adult Ministry Reverend Chris Fleming (Paducah, Kentucky office); Coordinator of Distribution Cindy Martin; Coordinator of Children and Family Ministry Jodi Hearn Rush (Nashville, Tennessee office); and Coordinator of Youth and Young Adult Ministry Reverend Nathan Wheeler.

• **MMT:** Coordinator for Women's Ministry Reverend Cardelia Howell-Diamond (Huntsville, Alabama office); Cross-Culture Immigrant US Ministry Reverend Johan Daza; Manager, Finance and Administration Jinger Ellis; Director of Congregational Ministries Reverend Kristi Lounsbury (Krum, Texas office); Evangelism & New Church Development Reverend T.J. Malinoski; Director Global Missions Reverend Lynn Thomas (Birmingham, Alabama office); and MMT Leader Reverend Milton Ortiz. Bilingual English/Korean Administrative Assistant Julie Min accepted a position as Korean Language Lecturer at Penn State University, concluding her service in December 2018. Ms. Min provided unique and highly valued gifts to MMT, the MC, and the Church. We extend to her our gratitude and blessings for her time on staff.

• **PDMT:** PDMT Leader Reverend Pam Phillips-Burk.

3. The **Global Ministries Leadership Team (GMLT)** is made up of the four Ministry Team Leaders and Director of Ministries. GMLT works together to apply the MC's vision/mission to the many varied programs and resource materials planned and produced by the MTs, coordinating ministries and a comprehensive budget in a unified, collaborative manner. GMLT meets monthly.

4. Administration: Director of Ministries Edith Busbee Old gives executive leadership to the MC in accomplishing duties defined by its Bylaws and supervises the GMLT. The Director of Ministries is under direct employment of and is responsible to the MC. The MC is grateful that the Director and Team Leaders are globally minded without neglecting the stateside church, for their creative and consistent leadership, and for sustaining consistently positive fiscal results.

B. GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Meetings: The MC met twice in regular session since the 188th GA. Summaries of MC meetings appear at *cpcmc.org/mc/soa/*.

2. Future Meeting Dates: August 15, 2019 (Thursday) – Orientation for newly elected MC/MT members at the Denominational Center, Cordova, Tennessee.

August 16–17, 2019 (Friday and Saturday) – All elected members and staff of the MC and all four MTs meet concurrently at Faith CPC, Bartlett, Tennessee.

February 22–23, 2020 (Saturday and Sunday) – MC Corporation Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors with Team Leaders and the Director of Ministries at the Denominational Center.

3. Elected member accountability and training: Newly elected MC/MT members receive multitiered orientation prior to their first meeting. Each year, all elected members sign a Covenant reinforcing their commitment to answering the call to serve God through service to the Church. Elected MC members set individual annual goals and complete annual self-evaluations reflecting on their service. These tools serve as metrics to help guide the MC and its teams. The Covenant may be seen at *cpcmc.org/mc/covenant/*.

4. Human Resources: When a staff position becomes vacant, the MC invests time in a thorough revision of that job description. Input is gathered from elected members, GMLT, and relevant staff. Since the 188th GA, MC has prayerfully considered current and future ministries of all of its MTs. Within the past year, all of its MTs experienced staff changes resulting in the need for MC to painstakingly review and revise job descriptions. Three staff members moved to different MTs and/or new responsibilities within the same team: Matt Gore transitioned from DMT to CMT; Cindy Martin shifted within DMT; Pam Phillips-Burk shifted from MMT to PDMT. The MC affirms these moves as outward examples of their response to Call in using their unique gifts to grow God's Kingdom. Additionally, since the 188th GA, three new staff members came on board: Cardelia Howell-Diamond, Kristi Lounsbury, and Chris Fleming. And though he came on board just days prior to the 188th GA, and was introduced at same, Reverend Steven Shelton was not included in the written MC Report to that GA as it was written in March 2018 prior to his accepting the call to the position of CMT Leader.

5. Unification: The 188th GA encouraged the Unification Task Force (UTF) and MC to establish a viable network of communication so that they may continue to work for a successful unification of the CPC and the CPCA. MC/MT elected members and staff continue to maintain communication with the UTF and CPCA leadership, visit CPCA congregations, and participate in CPCA events. MMT staff member for Evangelism and New Church Development, Reverend T.J. Malinoski, is a dual member of Presbytery of East Tennessee (CPC) and New Hopewell Presbytery (CPCA), serving as a proactive liaison between the CPC and CPCA.

6. The 188th GA assigned a Committee to "work with the Discipleship Ministry Team (to) develop and to conduct a census/survey of all congregations in regards to particular churches use of the Encounter Publication with the results of that census/survey disseminated through the stated clerks of each presbytery by the 190th General Assembly. The committee members are: Vicky Goodwin, Mission Synod; Lisa Scott, Synod of the Midwest; Grady Prevost, Synod of the Southeast; Ben Lindamood, Tennessee Synod; and Mike Reno, Synod of Great Rivers." Coordinator of Adult Ministry Reverend Chris Fleming is working with that committee and the results will be disseminated as requested by the 190th GA (2020).

7. The 188th GA requested the Permanent Judiciary and the Unified Committee on Theology and Social Concerns, along with the **MC (for input from a cross-culture/international perspective)**, to work jointly to develop a position statement on issues of human sexuality to be presented to the 189th GA for its consideration. At its August 2018 meeting, the MC heard from three of its MMT staff in regard to input volunteered by CPs outside the US. Following its February 2019 meeting, the MC shared with the joint committee additional information received from pastors in Japan Presbytery. Immediately following both its August and February meetings, the MC relayed summaries of the international perspectives to the Unified Committee on Theology and Social Concerns.

II. MINISTRIES

A. PARAMETERS

The MC created "Parameters to Guide the Work of Our Ministry Teams" as a standard for all work done by MTs. Parameters are on the MC website *cpcmc.org/mc/mt-work-params/*.


B. CMT

CMT continues to explore ways to use technology to support our denomination's connectional nature, and to ensure that we are being the best stewards possible of our resources. In partnership with all MTs,

CMT provides support for website management, audio/ visual services, social networking platforms, and webbased application support, and consultations. In addition to its responsibilities around editing and publishing THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN magazine, *The Missionary Messenger* (cooperatively with MMT), the MC Supplemental Report, and the annual Program Planning Calendar, CMT also manages the dissemination of time-sensitive news and information via "News of the Church". Senior Art Director Sowgand Sheikholeslami provides layout and design for numerous projects and programs related to the ministries of the Church, beyond the work of the MC, including artwork for the denomination's Yearbook and GA Minutes.

With the retirement of former CMT Leader Mark Davis, the MC envisioned a broader influence for CMT, adding a full time staff position of Publications Manager/Editor. This division of duties has provided more opportunity for the Team Leader to expand the capacity of the CMT in the realm of church support and technology development. To date, Steven Shelton has coordinated with MMT to develop an online platform for the Missions School and with PDMT to enhance the online capacities of the Leadership Referral Service. As CMT capabilities continue to be cultivated by the expanded team (including this year, the very first live video stream of GA worship and business) they are excited about what new support they may be able to offer in upcoming years.

Publications Manager/Editor Matt Gore has made great strides in returning the magazine to its intended role as the denomination's paper of record, while bringing a rich historical perspective to the publication sharing stories of Cumberland Presbyterians through the centuries. Since Matt began in this capacity in September 2018, subscriptions to THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN magazine have increased significantly and we look forward to continued increases in 2019 as word of his journalistic excellence continues to spread.

C. DMT

The Cumberland Presbyterian Constitution recognizes that "God has given different gifts to ministers of the word and sacrament and the church recognizes various types of ministry ... not only as pastors of particular churches but as teachers of religion in various kinds of schools, editors of religious publications, chaplains to the military forces and to various types of institutions, missionaries, evangelists, counselors, administrators of church programs and institutions, directors of Christian education in particular churches, and as leaders in other fields of service directly related to the church." (2.64 Constitution, Confession of Faith)

DMT continues to uphold its mission statement: The DMT invites and challenges people in all seasons of life to grow in their faith in Jesus Christ by providing training, events, and curriculum to nurture discipleship in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

We continue to see that all of our resources include our Core Values to **Inspire**: We strive to empower and equip CPs to think critically and love extravagantly; to maintain **Integrity**: We teach and learn by allowing ourselves to be authentically guided by the Holy Spirit through scripture; and be **Inclusive**: We celebrate the diversity of our churches, cultures, and people that are the body of Christ.

DMT elected members and staff are working together to complete goals set for 2020. These include **Social Media and Marketing** (full-time marketing person, better communication bridge between staff and presbyteries, and videos relating DMT ministries); **Leadership Development** (a safe sanctuary Discipleship Blueprint design that is already completed, another path for ordination, and two grant funding goals for sources for programming); goals for **Age Specific** areas (voting rights for YADs, increased participation at CPYC, 2021 Kaleo, three Children's Fest sites - being done this year - and developing a more robust adult ministry plan); and **Curriculum and Resources** (75% of all CP churches using CP curriculum, attending CP events, and developing core values, beliefs, practices, for all DMT curriculum, resources and events).

PRELIMINARY MINUTES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

D. MMT

MMT serves and equips CPs, congregations and judicatories in pursuing God's mission of redemption and reconciliation. Our *"responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build the church, the body of Christ."* (Ephesians 4:12 NLT) Specifically, MMT facilitates those phases of the Church's mission concerned with outreach in terms of evangelism and the establishing of congregations, and other means of Christian witness around the world. MMT's ministry is present in fifteen countries: Australia, Brazil, Cambodia, Colombia, Cuba, Guatemala, Haiti, Hong Kong, Japan, Laos, Mexico, Philippines, South Korea, Spain, and the US. MMT's vision is the development of a fresh identity for the CPC as an evangelism/church planting/ missions *movement*. MMT serves and equips through consultation, expertise, coaching, leadership training, professional development, and ministry opportunities. At present, MMT's focus is in five areas of ministry: Evangelism and New Church Development, Congregational Ministries, Women's Ministry, Cross-Culture Immigrant US Ministry, and Global Ministry. What are our goals and actions?

- 1. To work towards the practice of evangelism as Cumberland Presbyterians.
 - a. Continue to be in conversation with staff and all MTs about the practice of evangelism from various roles and perspectives.
 - b. Continue to be in conversation about the practice of evangelism among church leaders, local congregations and all judicatory levels of the church.
- 2. To promote diverse and innovative methods to plant new churches.
 - a. Develop a list of different models of new church developments.
 - b. Foster individual and small group conversations about different methods to plant churches.
 - c. Continue working with staff to research methods of new church development.
- 3. To promote various approaches to church development.
 - a. Develop a practical process of steps for church assimilation.
 - b. Develop a practical process of steps for church consultation.
 - c. Consider a new online platform for the Leadership Referral Service (LRS).
- 4. To engage all women in the CPC in a wide variety of ministry opportunities.
 - a. Continue conversation about new and creative possibilities for the Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry Convention.
 - b. Continue Young Women's Ministry in partnership with Young Adult Ministry.
 - c. Continue developing ministries among cross-culture women.
- 5. To promote awareness and compassionate involvement in the needs of our communities.
 - a. Develop a process to promote awareness and compassionate involvement in the needs of our communities by volunteering, advocating, giving, and working in teams.
 - b. Foster individual and small group conversations about the needs in our communities.
- 6. To promote among all CPs the vision and benefits of having a global church perspective.
 - a. Foster individual and small group conversations about the vision and benefits of having a global church.
 - b. Develop a process to have more international mission trips.
 - c. Continue working with staff to explore ways to be a global church.
- 7. To increase donors of all types to give strategically to the different offerings and programs.
 - a. Continue conversation with staff about learning to market MMT programs and offerings in new ways based on target audiences.
 - b. Develop fundraising strategies based on MMT's mission, culture, and the qualities that make MMT unique.

Evangelism and New Church Development

This office provides innovative strategies, guidance, and training that are reaching new people and making disciples of Jesus Christ primarily to, and with, CPs in the US for the transformation of the world. The office of Evangelism and New Church Development also delivers local, on-site support for various judicatories and groups with an emphasis in evangelism. More recently, a new approach to starting worshipping communities called New Exploration Initiatives is addressing a need in the area of church planting. This office intends to capitalize on that need with new projects from planning stages to implementation in early 2019 in Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, and Tennessee. The intention of this office is not only to help those who are starting new churches and forming new communities of faith but also help equip existing congregations in the sharing of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. A priority in the coming year will be to seek out prospective leaders and locations to start new groups.

RECOMMENDATION 1: That the 189th General Assembly request presbyteries to call upon both lay and ordained Cumberland Presbyterians to start new communities of faith in their homes, neighborhoods, towns, cities, and local settings with the encouragement and support of their church session, presbyterial board of missions, presbytery, synod, and MMT for the purpose of extending the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Women's Ministry

Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry is a thriving community within the CPC. It includes all aspects of ministry that include women. In the CPC that's everything from ordination, sessions, circles, women's fellowships, missions and beyond! Every woman in the CPC is a part of Women's Ministry; some just may not know it yet. The purpose of Women's Ministry in the CPC is to accept the love and joy of Jesus through the ministry of women. We seek to do this as we pray, study God's word, and reach out to others through missions, service, encouragement, and fellowship opportunities. This goal is accomplished on all levels of work from local to denominational.

Women's Ministry Convention is held every year coinciding with GA. We spend time encouraging one another and seeking to engage in biblical study, introduce new outreach, elect officers, and hear from the global missions field. We collect an offering to be divided among different ministries and the Stott-Wallace Missionary Offering Fund. Throughout 2019-2020, Women's Ministry across the denomination will focus on *walking in love* together through worship, prayer, missions, fellowship, retreats, and many other creative endeavors.

Women's Ministry has placed an emphasis on including young women (post high school to 35) in women's ministry activities unique to their needs and interests. We held our annual Young Women's Retreat in January 2019 and look forward to hosting another in February 2020 at Camp Clark Williamson, Humboldt, Tennessee. Young Women's Ministry is now done in partnership with the Young Adult Ministry of DMT.

Beth-El Farmworker


Every year many CP groups plan domestic and international short mission trips. For some of these groups, mission trip opportunities are found outside our denomination. MMT urges and encourages all CPs and mission groups to become familiar with our domestic and abroad mission opportunities. Many of these are constantly receiving mission groups and have an efficient structure to plan team visits throughout the year.

Domestically, Beth-El Farmworker Ministry, founded in 1976 by faithful CPs, serves the farmworker community near Tampa, Florida, through Nuevo Camino (New Path) worshipping community. They provide hunger relief programs, health and wellness programs, and mission and summer programs for churches and short-term mission groups. Beth-El Farmworker Ministry is located in Wimauma, Florida, 45 minutes from Tampa International Airport. Lodging and meals per participant/per day is around \$35-40. Several mission trip opportunities are available during the year and all CP churches are welcome. RECOMMENDATION 2: That the 189th General Assembly request presbyteries to promote and encourage all congregations to consider Beth-El Farmworker Ministry as a mission field for Cumberland Presbyterian church groups looking for short mission trip opportunities and experiences.

Global Missions

The Stott-Wallace Missionary Offering Fund's monthly contributions over the past three years:



The Stott-Wallace (SW) Missionary Offering Fund is the method the CPC uses to support Cumberland Presbyterian missionaries. Donations are received during the year from churches and individuals, with special focus on Pentecost Sunday (Missions Sunday). In 2018, the SW Missionary Offering Fund produced \$240,702 in donations. In 2017, it produced \$288,069 and in 2016 a total of \$246,832. The SW Missionary Offering Fund is a relatively new concept for CPs. In addition to SW donations, this fund receives a donation from Our United Outreach distributions and a donation from endowments designated for missionary support. To support current CP missionaries the fund needs to generate approximately \$350,000 annually.

In 2018, two missionary families resigned and returned home. In late 2018, MMT approved a new missionary family to Brazil and they were deployed in early 2019. It is the goal of the MMT to deploy more new missionaries in 2019; missionary applications are currently being processed. By the end of 2019 we should have 14 missionaries planting CP churches in different places around the world. Pray that God opens doors of prosperity to meet the needs of our missionaries.

RECOMMENDATION 3: That the 189th General Assembly be called to pray during the General Assembly for our missionaries. And that the General Assembly prays that God continues to call churches and individuals to support these missionaries.

Congregational Ministries

Serving as a coach and facilitator to congregations, the Director of Congregational Ministries works with all MC staff to ensure success in the local church. This includes assessing local congregational needs, providing resources to encourage successful ministry and aid in reaching the goals of the congregation. This position is committed to increasing knowledge of opportunities for congregations to engage in through missions, Christian education, youth events, and other activities. Other avenues of support for congregations include: assisting congregations searching for a pastor through the Leadership Referral Service; serving as a resource person for mission opportunities and disaster relief teams; and, promoting events, activities and opportunities through social media. Being a newly expanded position, Congregational Ministries allows for new prospects of growth, outreach, and resources within the denomination, as well as sustainable support of congregations through ut the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

RECOMMENDATION 4: That the 189th General Assembly request presbyteries to encourage all congregations to engage, promote, support, and participate in opportunities to grow the Kingdom of God in denominational ministries through the following: Explore denominational resources for Small Group Studies, Children and Youth Ministry, and Adult Bible Study; Pray for and support our missionaries through the Stott-Wallace Missionary Offering Fund; Visit and advocate for our Ministry Partners, Beth-El Farmworker Ministry, Project Vida, Coalition of Appalachian Ministries, and National Farm Workers Ministry; Encourage students to attend Bethel University and Memphis Theological Seminary; Support global and local mission opportunities.

E. PDMT

Leadership Referral Service (LRS) is an online application process for churches looking for a pastor and for pastors searching for a call. There are currently 31 CP churches and one CPCA congregation utilizing LRS for their pastor search. All pastors are encouraged to keep an updated Personal Information Form on file with LRS as well as post their resume within the online application. PDMT and MMT's Director of Congregational Ministries work together to provide leadership and support for LRS. The Opportunity List of open churches is posted on the website at *cpcmc.org/pdmt/opplist*. A monthly email is sent to ministers and probationers with an email address (approximately 750) listing churches in an active pastor search. The online application can be accessed at *cpcmc.org/pdmt/lrs*.

Clergy Crisis Fund is available to clergy in crisis and in need of support and care. Circumstances approved for benefits include death, medical bills, counseling, termination (one-time expenditure), and other considerations to be determined. Contact the PDMT Leader for more information.

2019 Pastors Retreats are monthly Sabbath retreats for CP clergy (including their family) free of charge. The 3-day retreats are held at Whitestone Country Inn in Kingston, Tennessee. All meals are included. These retreats are in partnership with the "Whosoever Will Bridge Ministry" at Bethel University and Memphis Theological Seminary. For more information, *cpcmc.org/2019-pastors-retreat*.

Ordination Travel Communion Sets are available to newly ordained CP pastors. PDMT also recognizes probationers as they progress through the ordination process with an appropriate book/resource. Each presbytery Committee on Ministry/Preparation is encouraged to contact PDMT for information on how to request these free gifts.

III. FUNDING

Since the inception of the "new structure" in 2007, the MC/MTs have shared in planning new and ongoing ministries. Each year the collegial environment has grown stronger, enabling the reality of a comprehensive budget. Funding sources include Our United Outreach (OUO), donations, grants, Investment Loan Program (ILP) and endowments (listed within Board of Stewardship section of the preliminary minutes). Endowments are an important part of our funding, though they do not generate usable funds until they reach sufficient size to generate interest payments that can be used. The MC ended fiscal year 2018 \$33,000 ahead of budget, in spite of economic downturns and culture shifts that adversely affected other charitable organizations and denominations worldwide. In addition to sound stewardship practices, last year 47% of MC/MT elected members and staff personally donated \$14,546 to the ongoing work of the MC and its many ministries. Experience and research show that personal giving by members works in at least three ways:

- It is a public declaration that the member has invested in the MC/MTs.
- It indicates that the member has a commitment to the organization and its mission.

• It encourages other donors to give and impresses institutions that provide grants or other support. Indeed, many major donors and foundations will not support an organization like the MC unless the board achieves 100% giving (*thebalancesmb.com/how-nonprofit-boards-make-a-difference-2502002*).

As the MC explores additional potential sources of revenue, we hope that first time and long-term donors will feel called to contribute, providing funds for current and future ministry.

IV. MINISTRY COUNCIL CONCLUSION

We are thankful for the sustaining guidance of the Holy Spirit as we work to enhance and implement ministries that draw people to Christ. We encourage 189th GA Commissioners and guests to visit the MC booth and the Ministry Exchange. We encourage you to pick up materials to share with your congregation, groups, and presbytery. MC/MT staff and elected members are eager to listen to your ideas and answer questions.

Not unlike other denominations, ours is an aging denomination. We yearn to see CPs of all generations serving in leadership roles throughout the Church. We yearn for CPs everywhere to commit to sharing actively in the work of the Church, for leaders to rise up from across the globe to further the work of the Church around the world.

The 52 MC/MT elected and advisory members and 17 staff members are committed to serving God through the CPC and ask that the Church remain in prayer for our collaborative work as both staff and elected members proactively serve as conduits of information *to and from* the MC. II. FINANCIAL FOUNDATION DEVELOPMENT AND MANAGEMENT

A. PURPOSE

One area of work of the board is in financial foundation development and management. The purpose of this program is as follows:

To secure a firm financial undergirding for the ongoing ministry of congregations and the agencies of presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly as they bear witness to the saving love of God, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the fellowship and communion of the Holy Spirit.

THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

B. 2018 IN REVIEW

In 2018, both domestic and international markets were volatile. U. S. stocks were up 2.6% as of the end of June 2018. The S&P 500 gained 7.7% in the third quarter. However, the fourth quarter wiped out all the gains and then some, declining 13.5% in the fourth quarter. Developed markets closed the year down 15-20% while emerging markets ended the year down over 14%. Bond markets didn't offer much of a return either, basically ending the year where they started. The slow down in the global economy and the tightening U.S. monetary policy was cause for concern.

The fourth quarter was a reminder of how quickly markets can change direction after long periods of generating above average returns. That is why it is important to be diversified and remain calm during times of market volatility.

The activity in the Cumberland Presbyterian Endowment Fund, Retirement Fund and the Investment Loan Program reflected the volatility of the markets. One example was the performance of the endowment fund. At the end of June 2018, we saw a gain of 3.5% for the first six months but the fund ended 2018 with a loss of 2.5%. The Endowment Fund and the Retirement Fund are diversified portfolios which is an effective strategy during times of market volatility.

We are confident that our investment manager, Gerber/Taylor can continue to help us navigate the turbulent ups and downs of the market. Since October 1981, Gerber/Taylor has done a wonderful job for the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

C. BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

The Board of Stewardship ended 2018 with a loss of \$133,676 as a result of decreased earnings in the endowment fund and the investment loan program. We are ever mindful of expenses incurred and try to be good stewards of what has been entrusted to the Board. We are grateful for the faithful support from congregations and individuals through their contributions to Our United Outreach.

D. MANAGEMENT OF FUNDS

At the end of 2018 the Endowment Fund portfolio was under the co-management of Gerber/Taylor Management, RREEF America II, Clarion, Tortoise, Headlands Capital and Eagle MLP. The funds of the Retirement Program were co-managed by Gerber/Taylor Management, RREEF America II, Tortoise, Headlands Capital and Eagle MLP.

The church loan portion of the endowment portion of the endowment portfolio and the investments of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church Investment Loan Program, Inc. were under the management of board staff with the help of Stifel Nicholas.

III. ENDOWMENT PROGRAM

Since 1836, the board and its corporate predecessors have sought to be faithful trustees of the funds given into their hands to provide a permanent financial foundation for the work of congregations, presbyteries, synods, and General Assembly agencies. The work of the Endowment Program is the oldest responsibility of the board and fulfills a portion of that task to which all Cumberland Presbyterians are called: "Christian stewardship acknowledges that all of life and creation is a trust from God, to be used for God's glory and service."—*Confession of Faith for Cumberland Presbyterians 6:10.*

A. COMMUNICATION

The Endowment Program report will be distributed to all endowment program participants, general assembly board members, churches, and individual contributors.

Agencies, other participants, and interested parties received quarterly detailed reports on the postings to all their endowments. With the addition of names supplied by the agencies during the year, the number of persons receiving these reports continues to expand. In addition, special reports were made as requested.

B. ASSETS, INVESTMENT MIX, AND PERFORMANCE

1. Assets and Investment Mix

The assets of the Endowment Fund totaled \$56,505,941 for 2018 at *market value*. The following table provides a breakdown of the investment mix:

2. Performance of the Endowment Fund

The Endowment Fund generated a loss of \$1,369,084 in investment earnings during 2018. Net contributions and withdrawals (including income distributions) were a negative \$1,324,100.

Since January 2013, we have begun paying out 5% (annualized) to the congregations, presbyteries and agencies. Previously agencies had difficulty in preparing budgets because of the unknown amount they would receive from endowment income. Now, they can better estimate the endowment income they will receive Endowment income paid to congregations, presbyteries and agencies totaled \$2,056,976 for 2018.

D. ENDOWMENT PROGRAM LOANS

Historical Review

Through investing up to 40% of the assets of the Endowment Program in the witness of the Church, the message of good news concerning Christ is strengthened both in the United States and overseas. A survey of old files in the Historical Foundation and in the vault of the Board of Stewardship reveals the important role played by this aspect of the investment policy. Over the past sixty-five years from 1944 to 2009, 841 loans were made to congregations, presbyteries, and synods. From 2010 through 2018 an additional 17 loans have been made. Through these loans, \$42,714,405 has been provided in financing for expansion of facilities and extension of witness.

A look at the different periods during which loans have been made provides a picture of growing endowments (and of post-World War II inflation!).

While looking at the table, it should be noted that the Cumberland Presbyterian Church Investment Loan Program began January 1, 2001. Since its creation most of the larger loans are made through the Investment Loan Program. At the end of the year the Endowment Loan Balance was \$1,720,549.

Down through the years, donors to endowments have found satisfaction in the knowledge that the prudent investment of their gifts strengthened not only the work of particular churches, institutions, and causes which they designated to receive the income but also the broader witness of the Church.

E. OTHER CHURCH LOANS

In addition to loans from the Investment Loan Program and the Endowment Program there is another source available to the board for loans to churches.

1. Small Church Loan Fund

This fund, formerly known as the Revolving Church Loan Fund, was created through an endowment established by Lavenia Cole and gifts to the "Into the Nineties" Capital Gifts Campaign. All interest earned by the loans is added to the fund to increase the amount available for loans. There were five loans from the Small Church Loan Program at the end of 2018 totaling \$112,353.

The rate of interest for the Small Church Loans made during 2018 was based on the loan rate established by the Cumberland Presbyterian Church Investment Loan Program at the beginning of each quarter. These loans are generally small loans of \$70,000 or less and most are amortized over five years.

IV. CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH INVESTMENT LOAN PROGRAM, INC.

In 1976, the board began a program to provide an opportunity for flexible investment of current temporary cash assets of congregations and agencies of the church. The primary purpose of the program is to provide income to participants as a foundation for ministry. On January 1, 2001, the assets of the original program, Cash Funds Management, were transferred to the new Cumberland Presbyterian Church Investment Loan Program, Inc.

For the year ending 2018, the assets for the Investment Loan Program were \$26,115,421 compared to \$25,608,257 in 2017. There were 324 individual, congregation and agency accounts. At year end, deposits on account totaled \$17,461,773. The total loans were \$6,753,862 at year end.

For 2018, the corporation complied with the regulatory requirements in the states of Tennessee and Kentucky and was able to offer investment opportunities to individual Cumberland Presbyterians in the states of Tennessee, Kentucky, Texas, Missouri and New Mexico.

The board of directors is composed of the following: Mike St. John, president; Jim Shannon, vicepresident and Debbie Shelton, secretary, and Gary Tubb. Robert Heflin serves as Treasurer and Executive Secretary. During the past year, the board met twice in regular session.

In order to simplify administration and focus on the strengths of the Investment Loan Program, the board took action to limit the offering of notes and depository accounts to "ready access accounts." All note holders (individuals) and depository account holders (churches and church agencies) with funds invested in these "on demand" accounts participated in the \$618,348 which the program paid in interest. For 2017 the interest rate paid to account holders was 2.75%. The interest rate paid to account holders can fluctuate from one quarter to the next. In recent years there has been renewed interest for congregations to open new accounts because the interest paid is higher than current CD rates.

The table below provides a breakdown of the investment mix.

At the end of 2018 there were 20 loans to congregations made through the Investment Loan Program. The loan balance was \$6,753,862. Every accountholder is investing in the future ministry of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church as well as receiving interest on their investment.

V. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS ADMINISTRATION AND RESEARCH

A. PURPOSE

The second of two broad areas of the work of the board is in employee benefits administration and research. The purpose of this program is as follows:

To support the lay and ordained employees of the church as they venture to be faithful under the call of Christ and the Church to the daily demands of providing leadership to congregations and Church agencies whom are the incarnation of the Body of Christ, the family of God at work in the world.

B. VISION

The board has a vision of uniform benefits for all Cumberland Presbyterian clergy, including group health insurance, group long-term disability coverage, and participation in the General Assembly's retirement plan. Ministers would then know what to expect when they are called to another church. No longer would some ministers have to do without what is considered in the secular world to be basic employee benefits. No longer would ministers and their families have to settle for being relegated to second class status. The reality is, as several General Assemblies have recognized, that this is possible if we work together in much the same manner that we send out missionaries and do a lot of other ministry. Good employee benefit plans are in place and they would be healthier and stronger if used and supported by all employees of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

VI. RETIREMENT PROGRAM

Since 1952, the board has provided a retirement program open to all church employees of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The program gives opportunity for churches and their employees to provide a source of retirement income based on voluntary contributions. In 1987, a new Cumberland Presbyterian Retirement Plan No. 2 was established as a qualified 403(b) defined contribution plan and in 1990 the General Assembly amended the plan to include the churches and employees of the Second Cumberland Presbyterian Church, now known as the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America.

A. PLAN AMENDMENTS

As new needs arise or deficiencies in the original plan document for Cumberland Presbyterian Retirement Plan No. 2 become apparent, the General Assembly has the authority under Article IX Section 9.01 of the Plan to amend the same. In 2012 a revised plan document was approved by the General Assembly. Recently the IRS has adopted a pre-approved program for 403(b) plans, thus in 2018 the plan was restated to take advantage of the new regulations. At this time we are also able to make updates to the plan. The only update made, was the ability to contribute up to the IRS deferral limit each year. In 2019, this amount is \$19,000 and may change in the coming years with no need to amend the plan.

B. YEAR END REPORT

On December 31, 2018, there were 306 active participants in the Retirement Plan. There were 18 receiving direct monthly payments as a result of their elections. In addition to these participants, there were 10 persons who were receiving annuity payments purchased through the Plan and for whom the Plan issues 1099-R's.

During 2018, \$1,332,792 was dispersed to or for participants, a decrease of 18.7% over 2017s \$1,638,563. Contributions totaled \$704,541 and were down 11.8 % over 2017s \$799,189. Realized and unrealized loss on investments totaled \$694,389 compared to 2017 gain of \$2,736,328. The rate of return credited to the accounts for the year was -3.1% compared to 12.5% for 2017. (Comparative annual rates of return for: previous three years +5.3%, previous five years +4.1%, and from the beginning of professional management in March 1982, +9.1%.)

Effective January 1, 2011, Gerber/Taylor Management was retained to manage our stock portfolio. We have continued our relationship with Met West, a bond manager, and RREEF, a private real estate investment trust manager. Matt Robbins and Stacy Miller of Gerber/Taylor continue to be very helpful with keeping the board updated on market conditions and investment strategies.

VII. MINISTERIAL AID PROGRAM

A. MINISTERIAL AID

1. Full Benefit Recipients

As of March 2019, there are 5 Cumberland Presbyterian Church recipients of the full benefit of \$546 (adjusted for inflation yearly) per month (increased from \$300 on July 1, 2010), and 3 that receive partial benefits due to them having more income than the threshold established. The monthly total of these payments is \$3,622; annually, \$43,464 is paid. Beginning May 1, 2015, the method of distributing funds to overseas presbyteries was revised with the help of the Missions ministry team. Ministerial aid will now be offered in overseas presbyteries on an individual basis. Presently there are 7 recipients in Cauca Valley Presbytery and 5 recipients in Andes Presbytery that are receiving aid in the amount of \$300 a month, for a total of \$3,600 a month or \$43,200 annually.

In October 2005, the board decided to distribute 75% of the previous year's surplus to the state side recipients. The Board of Stewardship has approved a cap of a maximum of \$4,000 in lieu of large distributions that may have a negative effect on other benefits received, such as SSI, or state assistance.

2. Basic Requirements. The new basic requirements and amount for stateside recipients for the Ministerial Aid program were approved at the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in June 2010. The poverty levels have been updated to the latest available figures. They are as follows:

Full Benefit of \$546 a month for State Side Recipients

- 1. Minimum age is full retirement age set forth by the Social Security Administration.
- 2. Minimum years of service to the church 15.
- 3. Can qualify for aid if a participant in the Cumberland Presbyterian Retirement Plan if income is below poverty level as established by the US Census Bureau.
- 4. Physical and/or mental disability (doctor's statement required) at any age, however, a minimum of ten years of service is required if less than 60 years of age.
- 5. Individuals' income cannot exceed federal poverty guidelines set forth for the year by the US Census Bureau. Poverty level is \$12,490 a year or \$1,040.83 a month for 2019.
- 6. Couples income cannot exceed federal poverty guidelines set forth for the year by the US Census Bureau. Poverty level is \$16,910 a year or \$1,409.17 a month for 2019.
 (The GA Board of Stewardship is authorized to look at each case in light of unusual financial hardship; thus, application may be made even if income levels exceed the ceiling.)
- 7. Presbytery obtains information and approves (approval can be given by the committee or board charged by presbytery with this responsibility); certification of approval is sent to the General Assembly Board of Stewardship.
- 8. Surviving spouse is eligible if above items 2, 3 and 4 have been met.
- **Note: Recipient is responsible to verify if receiving Ministerial Aid would affect his or her SSI, Social Security or other benefits.

Cumberland Presbyterian Church applicants must submit to the Board a listing of assets and liabilities, so the net worth can be determined. The board urges presbyteries to maintain contact with persons under the Ministerial Aid Program who live within their bounds. Should there be serious unmet needs, the presbytery is urged to contact the board so that it may determine how the Ministerial Aid program can be of assistance in meeting those needs.

3. Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America. The CPCA currently has 3 participants who receive monthly payments. On June 1, 2015, the aid amount increased from \$109 a month to \$510 a month and the CPCA contributes 50% of the yearly aid and the CP Ministerial Aid Endowments 50%. The current amount received monthly per participant is \$546. The CPCA normally pays its share in June or July following their General Assembly.

4. Ministers in Overseas Presbyteries. Since May 1, 2015, with the help of the Missions Ministry Team, Aid is available to those in overseas presbyteries who qualify on an individual basis. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church is present in 13 different countries and each country presents its unique legislation of how they manage pension plans according to laws and standards for salaries. The Mission Ministry Team will be the liaison between the Board of Stewardship and the Presbyteries outside of the United States aiding the Board in identifying the needs overseas and interpreting pension laws and standards for salaries. At present, aid is being sent to the Cauca Valley Presbytery and Andes Presbytery in Colombia, South America.

B. SPECIAL FINANCIAL NEEDS AID

At the Spring 2014 Board of Stewardship meeting, the Board approved the use of funds from the Ministerial Aid Cash Fund ILP to be used in special situations where illness has caused a financial hardship for those that are not eligible for Ministerial Aid. At present there are eight individuals who have received payments.

VIII. INSURANCE PROGRAMS

The insurance programs of the board have been assigned by the General Assembly beginning in the middle of the previous century. Dental and Vision Insurance is the newest, begun in December 2008. Property and casualty insurance is the oldest, begun in 1951. While all of the insurance programs are important, group life and health insurance, begun in 1961, touches many lives in a personal way and often at times of deep anxiety. In all, about 179 men, women, and children depend on this program to meet their health care needs.

THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

A. PROPERTY & CASUALTY INSURANCE

The Board of Stewardship, Foundation and Benefits secures property and casualty insurance coverage against accidental loss for the General Assembly Corporation, Board of Stewardship, Discipleship Ministry Team, Missions Ministry Team, Ministry Council, Communications Ministry Team, Pastoral Development Ministry Team, Memphis Theological Seminary, and Historical Foundation.

Our broker is Lipscomb & Pitts of Memphis, Tennessee. For 2019, Travelers Insurance carries our Property & Casualty policy and \$2,500,000 in earth quake coverage, Mt. Hawley Insurance Company provides an additional \$16,120,473 in earthquake coverage. Philadelphia carries our Directors & Officers coverage and Hanover carries our General Liability, Professional Liability, Crime, Automobile, and Umbrella policies. Beginning October 23, 2014, Workers Compensation coverage has been with Bridgefield Casualty.

B. GROUP LONG TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE

The presbyteries of Arkansas, Columbia, Covenant, Cumberland, del Cristo, East Tennessee, Missouri, Murfreesboro, Nashville, North Central, Red River, Robert Donnell, Trinity, West Tennessee and The Center have now established non-contributory long term disability programs insured currently through Cigna. This leaves only four stateside presbyteries (Choctaw, Hope, Grace and Tennessee Georgia) without a program. The quarterly rate applied to participant's salaries is .45 per \$100 of salary.

There are three primary reasons for ministers to want the coverage and for presbyteries to want to provide the protection. The group rate is significantly lower than individual policy rates and does not require a large cash outlay to cover all full-time ministers in a presbytery; housing allowance and/ or the fair rental value of a manse is included in the definition of salary for ministers; and, there is no medical qualification requirement in order to enroll. These advantages over individual policies make this coverage very attractive, especially to those who have previously purchased their own policies. In addition, a provision was negotiated with Cigna by the Board's consultant, whereby ministers, upon leaving a participating presbytery to serve in a non-participating presbytery, may continue the coverage if he or she so desires. The new employing church is then billed for the quarterly premium. There are now 10 ministers and two employees who are receiving or have received benefits from this insurance program. There are 167 participants as of January 1, 2019.

C. GROUP TRAVEL ACCIDENT INSURANCE

This policy provides twenty-four hour coverage on "named employees" for accidental death, dismemberment, or loss of sight while on business travel. The maximum benefit is \$50,000 and there is also a \$1,000 medical benefit. The annual premium is \$900. We renew this policy every 3 years. Thirty-one named positions are covered under this policy.

D. GROUP HEALTH & LIFE INSURANCE

The board has used a fully-insured, managed care approach to provide group health insurance for Cumberland Presbyterian clergy and lay employees since March 1, 1999. Blue Cross / Blue Shield of Tennessee is our insurance carrier in 2019. In 2016, the group plan was split into 4 separate community rated groups which provided more competitive rates. For 2019, the plans premiums were flat after an increase in the deductible amounts. Lipscomb & Pitts, a Memphis based insurance company, is our insurance broker, and Craig Wright, our agent.

1. Premiums.

Efforts to maintain affordable premiums and comprehensive coverage are the biggest challenges we face. Premiums for 2018 are listed below and reflect the assistance from the Premium Stabilization Reserve. The goal for 2019 is to utilize approximately \$140,633 from the Premiums Stabilization Reserve to help reduce the premiums participants pay for health insurance. In 2018 we utilized \$154,583.96 from the Premium Stabilization Reserve.

The Health Plans are on a calendar year as far as deductible and pricing is concerned. It is our objective with the new community rated plans to have the renewal pricing by no later than October 1, so presbyteries and agencies can have the figures for their fall meetings and better plan their budgets for the coming year. Periodically we seek bids from other carriers in an effort to keep premiums competitive. When this is done, we may not have the new premium information by October 1.

Open enrollment period is the month of December. It is during this time that an employee can enroll or change their health insurance coverage unless there are special circumstances.

2. Participation.

As of February 1, 2019, 109 employees and 70 dependents for a total of 179 people depend on the Cumberland Presbyterian Church Health Insurance Program. A breakdown of family units by size at February 1, 2019 is listed below.

3. Premium Stabilization Reserve (Formerly Emergency Reserve)

The Premium Stabilization Reserve is invested in the Endowment Program Fund account which had a balance of \$1,791,320 as of December 31, 2018. The Emergency Health Insurance Reserve was established in compliance with the 1992 General Assembly directive to be used in "emergency" situations to match presbyterial emergency fund disbursements. The 1998 General Assembly approved the Board's recommendation to allow the Board to use the Emergency Reserve to maintain the stability of the group health and life insurance plan. This allows these funds to be used for purposes outside of the original scope of the reserve. In 2018, the Board of Stewardship used \$154,584 to help offset some of the cost of the health insurance premiums and have estimated that approximately \$140,633 will be used in 2019 to help in reducing premiums for the health insurance participants.

4. Dental and Vision Insurance

2019

On December 1, 2008, we began offering Dental and Vision insurance, on a voluntary basis, for anyone working at least 30 hours or more for any Cumberland Presbyterian Church, its agencies, boards, and institutions. Peter Whitely is the agent of record. At present there are 71 participating employees.

5. Jessie W. Hipsher Health Insurance Endowment

The Jesse W. Hipsher Health Insurance Endowment was created as the first step in the board's goal to raise \$10,000,000 in endowments for the support of the Cumberland Presbyterian Health and Life Insurance Program. The endowment was established on March 6, 2004. At its establishment \$11,450 had been raised. The balance of the endowment as of December 31, 2018 was \$46,624.

6. Health Education / E-Mail Newsletter

To further educate participants in matters concerning healthcare, participants receive a monthly e-newsletter entitled, *TopHealth*, published by Oakstone Publishing. The monthly e-newsletter is full of health related tips that can be easily implemented by readers. The two page newsletter can be read within a matter of minutes. Also initiated in 2008 is the E-Mail newsletter that is designed as an information tool to help the participants of the Health and Retirement programs stay on top of happenings within the Board of Stewardship.

7. Wellness Program

Blue Cross offers a Preventive Health Guide and the Blue 365 discount program for a range of item from fitness, healthy eating, personal care and wellness and even information on financial health. Also offered are the Nurse chat 24/7/365 and Physician Now where you can speak to a physician on call.

THE REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL FOUNDATION

I. GENERAL INFORMATION

A. OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

The officers of the board are as follows: Pat Ward, president; Rev. Mary Kathryn Kirkpatrick, vicepresident; and Michael Fare, secretary. Susan Knight Gore is the director and treasurer of the Historical Library and Archives.

B. BOARD REPRESENTATIVES TO THE CPC & CPCA GENERAL ASSEMBLIES

The board's representative to the 189th General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the 144th General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America is Pat Ward. The alternate is Jackie Cooper.

C. MEMBERSHIP AND MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

The board is currently composed of the following members: from the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America—Jackie Cooper, Dorothy Hayden, Rev. Joe Howard III, Willie Lynk, and Pat Ward, from the Cumberland Presbyterian Church—Michael Fare, Robin McCaskey Hughes, Rev. Mary Kathryn Kirkpatrick, Ashley Lindsey, Lisa Oliver, and Kelly Shanton.

The Board of Trustees met, September 15, 2018, and February 22, 2019.

D. MEMBERS WHOSE TERMS EXPIRE

The first terms of Robin Hughes and Ashley Lindsey expire with the 2019 meeting of the Cumberland Presbyterian General Assembly, and they are eligible for reelection. The third term of Mary Kathryn Kirkpatrick expires with the 2019 meeting of the Cumberland Presbyterian General Assembly, and she is not eligible for reelection.

The first term of Willie Lynk expires with the 2019 meeting of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America General Assembly, and he is eligible for reelection.

E. STAFF

Susan Knight Gore serves as the Archivist of the Historical Foundation. Missy Rose is the archival assistant for the Foundation.

II. ASSEMBLY REPORTING

As a matter of official structure, relative to the CPC, there is a Board of Trustees composed of members from both the CPC and CPCA, and relative to the CPCA, there is a committee composed of members from the CPCA.

III. PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

A. HISTORY INTERPRETATION AND PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES

1. The 1810/1874 Circle

In order to enlist the financial support of interested members of our churches in the work of the Foundation, the 1810/1874 Circle was created. Membership is based on a financial contribution of \$25 or more per year. Income through such gifts enables the Foundation to meet expenditures and is vital to the continued work of the Foundation.

We appreciate the support given to the Foundation by all members of the 1810/1874 Circle and encourage other members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America to join this donor group.

2. Patrons

Persons who contribute \$100 or more to one of the endowments of the Historical Foundation become patron members and receive a certificate. Patron memberships may also be given in honor or in memory of an individual.

3. Heritage Churches

Congregations contributing a minimum of \$1,000 to an endowment of the Historical Foundation become Heritage Churches and receive a framed certificate. There are six categories of recognition and churches can move from one level to another.

4. Presbyterial Heritage Committees/Presbyterial Historians

To promote interest in the work of the Foundation and to nurture work in history on the presbyterial level, the Historical Foundation seeks to work cooperatively with the Presbyterial Heritage Committees/ Presbyterial Historians of both general assemblies. The brochure, *Suggestions for Heritage Committees and Presbyterial Historians*, is available from the Foundation. The board expresses its appreciation to the presbyteries that have Heritage Committees/Presbyterial Historians.

5. Denomination Day Offering

The 2019 Denomination Day Offering was designated to fund the conversion of fragile and deteriorating analogue media to digital formats in order that it might better be preserved.

The Foundation expresses appreciation to congregations and others groups who received special offerings for the work of the Historical Foundation on Denomination Day. This special offering provides an opportunity for congregations to directly contribute to the support of the Historical Foundation as well as the Foundation supplying educational materials to each congregation.

C. HISTORICAL FOUNDATION AWARDS

1. Award in Cumberland Presbyterian History

The Foundation encourages the writing and publication of papers on all aspects of the history of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. One means of promoting such writing is the Historical Foundation Award in Cumberland Presbyterian History. A \$300 prize is awarded to the author entering the best paper on any CPC or CPCA history subject which meets in form and content the requirements set by the Board of Trustees and judged by the board appointed awards committee. All manuscripts submitted to the competition become property of the Foundation and are added to the Historical Library and Archives.

The contest follows the calendar year, and entries for the 2019 competition are encouraged. All entries will be accepted through December 2019 for this year's contest. Any entries received following the deadline of December 31st will be automatically entered in the 2020 competition.

Guidelines and entry forms for submitting manuscripts to the competition are available from the Foundation office as well as on the internet, http://www.cumberland.org/hfcpc/Awards.htm. The Historical Foundation appreciates the participation of past and future CPCA and CP historians in this program.

2. Awards of Recognition

Awards of recognition are certificates given to organizations or individuals in recognition of historic events or contributions to the preservation of our heritage as Cumberland Presbyterians. Appropriate applications for the award are: particular churches celebrating anniversaries of their organization; any judicatory or agency celebrating publication of a written history; celebrations of history or historic event in a creative or unusual manner; individuals who have provided continued service for 50 years or more as members of a local congregation or presbytery; individuals who have served for 40 years or more in a continuing leadership role (including pastors) within a local church. Individuals, churches, or presbyterial heritage committees may make application for the issuing of an award by contacting the Foundation office. Presbyterian Historical Society of the Southwest

The Presbyterian Historical Society of the Southwest is an agency of The Synod of the Sun, Presbyterian Church (USA) and Cumberland Presbyterian Churches in Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas. Members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church who serve on the board of this organization are Reverend Norlan Scrudder, Reverend Perryn Rice, and Doctor Rose Mary Magrill.

IV. HISTORICAL LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES

A. RESEARCH SERVICE

The Foundation's main research commitment is to the agencies, local congregations, and members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Churches. Since the Historical Library and Archives of the Historical Foundation serves as the official repository for the Cumberland Presbyterian General Assemblies, this is our focus. Although the separation of research into two types designated by their mode of access has been rapid and dramatic, both the traditional and "cyber" mode contribute to and enhance the other.

1. Traditional/Physical Access

Hands on access to primary source material remains the vital heart of historic and theological research. Rather than being diminished by increased electronic resources, traditional research has broadened due to heightened awareness of primary sources in an expanding information age. The Foundation receives research requests by personal visitors, mail, e-mail, and telephone. As time permits, requests are researched. Responses are sent to the requestor, as well as pertinent information on ministers, congregations, presbyteries and synods being placed on our website for future researchers.

2. Electronic Access

The Foundation's website continues to expand in order to provide greater access to the materials in the Historical Library and Archives. As well as being a research tool, the internet provides an invaluable and inexpensive means of promotion for the physical collections of the Historical Library and Archives, the activities of the Historical Foundation, and for the greater community of faith called Cumberland Presbyterians. Information at the site includes: general information about the Foundation, entire texts of important historical documents, historical information on particular congregations, ministers, presbyteries, and synods. Beginning in 2018, the Foundation added a YouTube Channel for historic films documenting the faith-life of Cumberland Presbyterians. B. ACQUISITIONS

The Historical Library and Archives regularly receives items published by the two denominations, *Minutes of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Preliminary Minutes of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Yearbook of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, The Cumberland Presbyterian, Missionary Messenger, Minutes of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, Preliminary Minutes of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, Preliminary Minutes of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, and The Cumberland Flag.* Synods and presbyteries deposit four copies of their printed minutes in the Historical Library and Archives. In addition, books, pamphlets, theses, dissertations, records and publications of general assembly, boards, agencies, institutions, and task forces; records and publications of synods and presbyteries, session records and other materials of particular churches, biographical material of Cumberland Presbyterian and Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America ministers, photographs, audiovisual materials, and museum items were among the accessions received. The 2018 Accession List closed with 124 accession groups.

In all judicatories, from the session of the congregation through presbytery, synod, and the General Assemblies of both the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, minutes form the legal record of the judicatory. Without these records there is often nothing to document persons joining the church, ordination as elder and clergy, disciplinary actions, etc. It is important to be aware that legally original minutes are always the property of the judicatory for which they are created. Should that judicatory cease to exist, the next higher judicatory becomes custodian responsible for securing and preserving the records of the extinct body. It can be difficult to convince persons that records kept by their relative are not family property but the General Assemblies of both denominations have ruled the only legal repository for the records of extinct judicatories is the Historical Foundation.

RECOMMENDATION 1: That the General Assembly instruct presbyteries to obtain the session records of a congregation at the time the church is closed and then deposit them in the Historical Foundation.

V. BIRTHPLACE SHRINE

The Birthplace Shrine located at Montgomery Bell State Park near Dickson, Tennessee was dedicated June 18, 1960. This site consists of the Memorial Chapel and a replica of the Reverend Samuel McAdow's log house. Since 1994, the Foundation has been responsible for the preservation and promotion of the Birthplace Shrine. Four endowments provide funds for maintenance and repairs: the Grace Johnson Beasley Birthplace Shrine Fund, the Birthplace Shrine Fund, the Henry Evan Harper Endowment for Cumberland Presbyterian History, and the P.F. Johnson Memorial Endowment. Gifts to these endowments provide for the continued preservation of the Birthplace Shrine. Interested donors are encouraged to contact the Foundation office. Another means of support are the fees collected from couples who use the chapel for their wedding ceremony. These funds are added to the Birthplace Shrine Fund and earnings are used for maintenance and special projects. The Board encourages individuals and groups to visit the Birthplace Shrine as an act of remembering our heritage and envisioning our future as Cumberland Presbyterians.

Recognizing the recognition and visibility that the Birthplace Shrine provides for the Cumberland Presbyterian denominations, the Foundation both sponsors and regularly participates in three activities at the Birthplace: Denomination Day, Easter Sunrise Service, and Christmas at the Bell. Both the Denomination Day and Christmas at the Bell events are costume re-enactments which interactively interpret denominational history for both Cumberland Presbyterians and other park visitors.

Groups and individuals are encouraged to contact the Foundation to set up work days and special projects. The Foundation thanks the Heritage Committee of Nashville Presbytery and the Charlotte Cumberland Presbyterian Church for their continuing volunteer upkeep of the property.

THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF MEMPHIS THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Introduction

Memphis Theological Seminary is the only seminary of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Our history is traced back through the Cumberland Presbyterian Theological Seminary in McKenzie to the organization of the graduate School of Theology at Cumberland University and the Theological Department at Bethel College, both of which began in 1852. Those two schools of theology continued the legacy begun in the work of founder Reverend Finis Ewing, who educated candidates for the ministry in his home, and many other ministers, who trained young candidates in homes, churches, and on the trail. For one hundred sixty-six years, Cumberland Presbyterians have been providing formal theological education for the church's ministers. For two hundred years, the Cumberland Presbyterian Church has valued the importance of an educated ministry.

With the denomination's decision to move its seminary to Memphis in 1964, Memphis Theological Seminary of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church began to serve a larger and more diverse student body. Though students from other denominations were admitted during the McKenzie years, the move to a major metropolitan area opened the opportunity to attract more students from more denominations. Today, Memphis Theological Seminary has one of the most diverse student populations, in terms of denomination and race, of any seminary in the United States. This theological and denominational diversity provides a rich environment for educating pastors, chaplains, Christian educators, and other leaders for the church of Jesus Christ. The sign on our campus that faces Union Avenue reads: "Memphis Theological Seminary: an Ecumenical Mission of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church." Every Cumberland Presbyterian can be proud of the mission our seminary fulfills of educating our own church leaders, and leaders from more than 25 other denominations.

We, the trustees and administration of Memphis Theological Seminary, are privileged to be a part of this legacy, born out of and guided by the ecumenical and evangelical spirit of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. We look forward to what God has in store for our ministry in the future. With gratitude for God's grace, guidance and provision in the past year, we make the following report to the 188th General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, meeting June 9-14, 2019, in Huntsville, Alabama.

I. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

A. OFFICERS

The following officers were elected by the Board to serve during the past year:

• 2018 Vice-Moderator to Moderator - Reverend Nancy Cole (United Methodist, North Alabama Conference) Reverend Cole assumed the Board chair following the resignation of the Reverend Jennifer Newell (Cumberland Presbyterian, Chattanooga, Tennessee) and was elected Moderator in May 2018.

• **2018 Vice-Moderator** - Reverend Anne Hames (Cumberland Presbyterian, McKenzie Tennessee) served as Vice-Moderator of the Board, through May 2018, until the election of Nancy Cole as Moderator and Reverend Jimmy Mosby (who came on the MTS Board in June 2017) as Vice Moderator in May 2018.

• 2018-19 Secretary - Mrs. Sondra Roddy (Cumberland Presbyterian, Lexington, Kentucky)

• 2018-19 Treasurer - Mrs. Cassandra Price-Perry (VP of Operations/CFO,MTS)

• **2019 Vice-Moderator** - Reverend Jimmy Mosby (United Methodist Minister, Arkansas Conference) served as Vice-Moderator of the Board from May of 2018 - Feb.2019.

C. MEETINGS

The Board met twice since the 2018 General Assembly: October 11, 2018 and February 8, 2019. The Board is scheduled to meet on May I 0, 2019. By rule of the General Assembly, thirteen of the twenty-four members are representatives of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The remaining trustees are ecumenical partners, currently United Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian Church (USA) representatives.

D. EXPIRATION OF TERMS

The trustees who are eligiblet o succeed themselves and have agreed to serve another three year term on the MTS Board are:

Following the resignations after the 2018 General Assembly of trustees Reverend Linda Howell (Cumberland Presbyterian, Keller, Texas) and Reverend Susan Parker (Cumberland Presbyterian, Rogersville, Alabama), and in keeping with the General Assembly requirement that a majority of the twenty-four member Board represent the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, the following Cumberland Presbyterian trustees were elected by the CP Corporate Board to serve the unexpired terms of Howell and Parker.

E. UPDATE ONLEADERSHIP

In July 2018 the Board accepted the resignation of President Reverend Jay Earheart-Brown after thirteen years of servant leadership. On August 1 Reverend Susan Parker accepted the call to be the Interim President. Susan was serving on the Board in her fifth year of service. Her background is in higher education as a Vice President of Advancement at Athens State University. She also served in two statewide elected offices in Alabama: State Auditor 1998-2002 and Public Service Commissioner 2006-2010. Susan completed the Program of Alternate Studies in 2014 and in April 2014 was ordained as a Cumberland Presbyterian minister at Rogersville Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Rogersville, Alabama. She served various CP churches as Interim and Stated Supply from 2014-2018. She still serves as Moderator and preaches once per month at two CP churches in Lauderdale County, Alabama.

2019 THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

At the October board meeting, Susan stated, "It is a tremendous honor to be selected to fill this important role at a critical time of change at the Seminary. The board, faculty, staff, students and alumni have made me feel welcome and appreciated. One of my favorite things about serving at MTS is the mission of the institution expressed on the sign at the entrance that reads, 'Memphis Theological Seminary an ecumenical mission of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church'. I realize that it is likely the founders had no idea just how diverse and ecumenical the seminary would become; now serving over twenty different denominations. I believe it is testament to the love of God by CP's to be so welcoming to all of God's children.

F. PRIORITIES

The Board has reviewed and adopted the Strategic Plan but is still in the process of revising and enhancing this plan and the measurements of success. Four major priorities of the plan are:

1. Strengthen our integration of Scholarship, Piety and Justice in our administrative and educational support units and Board Governance as well as our degree programs. When we had our site visits from ATS and SACS-COC last year we were made aware that our strategic planning, ourcurriculum, and our administrative work did not flow from and draw upon our mission statement in a consistent manner. Our Quality Enhancement Plan for SACS-COC is dedicated to developing greater awareness and integration of scholarship, piety, and justice among our students. But we need to do similar work across the institution to make sure not only students, but also faculty, staff, and Board members are formed in and share the mission of the institution. Further, we need to draw upon that mission to shape how we live out our mission statement in every dimension of our institutional life, so that the integration of scholarship, piety, and justice is a shared goal for the work of the institution.

2. Ensure financial sustainability. We have relied heavily upon tuition and annual fund raising for our financial operation as an institution. SACS COC saw a number of issues related to our financial situation and placed MTS on "warning" status. We need a more secure basis for the operations of the seminary so that we are not as dependent upon tuition and the annual fund to have a balanced budget. Endowment dollars for scholarships, faculty chairs, and other programs are necessary for the financial sustainability of the Seminary. Such financial sustainability is a basic need for the Seminary to carry out its mission.

3. Create partnerships with other institutions and organizations to expand our academic offerings for both traditional and on-line delivery. In response to enrollment challenges and the shifting needs of both churches and the larger society for theological education, MTS sees the need to expand beyond its traditional academic programs to develop new ways for those to be delivered and to develop new programs that address church and societal needs. Our location in Memphis, Tennessee is an asset we need to build upon. We can partner with other educational institutions, large churches, as well as hospitals and non-profits associated with a faith community. We recognize numerous opportunities to collaborate with different kinds of institutions to broaden our scope as we meet the needs for theological education that is responsive to these various settings. We also recognize the need to continue to expand and develop our on-line offerings so that we can be flexible in addressing people from a variety of settings.

4. Create a culture of assessment that relates to strategic planning. Prior to our recent reaccreditation we recognized we had not created a robust and viable program of assessment of our academic programs. We began that work prior to the reaccreditation visits, but both SACS-COC and ATS saw our need to fine tune those efforts and continue to integrate them into overall academic and institutional planning. At the same time, assessment of every aspect of our shared work at MTS in relation to strategic planning for the whole institution was flagged as a weakness by the accrediting organizations, and our strategic planning has been very inadequate. To create a culture of assessment, the lessons learned from academic assessment need to be integrated with the whole institution so that a clear plan for and process of assessment can be carried out in the whole seminary and that assessment can lead to date based (rather than anecdotal based identification of strengths and weaknesses to be addressed by the strategic plan.

G. ACCREDITATION ISSUES

American Theological Schools (ATS) and Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACS-COC) Accreditation Status.

2019

In March 2018, both accrediting agencies had reviews with on-site visits to the campus. The ATS accreditation was renewed for seven years but the institution was given a notation concerning student learning outcomes. In February 2019, that notation was removed due to the fact that MTS had satisfied the issues regarding outcomes.

At its meeting in December 2018, the SACS-COC Board of Trustees voted to place MTS under the sanction of "warning" for twelve months. This is the lowest level of sanction. The seminary is and will remain accredited. The lack of reaffirmation without sanctions is due to several areas of deficiency. The primary and most challenging issue is a balanced budget. All the areas of concern are being addressed and documentation will be submitted to SACS-COC in September. Their Board will make a decision in December 2019 regarding the status. The Seminary can have the "warning" removed, stay on "warning" for another year or have the "warning" changed to"probation." MTS looks forward to working with the SACS-COC team to continue to address and correct these deficiencies and remove the warning.

H. UPDATE ON THE HAMILTON CHAPEL/FINANCIALSTATUS

During the past several years, the student body at MTS has become more and more diverse in a number of ways. One of the changes that has taken place is the diversity in class offerings. Currently, students attend classes in the morning, afternoon, evenings, on-line/hybrid and off campus. Because of these changes, there is no longer the need for a large facility where all students would gather at the same time. Therefore, the seminary began to consider other options for the chapel.

Due to the changing needs of the student population and the urgent need for a balanced budget because of the SACS-COC warning, in February 2019 the Board voted to explore the possibility of asking Mrs. Barbara Hamilton if her remaining gift for a stand alone chapel could be utilized in a different manner.

When consulted regarding her gift, Mrs. Hamilton said her concern was that the seminary needed a nice chapel versatile enough to meet the needs but did not necessarily feel there was a need for a large standalone chapel. Therefore, we made the decision to utilize the \$1.6M gift that remained for the construction of a new chapel as follows: (1) major renovation of the existing chapel, (2) the endowment of a Methodist House of Studies Chair and (3) the remaining to be used to balance the annual budget. These funds should allow the seminary to have a balanced budget for several years, if the continuing fundraising is successful.

I. FUTURE FUNDING

While the Hamilton gift will enable the seminary to have a balanced budget, it does not mean that the other regular funding is not necessary. The seminary has been operating under a deficit budget for many years. The SACS-COC warning is a call to arms. There must be a balanced budget with three years. Thankfully, this can be done but not without continued and growing support from the Cumberland Presbyterian family and others.

Donors site many reasons for contributing to MTS. But most donors are focused on the importance of training men and women to lead congregations in a diverse, changing and challenging time. Never has the church or the world needed more good leaders to seek the Kingdom of God on earth.

So please give. Please ask your congregation, friends and other members of other denominations to contribute. It is a new day at MTS and we need your support.

RECOMMENDATION 1: That the General Assembly encourage Presbyteries to share the mission, vision and passion of MTS to train and sustain men and women for the Christian ministry and ask members to support the seminary with their financial resources and prayers.

II. ADMINISTRATION

A. PRESIDENT

Reverend Susan Parker, Ph.D. was selected by the Board to be interim president beginning August 2018. Susan was ordained as a Cumberland Presbyterian minister in April 2014 after completing the Program of Alternate Studies. Prior to being named interim president, Susan was serving stated supply and interim calls at CP and Presbyterian USA churches. She spent several years in statewide elected office in the state of Alabama and twenty-five years in higher education. Susan holds a Ph.D. from the University of Alabama, a Masters from UAB, Bachelors from Athens College and an Associates from Calhoun Community College.

2019 THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

A. VICE PRESIDENT OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS/DEAN

Dr. Pete Gathje became the Vice President of Academic Affairs/Dean in February 2017. Pete served previously as Professor of Ethics at MTS and Associate Dean of Curriculum and Instruction.He is a lay Roman Catholic and is deeply committed to the mission of Memphis Theological Seminary, having taught on our faculty for the past ten years.

B. VICE PRESIDENT OFOPERATIONS/CFO

Ms. Cassandra Price-Perry began work with MTS in August 2010 as Vice President of Operations and Chief Financial Officer. She is a Certified Public Accountant with over 20 years of experience in business and accounting. Cassandra is an active laywoman in her Roman Catholic Church in Southaven, MS. She has received high praise from our auditors and our Board for her work over the past almost seven years.

III. INSTRUCTION

A. DEGREE PROGRAMS

Memphis Theological Seminary offers four degree programs and three certificate programs, including the certificate offered through the Program of Alternate Studies. The Master of Divinity is the basic degree program for persons preparing for ordained ministry in many denominations. It continues to be our largest degree program, with over 70% of students enrolled. The M.Div. requires 84 semester hours and takes three years of full-time study to complete.

The Doctor of Ministry degree is a professional degree designed for pastors and other ministers who have at least three years of full-time work in ministry after their M.Div. and who want to engage in further theological reflection on the practice of ministry. The D.Min. is designed around five two-week residencies, in January and July, and the implementation of and report on a major project in ministry. It usually takes 3-5 years to complete.

A third program is the Master of Arts in Youth Ministry (MAYM). Through our partnership with the Center for Youth Ministry Training in Brentwood, Tennessee, and the new certificate program in youth ministry through the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, we have over thirty students enrolled in this degree program. MTS currently has, we believe, the largest master's program in youth ministry in the UnitedStates.

In the spring of 2016, we were approved by our accrediting bodies (The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada) to offer a new degree, the Master of Arts in Christian Ministry (MACM). This degree program began in the fall of 2016 with concentrations offered in Christian Education, Urban Ministry, and Social Justice Ministry. The MACM is a 42 hour degree for persons interested in pursuing specialized ministries. We plan to offer additional concentrations in the future (possibly rural ministry, counseling,etc.)

At Commencement in May of 2018, Memphis Theological Seminary awarded the Master of Arts in Youth Ministry degree to twelve graduates. Three persons were awarded the Master of Arts (Religion) degree. Three persons received the Master of Arts in Christian Ministry degree. Thirty-eight persons were awarded the Master of Divinity degree, and fourteen were awarded the Doctor of Ministry degree.

Cumberland Presbyterian Master of Divinity graduates were: Jamie Adams. Paul Earheart-Brown and William Arnold. Cumberland Presbyterian Doctor of Ministry were: Jin Koo Kang, Myeong R. Ree, and Cory D. Williams

B. CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS

In addition to the four degree programs, MTS offers the following certificates: Program of Alternate Studies of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Drug and Alcohol Addiction Counseling Graduate Certificate, James Netters Certificate in Ministry and Certificate in Wesleyan Studies.

C. FACULTY

For the current academic year, Memphis Theological Seminary has thirteen full-time teaching faculty, four administrative faculty members who teach part-time, and one Louisville fellow. In addition, the seminary curriculum is greatly enhanced by the work often to fifteen adjunct professors, most of whom are active in pastoral or other ministries.

Members of the MTS faculty continue to publish books and articles both for the academy and the church. Many faculty members preach in area churches on a regular basis, deliver lectures for local churches and judicatories, deliver papers at academic conferences, and write articles for a wide range of readers.

Under the leadership of VP/Dean Gathje, the faculty implemented our new M.Div. online hybrid program. Twenty-two students are enrolled as a cohort and will be able to complete their entire degree by coming to campus four times per semester for a two day intensive period and doing their on-line classwork.

D. ENROLLMENT

Total enrollment in Memphis Theological Seminary for the fall term of 2018 was 257, including all degree and certificate programs. We continued to see a drop in enrollment in our largest degree program, the Master of Divinity. Declining enrollments led again to painful budget adjustments during the year, including the elimination of several part-time and full-time positions. Our largest number of students comes from the United Methodist Church, with 23.6% of total enrollment. Cumberland Presbyterians are the second largest denomination represented in the student body with about 13.3% of all students.

The Bridge Program. In 2018 an anonymous donor created the Whosoever Will Bridge Program. This program will enable any student who completes his/her degree at Bethel University and the M.Div at MTS and then is called to serve full-time at a CP church to receive a stipend of \$12,000 per year. We continue to work to recruit Cumberland Presbyterian students as we believe this program will help encourage more students to pursue their call and utilize both Bethel and MTS as the route of preparation. We are thankful for the gift that made this possible.

RECOMMENDATION 2: That the Presbyteries inform all congregations of the Whosoever Will Bridge program and provide probationers with the necessary information so they will be aware of this program.

E. PROGRAM OF ALTERNATE STUDIES (written by Dr. Michael Qualls, Director)

Memphis Theological Seminary has administered theProgram of Alternate Studies as an alternative route to ordained ministry in the Cumberland Presbyterian Churchs since its inception in 1984. In addition to the basics of preparing ministers of word and sacrament in a myriad of circumstances we are becoming a reliable resource for foundational education of *lay persons* interested/involved in congregational leadership in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

• A reduced rate tuition of \$200 allows those not seeking ordination to take any of our online or face-to-face courses.

• A targeted lay-leader weekend conference will again be a feature of our SES in2019. We ask the General Assembly to help us promote these opportunities through the presbyteries.

SES 2019

The heart of the program is a fifteen-day period in the summer. At that event students come together for community, fellowship, worship and intensive classroom experience. Students may take up to 9 courses of the 27 or so that are taught during three five-day blocks. The 2019 Summer Extension School will be held on the Campus of Bethel University July 13-27. Graduation will be July 13th at 11:00 am in Odom Hall with Reverend David Lancaster as our commencement speaker. We anticipate 5 graduates.

ONLINE and WEEKEND CLASSES

In the "off season" we have offered eleven courses on-site in various locales or online in both synchronous (live interactive) and asynchronous format. Three were in conjunction with MMT at a Latino Conference at El Camino Church in the Miami area. This enables students nearing graduation to complete requirements and others to move more quickly along than their limited availability during the summer school would allow.

PARTNERS IN EDUCATIONAL MINISTRY

Once again we will have the MTS MDiv. students in a joint class with the PAS students. The joint class this year occurs in the first block, Educational Ministry in the Smaller Church featuring Dr. Cannichael Crutchfield as professor.

THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

We are also collaborating to help current Cumberland Presbyterian MDiv. students complete the Cumberland Presbyterian specific courses for credit by including the PAS courses as part of the course requirements. This is a viable model given the overlapping interests.

We have now opened a pathway for PAS courses to be considered, on a case by case basis, for partial transfer credit (up to 17 hours possible) for anyone who wishes to pursue the MDiv. degree at MTS. PAS graduates are encouraged to contact the MTS Registrar for evaluation. The PAS office can assist with getting transcripts.

PARTNERS IN MISSION

2019

We continue to work with MMT and Cross Cultural Ministry Program Director to assist with assimilation of immigrant pastors/churches and to assist the global outreach of the Cumberland Presbyterian church. These non-typical circumstances often call for additional flexibility and often are not in a position to financially sustain the costs of the resources. We are grateful for the support of OUO and mission-minded partners to enable this important ministry. We anticipate a large group in the first official graduating class of PAS-Colombia in 2020.

STANDARDIZING SYLLABI

In response to the request of the 188th General Assembly the PAS Advisory Council approved a format for course syllabi. We have communicated this to all instructors and requested updatedcopies of their course syllabus. We also reflect appreciation for the flexibility inherent in a diverse faculty and continue to affirm the many ways of learning/teaching reflected in an alternative educational environment.

RECOGNITION

The strength of the Program of Alternate Studies rests in its dedicated, capable and empathetic teachers. Throughout the existence of the program it has been privileged to access the best and the brightest the denomination has to offer, from credentialed educators and theologians to acknowledged ministry professionals. We gratefully express appreciation to Reverend Clinton Buck who began teaching in the very first summer school (1984) and Reverend David Lancaster who began soon thereafter (1986). These faithful servants, and many others, have returned year after year to joyfully pour themselves into the lives of women and men who seek to gain insight and wisdom to fulfill the Lord's calling.

IN MEMORIUM

Sadly, we seldom get to acknowledge the sacrificial service of our mentors adequately. Please help us express appreciation, to a true hero of the Program of Alternate Studies, the first Director, Dr. William "Bill" Rustenhaven Jr. Dr. Rustenhaven referred to the summer extension schools each July as "Mt. Bethel", an allusion to the campus which hosted them and also to the Biblical experience of Jacob who discovered afresh the presence of God on his sojourn.

Rustenhaven took great delight in the relationships with students, traveling and visiting extensively in their homes. He served as pastor to them as well as mentor. He spent endless hours in informal conversation with students who joined him as he would pull away to "burn incense," a euphemism he often employed to describe smoking his pipe. He is remembered by students as a consummate instructor, both tender and tenacious.

I warmly associate myself with the concluding remarks in Dr. Rustenhaven's report to the PAS Advisory Council at the end of his first year as director. *The position I hold is one of great responsibility and is an awesome challenge. At times I am ovenvhelmed. Yet I feel strongly in the worth of this program of educational preparation for ministry. My prayer is for strength, wisdom and humility to see if we can make a difference for the building of the Kingdom in and through our responsibility as participants in that Kingdom. Please remember me in your prayers and concern.*

IV. FACILITIES

A. FACILITIES IMPROVEMENTS

As described earlier in the report, the existing chapel will be renovated and extensively remodeled using the Hamilton gift. Part of the usage of the Hamilton gift will also be used to renovate the entrances

to and from the Chapel. Therefore, the entrance to the rear of Founders Hall is being renovated to make this part of the entrance to the Chapel more attractive. Also, the flooring outside the Chapel and surrounding areas will be replaced.

In addition, funds and volunteers are being sought to repair the damage to the student housing and rental properties of the seminary. A generous donor has agreed to pay for the materials and we are currently seeking volunteer mission teams or individuals to do repairs, painting and pressure washing to preserve these properties.

We have also applied for funds from the CPW General Assembly offering to do much needed repairs to Cumberland Hall.

B. DEBT ONPROPERTY

The debt on property as of 12/31/18 was \$2.5M.

C. SAFETY

The Office of Safety of MTS continues to explore ways to enhance the safety of our students in the context of our urban campus. Through the use of lighting, security officers, secure locks, and well articulated safety plans, the seminary seeks to provide a safe environment for students and visitors to our campus.

During the past seven years, MTS has contracted with a local security company to provide regular patrols around our neighborhood. This additional safety measure has been well received by our students and by our neighbors. We continue to seek ways to provide a safe environment for our campus community.

V. ADVANCEMENT AND FINANCE

A. BUDGET

Our Board of Trustees will approve a budget for the 2019-2020 academic year at its May meeting. Copies of that budget will be provided at the meeting of General Assembly.

Like seminaries across the country, we continue to face budget challenges from declining enrollments. The Board of Trustees has become more involved with the budgeting process to insure funds are spent as wisely as possible. Renewed efforts toward transparency and involvement of the board have been undertaken.

B. SCHOLARSHIPS AND GRANTS

We continue to cultivate relationships with foundations whose mission closely aligns with ours. The following grants for scholarships and other projects have been received in recent years:

1. The Eli Lilly Endowment, Inc. - Center for Faith and Imagination

In December 2017, MTS was notified that it had been selected to receive a grant of \$1 million dollars from the Lilly Endowment, Inc., for use over five years to fund a Center for Faith and Imagination at Memphis Theological Seminary. Working with partners including the Methodist Healthcare Clergy Coaching Network, the Center for Transfonning Communities, the Cumberland Presbyterian Pastoral Ministry Development Team, and the Memphis Annual Conference of the UMC, the work of the Center will focus on supporting and sustaining clergy in their first five years of ministry post seminary. The new Center at MTS will provide services to our graduates to help them develop networks of support, encouragement, and spiritual depth to help them understand and survive the challenges of pastoral ministry in ourtime.

2. The Kemmons Wilson FamilyFoundation

The Kemmons Wilson family, founders of the Holiday Inn hotel chain and noted philanthropists in Memphis, has renewed funding of the Wilson Scholarships at \$15,000 for this year.

3. The H.W. Durham Foundation

In 2018 the Memphis-based H.W. Durham Foundation renewed its gift of \$5,000 to provide 5 \$1,000 scholarships for students who are 55+ years of age. These Durham Scholars will represent much of our student body who are second-career students.

C. ENDOWMENTS

One of the most exciting things this year has been the establishment of the Baird-Buck CP House of Studies. bSeveral years ago, the Baird and Buck families established an endowment designed to one day reach the \$1.2M required for an endowed chair. Much progress has been made. The families continue to contribute and Dr. Clinton Buck continues to seek funding. This year the families approved for the seminary to begin to spend a portion of the endowment annual earnings (\$20,000) to fund the CP House of Studies. This intermediate step allows us to connect students more intentionally with their CP heritage and to create emphases on historical events of interest to the CP church. Dr. Michael Qualls, the Director of the Program of Alternate Studies, is leading the efforts to engage all CP students, prospective students, faculty, staff and alumni in worship, fellowship, and lecture activities. We are grateful for these activities and all are enjoying the renewed emphasis on all things CP.

Currently we have 289 endowments. These endowments are varied both in amount and purpose. Scholarships, ofcourse, makeup the largest group. But endowments are set aside for the general fund, lectures, the library, music and other good purposes. The seminary welcomes endowments and has recently set \$5,000 as a minimum for establishing a new endowment.

D. ESTATE GIFTS

We continue to have conversations with friends and donors about the importance of remembering MTS (and their local churches, and other ministries they care deeply about) in their estate plans. Almost daily we receive gifts in memory of someone. We are grateful for these ways to honor the individual and help the seminary at the sametime.

In September 2018 we were blessed to receive a gift of \$133,196 from the Burnita Hudgins Charitable Trust. This generous gift was to fund the Sallie Clay and Alice Coooksey Endowment and for the general fund.

We are deeply grateful for the generosity that faithful Cumberland Presbyterians and others exhibit in remembering MTS, and other denominational ministries, in their estate planning. The MTS Advancement Staff and President are available to present programs on Planned Giving to churches, groups of churches, or presbyteries to encourage our members to remember their local churches and denominational ministries that are important to them in their wills and other planned giving vehicles.

E. SEMINARY/PAS SUNDAY

We have many churches in our denomination, and in other denominations we serve who recognize Seminary Sunday in their local churches. This provides time for education of members about the work of MTS and the Program of Alternate Studies and provides an opportunity for members to make a special one-time gift to support the work of the seminary. Please contact the seminary for more information on how you can recognize Seminary Sunday in your local church, and to request a speaker for theoccasion.

RECOMMENDATION 3: That the third Sunday in August, (August 18, 2019)be included in the General Assembly Calendar as Seminary/PAS Sunday, and that Presbyteries encourage all churches to share information about MTS and PAS and receive a special offering on that day, or on a more convenient day of the session's choosing.

F. ANNUAL FUND

Memphis Theological Seminary could not operate without the faithful contributions of its alumni and friends. Annual Fund contributions help us keep the cost of tuition down, so hopefully students do not leave seminary with a large burden of debt to have to pay during their early years inministry. Raising \$1M year after year for the Annual Fund is a daunting task.

The Whosoever Will Bridge program can help ease the burden on Cumberland Presbyterian graduates by giving them a stipend of \$12,000 per year for five years. This is a tremendous blessing for MTS and these students.

MTS friends and alumnia reencouraged to consider joining the"1852 Society," a group of persons who pledge to give at least \$18.52 per month to help support the work of the seminary. Information on the "1852 Society" is available at the MTS display table during the week of General Assembly, and can be accessed through our website: MemphisSeminary.edu.

In some respects, the income we receive from OUO puts us in a better position than many theological seminaries, whose income from denominational sources has declined significantly

over the past twenty years. Our income from OUO has remained relatively steady over that time period. However, as a percentage of our total income, OUO has fallen from almost 20% to about 3% of our operating budget. We are grateful for the commitment of Cumberland Presbyterians to the ministry of MTS, and all our common ministries, expressed so tangibly through giving to Our United Outreach.

At the same time, we do not expect income from denominational contributions to increase significantly in the future. This means that we are required to put more time and energy into fund raising than ever before. We are grateful for the many alumni who have made a commitment to help raise funds through their own contributions, asking for their churches to contribute and also putting MTS in their will.

G. AUDIT REPORT

THE REPORT OF THE OUR UNITED OUTREACH COMMITTEE

The 2009 General Assembly established a denominational Our United Outreach Committee to be made up of 12 voting representatives, one from each Synod and the rest from the church programs and institutions. Executives from the church programs and institutions participate on the Committee as advisory members. This Committee meets annually unless there is a needed called meeting.

A goal of the Our United Outreach Committee is to encourage ALL churches to contribute to Our United Outreach. Approximately 25 percent of the churches do not give anything with a high percentage of other churches not giving at the 10 percent level. This past year, 2019, the budgeted goal for Our United Outreach was 2,600,000 - 97.74% giving was achieved. The Committee seeks to involve ALL churches with Our United Outreach giving and at a greater level of participation.

I. OUR UNITED OUTREACH FUNDS ALLOCATION

The Our United Outreach Committee met March 1, 2019, to allocate the Our United Outreach funds for the 2020 year. The Our United Outreach allocation basis for 2020 is \$2,600,000.

A line item of \$35,000 for Unification Task Force and \$92,044 for the OUO Development Office, including the Director, Regional Representatives, and all expenses thereto, have been approved as guaranteed amounts and are deducted from the goal amount prior to allocation purposes.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON MILITARY CHAPLAINS AND PERSONNEL

The General Assembly Commission on Military Chaplains and Personnel is made up of three members, each serving terms of three years on the Commission. Those people are Reverend Cassandra Thomas (2019), Reverend Charles McCaskey (2020), and Reverend Tony Janner (2021). They can serve up to 9 years (3 three year terms). (Note: Reverend Thomas will rotate off the council after her second term ends this year due to family reasons and another minister will be appointed to serve on the commission by the GA). These three members, along with the Stated Clerk, Reverend Michael Sharpe, are also members of the Presbyterian Council for Chaplains and Military Personnel (PCCMP), also doing business as Presbyterian Federal Chaplaincies and Presbyterians Caring for Chaplains and Military Personnel. The office is located at 4125 Nebraska Avenue NW, Washington DC. The Council represents the following member denominations: Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, Korean Presbyterian Church Abroad, and Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) in all matters relative to member chaplains who serve in all branches of the Armed Forces, Veterans Affairs, Federal Bureau of Prisons, and Civil Air Patrol. The Council ministers in appropriate ways to the families of Chaplains and to military personnel, veterans and their families of the member denominations. The Council also approves Seminary students of the member denominations for participation in Chaplain Candidacy programs of the military services.

I. SUPPORT OF THE PCCMP

Financial support for the Presbyterian Council for Chaplains and Military Personnel (PCCMP) is received from the four member denominations and individuals, church judicatories and individual churches. The constant decrease of financial support is an issue that the PCCMP is constantly dealing with. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church has a budget line in the denominational budget to support the PCCMP. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the individual churches have traditionally received an offering on Memorial Day Sunday with those offerings being given directly to the PCCMP for its budget. However, other special days may be considered to receive this special offering in the individual churches – the Sunday nearest Veterans day, "Four Chaplain's Sunday" (the first Sunday in February), the Sunday nearest the 4th of July or some other Sunday as a witness to support the men and women who have or are serving in the military, the Federal Bureau of Prisons, the Veterans Affairs and the Civil Air Patrol. These offerings should be sent to the General Assembly Stated Clerk and are forwarded to the PCCMP for the outreach, mission, and maintenance of the PCCMP.

RECOMMENDATION 1: That each Cumberland Presbyterian Church provide an opportunity for their congregations to receive an offering on the last Sunday of May, or another special day, to support our ministry through the PCCMP.

The PCCMP provides ecclesiastical endorsement for chaplains of the United States Armed Forces from the four member denominations who are serving on active duty or serving the Reserves/ National Guard. The PCCMP also endorses Ministers of Word and Sacrament who serve as chaplains in the Federal Bureau of Prisons and the Civil Air Patrol. The PCCMP also provides special training to chaplains and pastoral support to chaplains and their families who are endorsed for those positions from the four member denominations. The PCCMP provides an influential voice for the member denominations to the National Council on Ministry to the Armed Forces in matters relating to the ministry and welfare of the endorsed chaplains. The PCCMP also promotes a closer communications between chaplains and their denominational bodies.

RECOMMENDATION 2: That individual congregations of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and Cumberland Presbyerian Church in America determine and designate special days through the year to hold up the chaplains and their families in the service to which they have been endorsed.

II. MEETINGS, DIRECTOR, AND CPC/CPCA MEMBERS NOTES

The PCCMP, and the representatives of the member denominations normally meets at least once a year. This past year, the annual meeting was hosted by the Korean Presbyterian Church Abroad in Toronto, Canada. All three CPC members were able to attend and participate in the decision making of the council. PCCMP Chair, Reverend Cassandra Thomas (CPC) and Director Lyman Smith led the council through several days of decision-making and strategic planning.

The 2019 Annual Meeting will be hosted at the denominational headquarters of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Cordova, Tennessee, October 1-2, 2019.

The PCCMP held its 2018 Chaplains Credentialing Training and Family Retreat, August 5-10, 2018 in Montreat, North Carolina. On the last night, the preacher was Chaplain Zachary Nash, USAF Active Duty (CPC), with worship and communion support from Chaplain Candidate Garrett Burns (CPC), Reverend Sandy Thomas (CPC), Chaplain David Lancaster, US Army Active Duty (CPCA), and an US Army active duty chaplain (KPCA).

Due to the stationing of chaplains and their families around the world with time zone challenges, East Coast and West Coast training opportunities are planned to reach as many chaplains and their families as possible for reformed tradition renewal, Presbyterian updates, and self-care resources in 2019.

Director Lyman Smith is providing excellent leadership and endorsement abilities to chaplains and chaplain candidates. His impeccable work with federal agencies, chaplain organizations, denominational leaders, and council members stabilized the council and its influence in multiple spheres. He is to be commended for his excellent service to our denomination on the behalf of chaplains and their families and our presbyteries and congregations.

Reverend Cassandra (Sandy) Thomas (CPC) concludes her second year as chair of the council as she rotates off the council at the 2019 Annual PCCMP Meeting. She humbly thanks the GA for allowing her to serve these past six years on the council. Reverend Tony Janner is on the council's Communication Team and Reverend Charles McCaskey is on the council's Pastoral Care Team. They provide keen insights and recommendations to the director and council.

THE REPORT OF THE PERMANENT JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

The Judiciary Committee met March 7, 2019 in Huntsville, Alabama. Present were Pam Brown, Annetta Camp, Harry Chapman, Geoff Knight, Rachel Moses, Andy McClung, Jan Overton, Jim Ratliff, and Bill Tally. Also present were Mike Sharpe, stated clerk, and Jaime Jordan, legal counsel.

I. INQUIRY

An inquiry to the committee asked if a person is eligible to serve simultaneously on the Board of Directors for both Bethel University and Memphis Theological Seminary. It is the committee's opinion that due to the limitations defined in General Assembly Bylaws 10.01.01, 10.01.02, 10.02.06, 10.02.07, a person may not serve simultaneously on the Board of Directors for both Bethel University and Memphis Theological Seminary.

II. COMMUNICATION

The committee received and discussed "Arkansas Petition to 2019 Joint Meeting of the General Assembly". It is the committee's opinion that the Arkansas Petition to 2019 Joint Meeting of the General Assembly deals with the subject of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church's position on human sexuality and, therefore, presents substantially the same question which was referred by the 2018 General Assembly to the Permanent Judicial Committee, Unified Committee on Social Concerns, and the Ministry Council. Because the petition presents the same question as one which remains within the control of the assembly, the committee advises the stated clerk that it would not be in order for the Arkansas petition to be considered by the General Assembly in its 2019 meeting. This opinion is based on Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, section 10, page 112.

III. REVIEW OF SYNOD MINUTES

The following synod minutes from 2018 were reviewed. The committee appreciates the work and ministries of our synods, and notes the following mistakes in the minutes:

Mission Synod

• A "secretary" was elected. Our Rules of Order call for a "stated clerk".

Tennessee Synod

- The minutes record that the Executive Council report was considered seriatim, but it appears the report was actually divided. These are different actions (see Rules of Order 8.34 e and f).
- No closing prayer is indicated.
- The minutes record that Bedford County being part of Columbia Presbytery was "announced." It is unclear if this was informational or a ruling.
- Copies of the incorporation papers should be included in the minutes.
- The minutes indicate an appeal was dealt with. The appeal and written response should be included in the minutes.

Synod of the Midwest

- Nominations were treated as recommendations. This is improper. See Rules of Order 11.0.
- The synod's Judicial Committee & Disciplinary Commission should be separate entities (see comment to Rules of Discipline 2.5).

Synod of the Southeast

• No concerns

Synod of Great Rivers

• No concerns

IV. REVIEW OF MISSIONS MINSTRY TEAM FUNCTIONING AS A PRESBYTERY

This committee fulfills the role of a synod in providing oversight and review of the Missions Ministry Team as MMT functions as a presbytery in certain circumstances (GA Bylaw 11.05.06). The committee reviewed the 2018 minutes and found the following concerns:

- The minutes do not indicate that meetings were opened or closed with prayer.
- The minutes do not indicate that a quorum was present.

• The minutes state that a candidate was received but will be asked the constitutional questions for candidacy at a later time. This violates Constitution 6.15 in that the receiving body must hear the person's affirmative answers to the constitutional questions for candidacy before formal reception.

V. GENERAL ASSEMBLY REPRESENTATIVES

Geoff Knight was elected to serve as this committee's representative to the 189th General Assembly. Andy McClung was elected as the alternate.

THE REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Nominating Committee consists of a minister and a lay person from each synod, preferably from different presbyteries. Members may serve a three year term, but cannot succeed themselves. Cumberland Presbyterian members of any board or committee can be re-elected to the same board after a two year absence. Ecumenical representatives may be re-elected to the same board after a one year absence. With the exception of the Nominating Committee any person elected to serve on a denominational entity may serve three consecutive terms. Filling an unexpired term counts as one term, thus members of any entity do not always serve nine years before completing eligibility on a board/agency.

The members of the various Ministry Teams are no longer elected by the General Assembly, but are to be appointed by the Ministry Council.

THE REPORT OF THE PLACE OF MEETING COMMITTEE

The Place of Meeting Committee consists of the Moderator, a representative of the Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry, and the Stated Clerk who serves as the chairperson. The representative of the Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry is the Convention Coordinator.

The 165th General Assembly, "authorized the committee to select meeting places up to five years in the future and that preference be given that keeps, insofar as possible, the General Assembly and the Convention of Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry, and guest rooms in one facility. It is recognized that these places are hard to find and may cost some additional monies. The place of meeting committee will use its best judgment." The 173rd General Assembly approved exploring the use of college campuses and very large conference centers in addition to hotels/convention centers. When the Office of the General Assembly receives an invitation from a congregation or a presbytery, the Stated Clerk makes a site visit. If adequate facilities are discovered, a follow up visit is made by the Stated Clerk, the Assistant to the Stated Clerk, and the Convention Coordinator of the Cumberland Presbyterian Women's Ministry.

Commissioners, delegates to Conventions, and visitors are encouraged to stay at the General Assembly/Convention hotel, to assure meeting the contracted room block. Hotel contracts also include a commitment on food and beverages, thus it is important for boards/agencies to continue to sponsor special meal functions. The luncheons/dinners provide opportunities for the sponsoring agencies/boards to keep the church informed about their respective programs, thus enhancing support.

I. INFORMATION ABOUT FUTURE GENERAL ASSEMBLIES

Continued discussions with the leadership of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America regarding joint meetings of the General Assemblies in 2020 and 2021 may impact future meeting locations.

It is helpful to continue scheduling a few years in advance of the meeting to assure that adequate hotel/convention space is available and to negotiate a good rate. If a congregation or a presbytery is interested in hosting the General Assembly/Convention, the Office of the General Assembly will provide information on hosting responsibilities. Hosting the General Assembly/Convention is a service to the Church, allowing the Church to celebrate the good ministries occurring within a particular presbytery, and provides persons within a presbytery the opportunity to participate more fully in the annual meeting.

In the event that no invitation is received in a particular year or a situation arises requiring a change of venue for a particular year, the Corporate Board will be responsible for selecting a place of meeting.

The Office of the General Assembly has received an invitation from West Tennessee Presbytery to host a future meeting of the General Assembly.

THE REPORT OF THE UNIFIED COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGY AND SOCIAL CONCERNS

I. MEETING AND OFFICERS

The Unified Committee on Theology and Social Concerns (UCTSC) met in Nashville, Tennessee on November 2-3, 2018 and in Huntsville, Alabama, March 8-9, 2019. The following officers were elected during the fall meeting: Reverend Edmund Cox (CPCA) and Reverend Mitch Boulton (CPC) Co-Chairs; and Reverend Nancy Fuqua (CPCA), Secretary.

II. EXPIRATION OF TERMS

The Committee notes that the terms of service for Reverend Byron Forester, Elder Joy Wallace expire in 2019. Reverend John Smith resigned from the committee to join the Presbyterian Church (USA).

III. GENERAL ASSEMBLY REPRESENTATIVE

The Committee elected Reverend Edmund Cox (CPCA) to serve as the representative to the meeting of the CPC/CPCA General Assembles in Huntsville, Alabama. Reverend Lisa Scott (CPC) was elected as the alternate.

IV. GENERAL ASSEMBLY REFERRAL

The 188th CPC General Assembly referred to the UCTSC to work jointly with the Permanent Judiciary Committee and Ministry Council to develop a position statement on the issues of human sexuality and to present the statement to the 189th General Assembly. The UCTSC received many study papers on the subject and are grateful to those who submitted papers. Due to the complexity, various opinions and cultural differences on human sexuality, the UCTSC has not been able to finalize a statement in time for this year's General Assembly

RECOMMENDATION 1: The UCTSC requests more time to consider other pertinent information from various perspectives in order to set forth a loving, Biblical and theological sound response.

The UCTSC will continue it's work on the referral, by seeking to hear voices from within the church that would like to speak to this issue. Anyone who would like to speak to the UCTSC, is invited to contact either Co-Chairs or the Secretary of the committee. Contact information can be found on the UCTSC website (www.cumberland.org/uctsc).

V. STUDY PAPERS

The Committee is currently reviewing the following study papers. 1. "A Theological Statement on Inclusion of the LGBTQIA Community in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church." 2. "Human Sexuality in the Bible". 3. "Homosexuality Activity and Marriage in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church". 4. "Authority of Jesus". The Committee expects to complete its review of these papers prior to the meetings of the 190th General Assemblies.

VI. WORKS IN PROGRESS

The UCTSC has developed guidelines for a theological/social concerns panel made up of representatives of the CPC/CPCA to address emerging issues in a timelier way. Panel responses would not have the official sanction of the CPC or CPCA but would provide useful reflections for persons in our two churches. The Committee expects to launch the panel during 2019. Communications announcing the panel and its work will be distributed to both churches.

The Unification Task Force of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America (CPCA) and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (CPC) since the last meeting of the General Assemblies: November 1-2, 2018 and March 21-22, 2019 in Nashville, Tennessee. Officers elected are: Elton Hall and Steve Mosley - co-chairs; and Craig White and Jay Earheart-Brown - secretaries. Other members of the UTF from the CPCA are: Leon Cole, Arthur Heywood, Lynne Herring, William Robinson, and Mitchell Walker. Other members from the CPC are: Perryn Rice, Robert Rush, Gloria Villa-Diaz, Joy Warren, and Mike Sharpe.

Steve Mosley and Perryn Rice were elected to serve as representatives of the UTF to the meetings of the General Assemblies in Huntsville, Alabama.

II. WORK OF THE TASK FORCE

Members of the UTF have traveled widely in our two churches, and spoken to many different gatherings of Cumberland Presbyterians, answering questions and providing educational sessions about the Plan of Union. We have also written articles for the church magazines, and worked to advocate for Unification at every opportunity. Members of our Task Force have covenanted to pray for unity between our churches at noon each day, and we continue to seek God's will for our churches.

We have consulted with the attorneys for our two churches and continue to seek the best way to bring about the proposed unification - the way that will be least disruptive, most cost effective, and honoring to the traditions of both denominations.

III. PLAN OF UNION

Our latest revisions have been completed during this year with advice from counsel, and taking into account continued input from across our churches. Believing that the time is right for our two churches to decide if the time is right to move ahead, we offer the Plan of Union with the prayer that it will receive favor from commissioners to the General Assemblies of the CPCA and the CPC.

PROPOSED PLAN OF UNION A Brief Overview

The 2014 General Assemblies, in concurrent session at Chattanooga, Tennessee, approved for study a Proposed Plan of Union. That plan has been distributed widely across both denominations, and has generated a great deal of discussion and feedback. For almost four years the plan has been studied. We are grateful for all the responses the Task Force has received, both positive and negative. The Task Force has carefully studied the responses, from the table discussions at Chattanooga, to the surveys distributed at Presbytery meetings and on-line, to individual letters received by the GA offices and by members of the Task Force. On the basis of all the responses to the proposed plan, and several meetings attended by members of the Task Force, we voted in our November meeting not to ask for a formal vote on the plan at the 2016 meetings of the General Assembly, which would have been the earliest possible date for such a vote.

We, instead, spent significant time revising the Proposed Plan of Union, and presented it to the concurrent meetings of the two General Assemblies in 2016, with the recommendation that the revised plan be approved for study in the two churches. At the 2017 General Assemblies, meeting concurrently near Tampa, Florida, we proposed that 2017-2019 both churches devote two years to relationship building and continued study of the Plan of Union. We then suggested that the plan be put to a vote at the concurrent General Assemblies meeting in Huntsville, Alabama in June of 2019. If approved by both Assemblies, the Plan of Union would be sent to the Presbyteries of both churches for approval of the Plan between the 2019 and 2020 Assemblies. If approved by a majority of Presbyteries of both churches, the 2020 Assemblies would meet to finalize their business, adjourn sine die, and organize the new Assembly of the United Church in 2021.

While we do not know what the outcome of such a vote at next year's assemblies will be, we on the Task Force are convinced that the time is right for both churches to decide if we are ready to move forward with our union or not. If now is not the time, then we do not need to continue the work of the Task Force

at the present, but put our energies into our cooperating when and where we can as brothers and sisters in Christ. It is our sincere desire as members of the Task Force to see this union happen, and we have been deeply enriched by our work together on this project for the past six years. But ultimately it is the churches who must decide this matter.

We urge the commissioners to the 2018 General Assemblies to read the Plan carefully and make any proposed amendments the Assemblies would like to see incorporated into the plan this year, so that the Task Force will have time to incorporate those changes before next year's vote. Of course, the 2019 Assemblies will have the opportunity to amend the Plan before approving it, but amendments made next year will have to be dealt with in a well-structured manner in order to receive consideration by both Assemblies.

During the April meeting (2018), we decided to write, with consultation from our attorneys, draft Bylaws, Standing Rules, and Constitutional Amendments that will be circulated to both churches prior to the vote in 2019, so that there are as few details left hanging as possible. We hope to have those documents ready for distribution prior to the 2019 General Assembly meetings, so that commissioners and others will have ample time to study them prior to the vote.

With thanksgiving to God for the relationships we have developed as we have worked together for the past six years, and in hopes that all Cumberland Presbyterians may one day live and work together in one church, the UTF submits the following Proposed Plan of Union.

Proposed Plan for Union of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America

"There is one, holy, universal, apostolic church. She is the body of Christ, who is her Head and Lord" (*Confession of Faith* 5.01). "The church is one because her head and Lord is one, Jesus Christ. Her oneness under her Lord is manifested in the one ministry of word and sacrament, not in any uniformity of covenantal expression, organization, or system of doctrine" (5.02). "The church, as the covenant community of believers who are redeemed, includes all people in all ages, past, present, and future, who respond in faith to God's covenant of grace, and all who are unable to respond, for reasons known to God, but who are saved by his grace" (5.06). It is on this belief that the Unification Task Force recommends the union of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America (CPCA) and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (CPC). We are one in Christ by the grace of God and the power of the Holy Spirit! We believe that becoming one will strengthen our witness as Christian believers in the world, and that together we will be able to accomplish more for the glory of God. United together in Christ by faith, we are united to one another in love. In this communion we share the grace of Christ with one another, bear one another's burdens, and reach out to all other persons (*Confession of Faith* 5.10).

1.00 Mission Statement for the New Church

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church United affirms the great commission of Christ: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember I am with you until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:19-20). We celebrate our oneness in faith. As disciples, we seek through worship, global witness, and service to be the hands and feet of Christ and to live out the love of Jesus Christ to the glory of God.

2.00 The Confession of Faith and Government

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church United will use the *Confession of Faith and Government* of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, approved by both General Assemblies of the former denominations in 1984 as its system of faith and government.

2.01 The Cumberland Presbyterian Church United will use the *Catechism for Cumberland Presbyterians* (2008) for instruction in the faith and will include it in an updated edition of the *Confession of Faith and Government of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United*.

2.02 The CP *Digest* (CPC) and Summaries of Actions (for both denominations) will continue to serve as resource tools. A new *Digest* will begin with the formation of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United.

3.00 The Presbyteries and Synods

3.01 In an effort to make union something more than just an idea on paper, and to engage the grassroots in creating the new church, we recommend a restructure of the synod boundaries to create eight synods for the

new church, with the following presbyteries in each -

For relationship building during the first six years, all synods will be encouraged to hold an annual general meeting (*Constitution* 8.2) as opposed to a delegated meeting. Synods may petition General Assembly at any point for a change in boundaries.

* NOTE: There are dreams for organizing a third presbytery in Asia. As soon as it is practical to do so, whether before or after union, two additional synods could be constituted. Synod I would include Andes, Cauca Valley, Emaus and any other presbyteries organized in Latin America. Synod J would include Hong Kong, Japan, and any other presbyteries organized in Asia.

3.02 Presbyteries will remain as they are constituted at the time of union. During the first six years of the new church's life, synods will be encouraged to study the most beneficial presbyterial boundaries within their jurisdiction to fulfill of the mission of the church. Presbyteries may petition their synod at any time for a change in boundaries.

4.00 Commissioners and Youth Advisory Delegates to the General Assembly

4.01 Commissioners to General Assembly - Each Presbytery will be entitled to send 2 minister commissioners and 2 elder commissioners to the General Assembly.

NOTE: If presbytery boundaries remain as currently constituted at the time of unification, this will allow for a total possible membership in the General Assembly of 152 commissioners. Of these potential commissioners, 60 would come from former presbyteries of the CPCA, and 92 would come from the former CPC.

4.02 Youth Advisory Delegates - Each presbytery will be entitled to send up to two Youth Advisory delegates to the General Assembly.

5.00 Moderator and Vice Moderator of General Assembly

5.01 The moderator/vice moderator will be elected each year during the first six years with the two offices alternating between persons from the two former denominations.

5.02 The moderator and vice moderator of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United will reflect its diverse nature, to include international representatives. The church expects the moderator and vice moderator to travel within the denomination, sharing and gathering information among its local churches. Expenses and particular duties will be detailed in the Bylaws of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United.

6.00 Stated Clerk and Associate Stated Clerk of the General Assembly

6.01 The new church shall employ a Stated Clerk and an Associate Stated Clerk. Both positions will be full-time jobs. During the first six years of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United, the Stated Clerk will serve six years and the Associate Stated Clerk will serve four years, after which each would be elected for a four-year period. One position will be filled by a former CPCA and the other position filled by a former CPC during their first terms. The subsequent election of each position will allow for continuity during transitions. Particular duties and responsibilities of the Stated Clerk and Associate Stated Clerk will be detailed in the Bylaws of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United.

7.00 Boards and Agencies of the General Assembly

7.01 Each church has programs in various stages of planning and implementation that are the result of commitment to ministry through the church. Insofar as possible, these plans and programs will be continued without interruption for a period of three years. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church has covenantal relationships with the Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home in Denton, Texas and Bethel University in McKenzie, Tennessee. These covenantal relationships will remain in effect as they exist at the time of Unification, to be renewed every four years. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church United will continue ecumenical partnerships, such as with the World Communion of Reformed Churches

7.02 Institutional Boards

The General Assembly shall have the following institutional boards: Trustees of Memphis Theological Seminary to include the Program of Alternate Studies and School of Continuing Education Committee, and Trustees of the Historical Foundation. Representation on each Board of Trustees will remain as they are constituted at the time of union.

7.03 Administrative Boards

The General Assembly shall have the following administrative Boards: The Board of Stewardship, Foundation and Benefits and The Board of Directors of the General Assembly Corporation. During the transition period, each of these boards will have equal number of members from each of the former denominations.

7.04 Commission

The General Assembly shall have the following commission: Chaplains and Military Personnel. Representation on the commission will be merged as they are constituted at the time of union until natural rotation occurs.

7.05 Standing Committees

The General Assembly shall have the following standing committees: Theology and Social Concerns, Judiciary, Our United Outreach, Nominating, and Multi-Cultural Ministry.

Committee representation on the Theology and Social Concerns Committee will remain as constituted at the time of union until natural rotations occurs.

Judiciary and Nominating committees in both denominations will each be merged at the time of union.

Committee representation for Our United Outreach will be expanded to include two elected representatives from each new synod (one voting representative from each of the former denominations until natural rotation occurs).

The Committee on Multi-Cultural Ministry is a new committee that will reflect the diversity of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United. This committee will be comprised of eight (8) elected persons that will reflect the celebrative understanding of humanity in the areas of culture, language, heritage, and experience in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United. Believing that all have been created in God's image, this committee works to answer the question of our sameness in God's image lived out in diverse ways.

7.06 Program Board

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church United will have a Mission and Ministry Program Board to provide coordination and oversight for those ministries formally planned and implemented by the two former denominations. After the three-year period, the new programming and denominational structure will consist of the following ministry teams and auxiliaries:

• Christian Education & Nurture (Youth Convention & National Sunday School Convention,

Discipleship Ministry Team)

- Missions (Evangelism, Missionary Auxiliary, Women's Ministry, Missions Ministry Team)
- Clergy Care & Development (Pastoral Development Ministry Team)

• Communications (Cumberland Flag, Cumberland Presbyterian Magazine, Missionary Messenger, Ministry Council website, Communications Ministry Team)

Composition of each ministry team will include equal number of persons from each of the former denominations in the new church at the time of union. Composition of the new Missions and Ministry Program Board will include one staff person (serving as an advisory member) and one elected member from each ministry team, along with one elected member representing each of the synods. The elected members will be equally representative of the two former denominations for the first six years. A Ministry Coordinator would provide executive leadership for the Mission and Ministry Program Board.

8. Denominational Staff & Personnel

The current breakdown of the number of denominational staff by the employing entities housed at each Denominational Center is as follows:

Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America Center in Huntsville, AL General Assembly Office – 2.

Cumberland Presbyterian Church Center in Memphis, TN

General Assembly Office -2, Board of Stewardship -3, Central Accounting -1,

Historical Foundation -2, Ministry Council -17 (5 of which have distant office locations).

8.01 The new organizational structure will discontinue the positions of Administrative Director (CPCA) and the Director of Ministries (CPC) and will create the positions of Associate Stated Clerk and Mission and Ministry Program Coordinator. The Stated Clerk and Associate Stated Clerk will be elected during the General Assembly of 2021. The Mission and Ministry Program Coordinator will be employed by the Mission and Ministry Program Board.

8.02 Staffing for the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United will reflect the diversity of the new church. As new staff positions become available, equal opportunity employment practices will prevail.

8.03 Denominational Offices –During the first six years, steps are to be taken to assure that regional sites be located in a minimum of three and a maximum of five locations. Thus, neither the Center in Huntsville nor the Center in Memphis will be designated as "the denominational center." By placing regional sites in a variety of locations this will assure that all areas of the church will be served equally. These regional sites can make use of offices in existing churches, or in homes of regional staff persons. Possible regional locations could be Memphis, Huntsville, Louisville, Texas, South America, Asia, etc.

8.04 Global Staff - There will be endorsed missionaries, mission liaisons, and partner missionaries in the new church. The new church will continue to support current and future missionaries and global work. Current missionaries include – Patrick and Jessica Wilkerson (Colombia, South America), Beth Wallace missionary emeritus (Colombia, South America), Fhanor and Socorro Pejendino (Guatemala), Daniel & Kay Jang (Philippines), Kenneth & Delight Hopson (Uganda), Josue and Sara Guerrero (Brazil), Wilson and Diana Lopez (Spain), David and Sarah Lee (Cambodia), Missionaries in undisclosed countries (2), CP missionaries supported by their presbyteries – Iwao Satoh, Mission liaisons working in Haiti and Brazil. Undisclosed (yet to be announced) missionary couple to be deployed to Guatemala.

9.00 Stewardship and Finance

9.01 Legal control of assets of both churches will be transferred to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United through appropriate legal transaction. The intent of all designated gifts and endowments will be honored.

9.02 The Cumberland Presbyterian Church United will develop an approach to the financing of the programs of the church that reflects the stewardship understanding of the new constituency. Such a unitary approach will be developed as soon as possible after formation and no later than the end of the first six years.

10.00 Recognition of Ordination

All ordinations, both clergy and lay (elders and deacons), of both denominations will be recognized by

the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United. All future ordinations will be governed by the conditions specified in the Constitution. Persons who are recognized by their respective presbyteries as candidates and licentiates at the time the new church is formed will fulfill the requirements as specified by presbytery at the time they became probationers.

11.00 The Name of the New Denomination

The name of the denomination shall be the Cumberland Presbyterian Church United.

12.00 The Logo of the New Church

A new logo will be fashioned by the new church.

III. REVISED TIMELINE FOR THE PLAN OF UNION

 \cdot 2019 – Meeting concurrently in Huntsville, Alabama, the two assemblies vote on approving the Plan of Union, Draft Bylaws and Draft Constitutional Amendments, pending approval of a majority of presbyteries of the two churches. Any Constitutional amendments are sent to the Joint Committee on Amendments for review and preparation of final wording. Both Judiciary committees and Joint Committee on Amendments will be reviewing draft documents at their March meeting.

• **2019-2020** – If approved by a majority of both assemblies, the Plan is sent to the Presbyteries of both churches for approval (Much like a Constitutional Amendment is circulated to Presbyteries for ratification).

 \cdot 2020 – The two Assemblies, meeting concurrently, announce the vote of their Presbyteries, and if approved by a majority of both, vote on final approval of Bylaws and Standing Rules for the General Assembly of the new church (2/3 vote of approval necessary). Constitutional amendments reviewed and prepared by the Joint Committee on Amendments are approved (3/4 vote of approval necessary to refer amendments to Presbyteries for approval, and 3/4 of presbyteries, voting by simple majority, needed to approve amendments). If both assemblies approve Bylaws, the two assemblies vote to adjourn sine die, and will meet in 2021 to organize the new Assembly of the united Church. The Unification Task Force is dismissed, and an Implementation Task Force is elected to guide the transition for the first few years to the new denomination.

• 2021 – The new Cumberland Presbyterian Church United is officially organized.

RECOMMENDATION 1: That this Proposed Plan for Union be adopted by the General Assemblies of the CPCA and the CPC; and that upon such approval, it be forwarded to the presbyteries of the CPCA and the CPC for ratification during the 2019-2020 year. Presbyteries will be instructed to submit a report of their vote to their respective General Assembly clerks in time to be announced by the 2020 General Assemblies.

IV. UNITY SUNDAY

Both denominations have added unity Sunday to our calendars for the fourth Sunday in June. We encourage presbyteries to encourage their churches to observe this day as a time to give thanks to God for the unity we have in Christ, and to pray for greater unity among all Cumberland Presbyterians.

Members of this Task Force are deeply grateful for the trust placed in us, and the opportunity afforded us to work on this task over the past several years. Our lives have been enriched by new and deepened relationships, and our knowledge of and appreciation for our two denominations has been increased immeasurably.

THE REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BETHEL UNIVERSITY

The 2018-2019 Bethel University school year has been a very busy year for our University. Our Fall 2018 total enrollment was 4,850 students. 1,315 of these students attend classes on our McKenzie campus. Another 168 attend in our Health Sciences College in the Physician Assistant Program, Nursing Program and the Athletic Training Program. The remainder 3,367 students attend either our adult programs or our dual enrollment programs in local Tennessee High Schools.

In the calendar year of 2018, we submitted our 10 year Reaffirmation Plan to Southern Association of Colleges and Universities Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). It was a University wide effect. In December 2018, at the annual SACSCOC meeting, we found that we were reaffirmed and reaccredited for another 10 years. We will have to send a financial monitoring report this October, 2019, to SACSCOC for our only follow-up. Our next 10 year reaffirmation plan for SACSCOC will be 2028.

Our Board of Trustees has announced that our long awaited Chapel should be completed during the 2020-2021 academic school year. As we write this report, our architects are finalizing the plans for our current site, adjacent to our Vera Low Center for Student Enrichment. Initial plans have the chapel seating over 1,200 at worship.

During this current academic year, Bethel has seen many awards/honors for our students. Our Bass Fishing Team was crowned National Champions for 2018 and The Bass Fishing Team of the year (the first time ever a school has received both awards). Our sport programs have also been awarded The Gold Medal for Champions of Character. That is the highest award a school can be given and is not based on wins and losses, but is based on a team's GPA, Character and Service. Both basketball teams went to the National Tournament and our football team finished the regular season 10-0.

Our students have traveled on medical and humanitarian trips to Belize, Cuba, Columbia, and Thailand this year. Our Global Studies Department is growing fast and new trips are being planned. If you are interested in joining our group on a trip contact freemans@bethelu.edu.

In March of 2019, we finally won in our lawsuit with The Tennessee State Board of Education over our ability to propose students for teacher licensure. You may recall in July of 2016, The State of Tennessee Department of Education said we could no longer recommend students for teacher licensure. We had 7 court appearances and prevailed in every one. There are now no more appeals available to The State of Tennessee. The decision by The State of Tennessee, in July of 2016, has financially been very harmful to Bethel University. We are hopeful The State of Tennessee will make some financial amends.

Finally, we are excited to partner with The Memphis Theological Seminary and a donor in the "Whosoever Will Ministry Bridge" program. Students from Bethel University who go on to attend the Memphis Theological Seminary can be eligible for a \$1,000.00 tax free stipend for 60 months. It is the most innovative idea to grow The Cumberland Presbyterian Church we have ever seen.

THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHILDREN'S HOME

Introduction

Because of the life-giving grace through Jesus Christ, we at Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home serve God by serving others. We accept individuals as they are and help them through their journey. We build relationships with those we serve through strength-based love and support. We want our children and families to be empowered as we strive to achieve excellence through our mission work. Our mission statement is:

> In response to Christ's love and example we serve children and families by providing healing and hope.

Our ministry has continually focused on serving children and families for over 115 years.

I. OUR GOAL

Our goal is for children to be protected and live free from abuse and neglect while healing from the devastating impacts of past trauma. We do this in our Children's Residential Program by providing both emergency shelter and long term residential care to youth in foster care, so they flourish in a safe place. In addition to housing, we provide therapeutic services such as weekly individual and group counseling, case management, life skills training and other supportive services. The Family Residential Program provides transitional housing, case management, counseling, parent education and other supportive services to single parent families who are experiencing crisis. The goal of the Family Residential Program is to help families find a new beginning and work toward independence and healing. Our goal is to engage our community by having a thriving volunteer program and welcoming environment for all who support us in our undertaking by building relationships with our community partners and individuals who wish to make a difference in the lives of children and families. We serve to bring ourselves and others closer to God.

II. OUR VALUES

Our values are based on the greatest commandments. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength: this is the first commandment. The second is this: Love your neighbor as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these. Mark 12:30-31.

All we are and all we do at the Children's Home is an act of love for our neighbors. Our neighbors who are so in need. The Child Welfare Information Gateway reported 437,465 children in foster care across the country. Within Texas Region 3, where the Children's Home is located, there are 3,681 children in foster care, but only 214 homes for these children. National statistics indicate that children in foster care are nine time more likely to commit a crime, 25 time likely to get pregnant as a teenager and there is a 30% chance they will continue the cycle of abuse against their own children.

The Children's Home provides hope and healing for vulnerable children and families as an act of love for God and our neighbors. We use our guiding principles of faith, acceptance, care, and excellence in all we do at the Children's Home.

III. OUR BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND GOVERNANCE

Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home is a non-profit and tax exempt under IRS Code section 501(c)(3). Our board currently has 15 trustees (up to 18 total) and they meet twice per year in February and September. Ten of those seats must be filled by members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church or the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of America.

Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home depends on denominational support, OUO, donations, grants, planned-giving, investments, fee for service revenue, and endowments to operate. Relationships with our donors are essential to growing and expanding our relationships to others who wish to be involved with our mission. We need your support. We need monetary donations, gifts in kind, and benefit from annual and legacy giving. Our goal is to provide the best care and the best environment for our children and families. The following is the breakdown in revenue received in these key categories. Based on our annual audit, in 2017 the Children's Home received the following in donations and revenue for our home.

- 25% in individual contributions and grants
- 23% in Texas Department of Family & Protective Services reimbursement revenue
- 2% in other program fees
- 2% in denomination support
- 3% in income on long term investments
- 13% on unrealized gains on investments
- 1% on oil and gas royalties
- 16% on rental revenue

In 2019, the Children's Home is working hard to decrease costs and ensure we are being good stewards of the donations and support we have received throughout our history. Continued giving allows us to fulfill our mission and build our endowments. The Children's Home legacy continues to flourish. Cumberland spends approximately 83% of all revenue on our children and families. The small reminder is spent on administrative and fundraising costs.

VI. OUR PROGRAMS

A. CHILDREN'S RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

The Children's Home has two cottages dedicated to long term residential care and one emergency shelter cottage that provide housing and services for children in foster care who have been removed from their homes as a result of abuse or neglect.

Cole Cottage: A long term care cottage that serves 8 children, boys and girls, ages 11-17 with a basic or moderate level of care. In addition to residential housing, we provide case management, weekly counseling with on-site therapists, life skills training, mentoring, culturally competent activities, spiritual development, access to individualized therapeutic activities and access to medical, dental and behavioral health. The average length of stay in Cole Cottage is approximately one year.

Heard Cottage: A long term care cottage that serves 10 girls ages 11-17 with a specialized level of care. Children who need specialized level of care have severe problems in one or more areas of functioning, including: unpredictable, non-violent, anti-social acts, physical aggression, withdrawal and isolation, self-injurious actions, primary diagnosis of substance abuse or dependency, developmental delays or intellectual disabilities, medical or habilitative needs that require assistance. Beyond long term residential care, the Children's Home treatment team and chaplain provide case management, weekly individual and group counseling with on-site therapist, life skills training, mentoring, culturally competent activities, spiritual development, access to individualized therapeutic activities and access to medical and dental care. The average length of stay for the Specialized Cottage is anticipated to be six months.

Currie Long Cottage: A emergency shelter for foster care youth ages 5-17. We serve 8 children with an average length of stay of approximately 90 days. The Children's Home treatment team and chaplain provide case management, weekly counseling with on-site therapists, life skills training, culturally competent activities, spiritual development, and access to medical and dental care.

B. FAMILY RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

This program serves single parent families in crisis by providing transitional housing, case management, family counseling, financial coaching through United Way and education assistance through a local community college. Our program helps them work toward self-sufficiency and independence. We have four duplexes on campus that serve eight families and up to 36 children between them. Eligibility for the Family Residential Program requires participants be at or below 80% of the HUD income limits for their family size, have full custody of at least one child, be employed or in school full time, have a reliable

transportation, must pass a criminal background check and drug test and must be willing to fully participate in weekly case management, counseling and parenting classes. The average length of stay for single parent families is one year.

VII. OUR SUCCESSES

In 2018, we served approximately 68 children in our Children's Residential Program and 12 single parent families in our Family Residential Program. We provided 472 counseling sessions to children in our residential program and 274 counseling session to families in our program. We also have a growing volunteer base filled with individuals from churches, business organizations, educational institutes, and our community who wish to become involved in our ministry.

It's important to understand both our quantitative impact and the number of children and families we serve, but also the qualitative impact. We would like to share a recent success story from both our Children's Residential Program and our Family Residential Program.

Children's Residential Program Success: Isabella (her name has been changed) came to Cumberland in our emergency shelter at the age of 14 and worked her way into our long term care program. Prior to coming to Denton, all of her siblings had been adopted, but Isabella had spent 4,272 days in foster care, been in 20 different placements and attended 12 different schools. While here she was further devastated by two failed adoptions. But being with us for an extended period of time helped Isabella learn better ways to deal with her feelings, she began to trust others and was able to positively interact with others. While living at the Children's Home, one of her teachers at Denton High School decided to foster Isabella. Her teacher and new foster mother sent us an update last month. She said: "I saw in the classroom that she had a heart of gold and learned that she wanted nothing more than to share her heart with a family. We're proud to announce that we finalized her adoption yesterday!!! Isabella thought we were at the courthouse for family pictures. When we announced to her that this was actually her adoption day...I wish you could have seen her reaction! She couldn't believe it at first and then proceeded to double over and cry many tears of joy! Thank you for your support along the way!"

Family Residential Program Success: Maritza (her name has been changed) lived at the Children's Home for about a year. She recently told us, "My daughters and I experienced emotional abuse and physical trauma before moving to Cumberland's Family Residential Program. My husband leaving us and losing my home was devastating for me, but even more so for my daughters. After that, my daughter was also diagnosed with Leukemia. Cumberland helped us by providing low-cost housing and case management to help sort through all the difficult circumstances. We were also able to see a counselor to help us work through some emotional issues. The Journey's class helped me learn to be a better parent and helped me learn to manage my finances and really just helped me to be a better person in general. It has really been a blessing to be here at Cumberland. The support and love that we have received has helped me begin to trust in God again. Knowing there is a place like Cumberland to help my family is what I needed to show my daughters that there is a God. Thank you for your support."

VIII. OUR STAFF

Our staff is passionate about the work they do. We work each day to carry out the mission that God has called us to do. We invite everyone to come and visit. Come and join us in our work so that we can make a difference in the lives of others together. We want to continue to share the news about the amazing work we do at Cumberland Presbyterian Children's Home. We are thankful for our staff, our board, our donors, our supporters, and our friends. Please keep the Children's Home close in your prayers.

THE REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON AMENDMENTS

The Joint Committee on Amendments met March 7. 2019, in Huntsville, Alabama. Representing the CPCA were Willie Cowan and Vanessa Midgett. Representing the CPC were Geoff Knight and Jan Overton. Also present were Craig White (Stated Clerk, CPCA), Mike Sharpe (Stated clerk, CPC), Jaime Jordan (legal counsel, CPC), and Andy McClung (secretary).

I. REFERRALS

The committee reviewed the proposed constitutional amendments referred to us by the 188th General Assembly, slightly adjusted the wording of the proposed amendment to 7.06 to make it more compatible with CPCA structure, and approved these proposed amendments as ready to be placed before the 189th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION 1: That the Preamble to the Constitution be amended by inserting the following paragraph between the first and second existing paragraphs: "Cumberland Presbyterian congregations are found around the world. While the mission of the church is the same everywhere, the forms and structures of the Constitution and Rules of Discipline do not always fit seamlessly with the cultures, traditions, and legal systems of some countries. In countries other than the United States the provisions of the Constitution and Rules of Discipline should be applied so far as possible, but the Constitution and Rules of Discipline are, at heart, documents which exist to promote spiritual objectives. If there are instances in which the letter of the Constitution and/or Rules of Discipline cannot be applied without compromising the mission of the church and the spiritual objectives identified in the Confession of Faith, it is the spirit of the law, rather than the letter, which must prevail."

That Constitution 3.03 be amended to read: "The authority of each level of church government is limited by the stated provisions of the Constitution. Although each judicatory exercises exclusive original jurisdiction over all the matters specifically belonging to it, the lower judicatories are subject to the review and appellate authority of the next higher judicatory."

That Constitution 3.35 be amended to read: "A particular church shall not sell, convey, lease, pledge, mortgage, or encumber its real property used for purposes of worship, nurture, or ministry without the written permission of the presbytery in which the particular church is located, transmitted through the session of the particular church. In granting its permission, the presbytery does not become a party to the church's agreement, nor a guarantor of any indebtedness."

That Constitution 7.06, which refers to the relationships of pastor, assistant/ associate pastor, stated supply, and interim pastor, be amended to read "A person shall enter into one of these relationships with a particular church only with the approval of the presbytery in the bounds of which the particular church is located. The church session shall bear responsibility for the selection of the person, and the presbytery's approval shall relate to the person's ministerial credentials, commitment to the theology and government of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church/Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, and standing in his or her current presbytery, if any. The presbytery may authorize its board of missions or equivalent body to act on its behalf in examining the call and to give tentative approval to a relationship between a particular church and a minister, licentiate, or candidate, subject to formal approval at a meeting of the presbytery."

That Constitution 8.5(f) be amended to read "In general, to order with respect to the presbyteries, sessions, and churches under its care according to the government of the church, whatever pertains to their spiritual welfare and the edification of the church."

That Constitution 9.4 (d) be amended to read "Institute and review the work of denominational entities."

That Constitution 9.4(g) be amended to read "Take care that the lower judicatories observe the government of the church and exercise its review and appellate authority to redress what they may have done contrary to order."

That Constitution 9.4(m) be amended to read "Keep watch over the affairs of the whole church."

II. UNIFICATION

The committee reviewed potential constitutional amendments to Constitution 9.2, 10.5,11.1, 11.2, 11.3, 3.32a & b which will be necessary if unification of the CPC and CPCA occurs, noting that the two Assemblies will need to specify when the changes take effect.

THE REPORT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY EVALUATION COMMITTEE

Relative to Memphis Theological Seminary and the Historical Foundation

To the 189th Meeting of General Assembly on June 9-14, 2019 in Huntsville, Alabama.

I. MEMPHIS THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

A. GENERAL ASSEMBLY DIRECTIVE

1. The 188th General Assembly charged the Evaluation Committee with the responsibility of assessment of the Memphis Theological Seminary with respect to:

- Make-up of the Board of Trustees of the Memphis Theological Seminary;
- Short and long term goals of the Board of Trustees;
- Board's fiduciary responsibilities and the governance of the Seminary;
- Financial solvency and stability of the Seminary;
- Recruitment and hiring procedures of the faculty and staff of the Seminary;
- Recommendations to the General Assembly related to the Board of Trustees;

• Curriculum and theology taught at the Memphis Theological Seminary as it relates to the practices and beliefs of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church as set forth in the Confession of Faith;

• Make-up (theological/diversity) of the faculty (full-time and adjunct) and staff of the Seminary;

• Practical preparation and skill set training provided by the Seminary to equip and prepare seminary students to become and succeed as ministers of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church;

• Statistical review of the placement of recent graduates of the Seminary in churches within the Cumberland Presbyterian Church;

- Relationship between the Seminary and the Presbyteries of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church;
- Recommendations to the General Assembly for improvement of the faculty, staff, curriculum and programs provided by the Seminary based upon the above assessment.
- Other relevant area of inquiry as determined by the Evaluation Committee.

2. The Evaluation Committee met with the interim President, Dr. Susan Parker, and a member of the committee attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Memphis Theological Seminary. This preliminary report addresses the following items referred by General Assembly.

B. THE MISSION OF MEMPHIS THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

1. Clarification of the purpose of MTS.

a. Is it primarily an ecumenical mission of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church with a secondary purpose of educating Cumberland Presbyterians for ministry?

b. Is the primary purpose to educate Cumberland Presbyterians for ministry in an ecumenical setting?

c. Does it serve a dual purpose of being the primary means of educating Cumberland Presbyterians for ministry as part of an ecumenical mission of the denomination?

2. Do we affirm a need for an ecumenical graduate school?

(see Appendix 1 for the Amended and Restated Charter of MTS, the Mission Statement, Vision Statement, and Values Statement)

RECOMMENDATION 1: That we affirm our need for an ecumenical seminary.

C. PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH

1. It is critical that the next president of MTS have experience in and enthusiasm for fundraising and strategic planning (see Appendix section I.A. for Presidential Search information and the concerns of ATS and SACS/COC).

2. While we acknowledge the need to hire the most qualified person for the position of president, regardless of denominational affiliation, we stress the importance of having a strong Cumberland Presbyterian presence in the administration and on the faculty.

RECOMMENDATION 2: That General Assembly encourage Memphis Theological Seminary to strengthen the Cumberland Presbyterian presence in leadership and teaching at the seminary.

D. THE INTERIM PRESIDENT

1. Dr. Susan Parker has been Interim President since August 2018. She is an ordained Cumberland Presbyterian minister and former board member of MTS. She received her Ph.D. in higher education administration from the University of Alabama.

2. She is doing an excellent job leading MTS during this interim period, but she stressed her desire for it to be a temporary position.

RECOMMENDATION 3: That we express our appreciation to Dr. Parker for her leadership at Memphis Theological Seminary during this critical interim period (see Appendix section III for additional information on Dr. Parker).

E. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. The size of the Board inhibits communication and participation (see Appendix section IV for Board of Trustees information).

RECOMMENDATION 4: That the Board of Trustees of Memphis Theological Seminary reduce the number of trustees from 24 to 14 by 2024 and that after any given trustee election the majority of members must be Cumberland Presbyterian.

Notes: 1) This would require a change in the charter of the seminary that has to be done by the Memphis Theological Seminary Board of Trustees. It would also require a change in the General Assembly Bylaws.

2) A suggested formal to decrease membership would be to reduce each elected class size by two beginning in 2020 and each subsequent class through 2024.

2. We need to identify and recruit individuals with expertise in fundraising and finances for the Board of Trustees.

RECOMMENDATION 5: That the Board of Trustees and Memphis Theological Seminary leadership actively identify and recruit individuals with the skill set in fundraising and fiscal responsibility to serve on the Board of Trustees so that the denominational Nominating Committee can recommend candidates from pool of individuals with those skills to serve on the MTS Board.

3. We need to ensure proper leadership training including the development of a Strategic Plan and the ability to execute said plan. A review and analysis of the MTS Accreditation Report by an outside Accreditation Compliance Officer and examiner for SACS recommends hiring a SACS Consultant to help guide MTS with the remediation of the issues presented in the Accreditation Reports.

RECOMMENDATION 6: That the Board of Trustees and Memphis Theological Seminary leadership seek to employ a SACS consultant to help develop a strategic plan and move towards compliance in other areas mentioned in the SACS report to MTS.

F. ACADEMIC ASSESSMENT

1. ATS and SACS/COC: There was no concern and no recommendations regarding the academic program from the accrediting agencies. The faculty and the academic content of the institution were considered to be strengths of MTS. They made the following comments:

a. "The evaluation committee commends MTS for its student body that is richly diverse in race, ethnicity, gender, and ecclesial families... The school's commitment to racial, ethnic, gender, and denominational diversity is one of its unique strengths."

b. "The faculty has a diverse makeup in terms of gender, race, and denominational affiliation. This diversity is mirrored in the school's administration as well. The school's diversity lends itself to a rich tapestry of life experiences, viewpoints and cultural practices, which is beneficial to the students' development."

2. Curriculum and Theology: The research shows that the curriculum and theology taught at MTS relates well to the practices and beliefs of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

3. Practical Preparation and Placement: Over the past three years MTS has had a student placement rate of 83.5%. The national average is 77%.

4. Placement of Cumberland Presbyterian Graduates: 60% are serving as pastors, 30% state that they do not have a call, and 10% are serving in other denominationally related positions, such as chaplains.

G. FINANCIAL ASSESSMENT

1. The financial position of Memphis Theological Seminary must be strengthened.

a. The Seminary has had significant operational deficits for the last three years:

2015-16 (\$431,318) 2016-17 (\$1,232,317) 2017-18 (\$510,122)

b. The Seminary has taken major steps to bring expenses down while bolstering revenue. The budget projections for fiscal years 2019-2021 reflect a zero-dollar loss for each respective year. This projected move to greater financial stability hinges on increased enrollment (tuition) and contributions, as well as more intentional day-to-day fiscal management.

2. However, the Seminary has a one-million-dollar line of credit with First Tennessee Bank and has utilized \$700,000. Furthermore, as of December 31, 2018 the Seminary has over \$2.5 million-dollar outstanding note payable due to the People's Bank of Mississippi in 2025. Property (Hillard-Cumberland, Founder's-Brown Shannon) has been mortgaged to guarantee the note payable. Monthly interest payments are being met. These obligations are considerable in the light that the Seminary has no Development Department.

3. In the last three years from fifteen percent to thirty-two percent of operating revenue came from a single individual which leaves the Seminary vulnerable if this individual decides not to continue or becomes incapable of continuing the donations.

H. ASSESSMENT OF THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE SEMINARY AND THE PRESBYTERIES

1. A survey was circulated to assess the relationship between MTS and our Presbyteries (see Appendix 2). Only six (6) presbyteries responded.

2. Of those responding, 66.6% believe that it is necessary to have a denominational seminary, 83.3% preferred the Program of Alternate Studies (PAS) to MTS, and PAS had a slightly higher satisfaction rating than MTS.

3. The low number of presbyteries that responded to the survey limits our ability to adequately assess the relationship between MTS and our presbyteries. We feel that the survey should be circulated again in an attempt to give us a better assessment.

4. Since 83.3% of those responding indicated that they preferred PAS to MTS, should the PAS program be evaluated? It is a certificate program and not a degree program. Is it adequately preparing people for ministry?

RECOMMENDATION 7: That the Evaluation Committee continue to:

• Assess the relationship between Memphis Theological Seminary and the Presbyteries of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

• Monitor the financial solvency and stability of Memphis Theological Seminary in light of the concerns of both accrediting agencies. MTS has until April 2, 2020 to show that their financial resources are adequate for long-term stability.

• Assess the short and long-term goals of Memphis Theological Seminary. MTS has until November 1, 2019 to develop a coherent and comprehensive institutional strategic plan.

• Montior progress made by MTS towards compliance with findings addressed in the ATS and SACs Report.

II. HISTORICAL FOUNDATION

A. GENERAL ASSEMBLY DIRECTIVE

122

1. The 188th General Assembly charged the Evaluation Committee with the responsibility of assessment of the Historical Foundation with respect to:

- The stated mission of the Historical Foundation
- Progress towards continuance of their stated mission
- Procedures, tool and equipment used and/or needed by the Historical Foundation to continue their stated mission
- Recommendations to the General Assembly related to the Historical Foundation
- Other relevant area of inquiry as determined by the Evaluation Committee.

2. The Evaluation Committee met with the director, Susan Gore, and a member of the committee attended a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Historical Foundation. This report addresses the issues referred by General Assembly.

B. MISSION OF THE HISTORICAL FOUNDATION

1. The Charter states "the corporation was formed to collect and preserve the materials of, and to promote the knowledge of the history of, the churches, institutions, and people of the Cumberland Presbyterian denominations; and to establish and maintain a library, archives, and museum for the acquisition and care of such material and records."

2. Great effort is exhibited in collecting materials related to the history of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. This effort accounts for the majority of the director's time. There is a professional archivist who works part time. This archivist aids those who are doing research at the Archives as well as responding to request for information. The Director and part time archivist work to digitize as much materials as time allows. Preservation of materials is a critical issue, as the facility is not designed as such. Water infiltration continues to be an issue. Most materials are stored in boxes not designed for archival preservation.

3. The promotion of the history of the church increasingly relies on electronic/internet means. The Historical Foundation has more data online than any other denominational entity, and has more "hits" than all other denominational sites combined.

4. Materials for and promotion of Denominational Day remain the primary means of print promotion. The Historical Foundation provides events regularly at the Birthplace Shrine within Montgomery Bell State Park. Many of these events regularly attract members of the general public as well as Cumberland Presbyterians. Displays at the General Assemblies of the CP and CPCA also provide information relative to the work and purpose of the foundation.

5. The Historical Foundation's ability to "establish and maintain a library, archives, and museum for the acquisition and care of materials and records" is a distinct challenge. Limited personnel, space, and materials challenge the ability to meet this function of the charter. If "acquisition and care of materials and records" are critical to the denomination, then General Assembly in conjunction with the Board of Trustees of the Historical Foundation must take steps to insure the viability of this aspect of the Charter.

C. PROGRESS TOWARDS CONTINUANCE OF THEIR STATED MISSION

1. Evaluation and observation by the committee revealed how committed the Director is to the mission of the Historical Foundation. However, the purposes as outlined in the charter are more than one person can do. The "acquisition and care of materials and records" can't be done adequately by volunteers. As a result, priority is given to the acquisition of materials.

2. Adequate funding is not available to meet stated purposes of the charter. Endowments have recently reached a level to begin providing funding. Donations to the foundation are limited in amount and individuals.

3. Concerns raised need to be addressed by General Assembly and the Trustees of the Historical Foundation. This need is heightened by the likelihood the director will be retiring in the near future.

D. PROCEDURES, TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT USED TO CONTINUE THEIR STATED MISSION

1. Materials contained in the collection are in varied formats. Computers able to access storage devices such as floppy disk of all sizes, microfiche, and print require possession and maintenance of outdated equipment. Many of these in possession of the Historical Foundation have been donated as cast off from other agencies. Malfunction in any of these devices will inhibit future work in the Archives.

2. The link to the Historical Foundation provided through cumberland.org provides a list of needs of the Archives.

E. FINANCIAL ASSESSMENT

1. For the year ending December 31, 2016 the net assets were \$1,780,508 with a net change of \$29,246. (page 186) from the 187th meeting of the General Assembly.

2. For the year ending December 31, 2017, the net assets were \$1,907,840 with a net change of \$127,332 (page 155) from the 186th meeting of the General Assembly. In 2017, investments gained \$163,485.13.

3. For the year ending December 31, 2018, the net assets total \$1,838,250.66 with a net change (loss) of \$69,585.00. The loss for the year is primarily the result of loss on endowments during the 4th quarter as result of down turn in stock market. In 2018, investments lost \$45,240.68.

4. For the year ending December 31, 2018, the income was \$193,818.07 with 37% coming from Our United Outreach (OUO); 37% from contributions; and the remainder from investments and endowment. Expenses were \$263,503.07 with salary and benefits accounting for roughly 40% of the budget. The financial reversals from investment incomes in 2017 and 2018 highlight the need for more strategic planning in terms of budgeting and development and/or increased funding from OUO.

RECOMMENDATION 7: That General Assembly recommend that the Board of Trustees of the Historical Foundation review and/or revise the charter in light of the issues raised in this evaluation.

RECOMMENDATION 8: That the Board of Trustees of the Historical Foundation develop a long-range strategy to fulfill the requirements outlined in the Charter and include a transition strategy for replacing the Director and part time archivist.

RECOMMENDATION 9: That the Board of Trustees of the Historical Foundation engage in leadership training. (It might be possible to partner with MTS who will be providing this training for its board.)

RECOMMENDATION 10: That the Board of Trustees of the Historical Foundation develop a job description for the director and part time archivist.

RECOMMENDATION 11: That General Assembly revise funding strategies enabling the Historical Foundation to fulfill the requirements of the charter.

I. THE MISSION OF MEMPHIS THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

A. The Amended and Restated Charter of MTS states: "The Corporation is organized exclusively for the following purposes: to maintain and operate a theological seminary or graduate school for the instruction, education, training and preparation of persons called of God to the ministry, mission work, Christian education work or other service in the Church, and especially in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church..." (Section I B, page 1, Recommendation 1)

B. MTS Mission Statement: "To educate and sustain men and women for ordained and lay Christian ministry in the church and the world through shaping and inspiring lives devoted to scholarship, piety and justice." (Section I, page 1)

C. Under Our Values, MTS states: "The identity of Memphis Theological Seminary has been shaped by the tradition of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, its location in Memphis, a partnership with the broader Christian community, a commitment to dialogue with people of other faiths, and participation in the community of higher education." (Section I, page 1)

D. The Vision Statement: "Memphis Theological Seminary pursues its mission so that Christian leaders and the churches they serve can effectively proclaim and embody God's mission of redemption, justice, and peace in service to the new creation in Jesus Christ." (Section I, page 1)

II. PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH

A. "Memphis Theological Seminary is searching for its eighth president. We are seeking a President who has experience in and enthusiasm for fundraising and strategic planning, who is an effective communicator, demonstrates collaborative leadership skills, and values and embodies the MTS mission." (Section II A, page 1)

B. It is critical that the next president have expertise in fundraising and strategic planning. MTS is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada (ATS), and regionally by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS/COC). MTS has until November 1, 2019 to address their concern about comprehensive strategic planning: "regarding the development of a coherent and comprehensive institutional strategic plan that focuses the school's core mission on key priorities linked to specific strategies for how these major challenges will be addressed..." April 2, 2020 is the deadline to address their concern about the financial stability of MTS: "The institution's financial resources are not adequate for long-term institutional viability and there is no credible plan to address this issue in a timely and effective manner." (Section II A, page 1)

C. MTS has sustained losses from operations in unrestricted funds in four of the last five fiscal years. Over this same period, tuition revenue has decreased due to decline in student enrollment. MTS has eliminated 22 positions in the last three years, many of which were part time, and now has 40 employees on the payroll. The seminary also eliminated the vice president of advancement position and all those employed in that area. They were not raising enough money to pay their salaries. (Section II A, page 1)

D. MTS was placed on "warning" by SACS. While "warning" is not what any institution is seeking, it is certainly better than being placed on "probation". The implication of warning is basically, "You are not meeting the standards, but we think you can." The implication of probation is, "You are not meeting the standards and we are not sure you can." (Section II A., page 1)

E. It is critical for MTS to hire the most qualified person for the position of president, regardless of denominational affiliation; however, the seminary needs a strong Cumberland Presbyterian presence in the administration and on the faculty. The Interim President is Cumberland Presbyterian but the Academic Dean is not. We have one faculty member who is Cumberland Presbyterian. (Section II B, page 1, Recommendation 2)

III. THE INTERIM PRESIDENT (Section III A&B, Recommendation 3)

A. Dr. Susan Parker, Ph.D. has been Interim President since August 2018. She is an ordained Cumberland Presbyterian minister and former board member of MTS. She received her doctorate in higher education administration from the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa. She is the first female president in MTS history. She worked in higher education for twenty-five years at Calhoun Community College and Athens State University.

B. Dr. Parker is doing an excellent job leading MTS and cultivating a culture of transparency in the aftermath of layoffs and budget cuts. She has experience in strategic planning and fundraising, which is critical if the seminary is going to survive and thrive. She does not plan on being in this position for more than two years.

IV. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES (Section IV, Page 1, Recommendations 4 & 5)

A. The General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church elects all members of the school's governing board, the board of trustees. The trustees are, in turn, responsible to the General Assembly. According to the bylaws of the General Assembly, there is to be a total of twenty-four trustees, divided in three classes of eight. The term of service is three years. Members may be reelected to two subsequent, back-to-back, three-year terms. At least eleven of the twenty-four positions are to be held by ecumenical partners of MTS. The board of trustees convenes formally three times per year and understands that its role is one of strategic oversight and policy-making rather than attending to the day-to-day operations of the school, which it delegates to the President and administrative team. The board recognizes the difference between governing the school and managing it. The board's primary responsibility is to focus on the school's long-term viability and strategic vision.

B. The size of the board inhibits communication and participation. In an attempt to facilitate engagement and maximize the effectiveness of the Board of Trustees, we are recommending a reduction in the number of board members.

C. The composition of the Board of Trustees is also a concern. MTS received a grant to help with Board development through a program called "Wise Stewards," which includes a consultant. This will be a wise use of time by the Board, but it would also be helpful to identify and recruit individuals with expertise in fundraising and finances.

MEMORIALS

I. MEMORIAL FROM MISSOURI PRESBYTERY REGARDING THE PROGRAM OF ALTERNATE STUDIES

- WHEREAS the Cumberland Presbyterian Denomination was formed out of the Revival of 1800 resulting in the rapid creation of many churches on the frontier of western territories;
- WEREAS the newly created denomination leadership felt the urgent need to provide ministerial leadership required exceptions be made to educational requirements for ordination;
- WHEREAS through the history of the denomination, there have been various routes of alternative education leading to ordination that did not require a traditional seminary educational degree;
- WHEREAS those alternative education paths have produced ministers that were effective in spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ and serving the needs of the Church;
- WHEREAS many called to the ordained ministry have been, and will continue to be bi-vocational pastors needing to maintain full-time employment outside the pulpit;
- WHEREAS current educational theories have identified that adult learners respond to a variety of learning styles;
- WHEREAS the current Program of Alternate Studies (PAS) is a certificate, non-degree awarding program requiring 35 courses;
- WHEREAS the program length has made it difficult for some who attend PAS in response to their call to ministry to maintain their current employment;
- WHEREAS many students in PAS are currently ministering to churches; and
- WHEREAS it is the goal of PAS to provide an alternative educational pathway to ministry for the preparation of ministers in the Cumberland tradition,
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that alternative methods of education and assessment of learning should continue and be reviewed so that those called to ministry can be prepared in an alternative to seminary attendance;
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that instructors should use a variety of teaching and evaluation of learning methods that are compatible with alternative types of preparation for ministry;
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that PAS should explore granting credit for relevant pastoral experiences as they do for educational experience, including but not limited to creative expression and application of ministerial principles, alternate measures of assessment, independent study, and assessment of applied ministry activities on-site or through distance learning; and
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that it is encouraged that the directors of PAS evaluate the number of courses, consider combining courses and streamlining the curriculum, continue to offer weekend and on-line courses, and create a multi-year schedule of courses to afford ample opportunity for planning a satisfactory completion of the program.

II. MEMORIAL FROM MISSOURI PRESBYTERY REGARDING THE REQUIREMENTS FOR RECOGNITION OF ORDINATION

WHEREAS there are ministers from another ecclesiastical body that desire to have their ordination recognized and become ministers in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church;

WHEREAS the constitution of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (CP) currently states the following: 6.40 Recognition of Ordination

6.41 A minister of another ecclesiastical body who desires to become a minister in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church/Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America shall appear before the committee on the ministry of the presbytery in which he or she wishes to be received. The committee on the ministry shall investigate the following:

a. Whether the minister has proper credentials from his or her ecclesiastical body;

b. Whether the minister has a degree from a college and graduate school of theology;

c. Whether the minister has a knowledge of the history, theology, and government of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church/Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America;

d. Whether the minister seems fit for service as a minister in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church/Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America.

6.42 The committee on the ministry, if satisfied in each of the areas described in Section 6.41 may recommend to presbytery that the minister be received as an ordained minister in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church/Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, upon giving affirmative answer to the questions put to licentiates at their ordination. Such procedure shall not exclude the opportunity for presbytery to examine the minister.

- WHEREAS currently the Committee on the Ministry (COM) in Missouri Presbytery has been told that they are not to recommend recognition of the ordination until the minister of another ecclesiastical body has taken classes through the Program of Alternate Studies of CP History, CP Polity, Cumberland Presbyterian Theology I and Cumberland Presbyterian Theology II;
- WHEREAS the COM has also been told that the minister must take two (2) of these courses on site at the Program of Alternate Studies (PAS) summer session;
- WHEREAS the ministers already have a degree from a college and graduate school of theology and completing four classes at PAS would take a substantial period of time as well as at current fees cost the individual or the presbytery at least \$1,480 in class fees, \$163 in room and board plus travel expenses;
- WHEREAS some of those wanting their ordination recognized are nearing or at retirement age;
- WHEREAS there are CP churches that want the services of these ministers and want these ministers to provide all the sacraments granted ordained CP ministers;
- WHEREAS there are opportunities other than PAS for a minister to experience CP culture and develop friendships throughout the denomination such as attendance at presbytery meetings, presbyterial retreats and denominational retreats or conferences;
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the presbyterial COM should be allowed to individualize the program needed for each minister of another ecclesiastical body who is seeking to have their ordination recognized. This would be determined after a review of previous education, interview of the person and review of the individual circumstances leading to wanting the ordination recognized;
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that if formal coursework is needed, PAS should develop a course of study (not 4 courses) specifically for the minister seeking this recognition of ordination. This course of study should be offered as independent study, online study, weekend class, or at PAS summer session;
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the presbyterial COM should make the minister, seeking to have their ordination recognized, aware of the various opportunities to experience CP culture and encourage attendance at PAS but that would not be a requirement for the ordination being recognized.

Recalling that the renewal of believers is solely of God's grace, that when we trust in the Lord Jesus, we are recreated, born again, renewed in spirit, and made new persons in Christ who are empowered by the illuminating influence of the Holy Spirit to love and glorify God and to love and serve our neighbor;

Reminding all Cumberland Presbyterians that prayer is inseparable from the Christian life and to be a Christian is to pray and to join others in prayer and that we pray not primarily to receive from God but as an expression of our creaturehood and our dependence upon God as our Creator;

Guided by the primary purposes of prayer being to enter the presence of God, to experience anew God's judgement, grace, and power, to praise God and to invite God into our world and into our lives;

Declaring that the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, being nurtured and sustained by worship, by the proclamation and study of the word, and by the celebration of the sacraments, is commissioned to witness to all persons who have not received Christ as Lord and Savior;

Calls upon the 189th General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church who is meeting concurrently with the 144th General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America and;

Requests that a denominational day of Prayer and Fasting be set and observed by all members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at every level and in every nation to renew and revitalize us to bear witness to God's mighty act of reconciling love accomplished in Jesus Christ by which the sins of the world are forgiven.

IV. MEMORIAL FROM NASHVILLE PRESBYTERY REGARDING SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

- WHEREAS the Confession of Faith, Section 5.18, states that the Sacrament of Baptism "symbolizes the baptism of the Holy Spirit and is the external sign of the covenant which marks membership in the community of faith", and
- WHEREAS the Confession of Faith, Section 5.21, states that "in administering the sacrament the pouring or sprinkling of water on the person by the minister fittingly symbolizes the baptism of the Holy Spirit", and
- WHEREAS the General Assembly in 1968 granted a Memorial which allowed a minister to "perform the sacrament of baptism with the mode best suited to the specific situation" (Digest, page 18, 2.63d "interpretative"), and
- WHEREAS the resulting practice of baptism over the years by Cumberland Presbyterian ministers is now so varied so as to have lost seemingly its connection to baptism as defined in the *Confession of Faith*, and has opened the door for practices not affirmed in the *Confession* such as "infant dedications" and repeating the sacrament (despite Section 5.19 of the Confession) under the guise of "believer's baptism",
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Nashville Presbytery memorializes the General Assembly to refer this Memorial to the General Assembly's Permanent Committee on the Judiciary to report back to the next General Assembly and to provide guidance and direction, particularly to presbyteries, on how to maintain and affirm the Confession of Faith in relation to the Sacrament of Baptism in actual practice.

Communication, of the Preliminary Minutes).

Arkansas Petition to 2019 Joint Meeting of the General Assembly

WHEREAS the Confession of Faith for Cumberland Presbyterian Church and Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America states in Section 6.17:

6.17 Marriage is between a man and a woman for the mutual benefit of each, their children, and society. While marriage is subject to the appropriate civil law, it is primarily a covenant relationship under God. As such, it symbolizes the relationship of Jesus Christ and the church, and is that human relationship in which love and trust are best known.

WHEREAS the Constitution of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterians Church in America states the following in Sections 2.61 and 2.73:

2.61 The office of minister of word and sacrament is unique in the life of the church as to responsibility and usefulness. God calls persons and sets them apart for this ministry. The persons who fill this office should be sound in the faith, exemplary in conduct, and competent to perform the duties of the ministry. Persons who become ministers of the word and sacrament are due such respect as belongs to their office, but are not by virtue of their office more holy or righteous than other Christians. They share in the same vocation that belongs to all Christians to be witnesses to the gospel in word and deed. They differ from other Christians only with regard to the office to which they are called, which is their station in life.

2.73 Persons who fill the office of elder may be male or female, young or old. Elders share in the same vocation that belongs to all Christians to be witnesses to the gospel, but the vocation of this office places an additional responsibility of leadership upon them. They should exemplify the gospel by their good character, sound faith, wisdom, maturity of judgment, discretion, conversation, knowledge of the doctrine and government of the church, and competency to perform the duties of the office.

WHEREAS the Constitution has within in it the means by which the Presbyteries can decide the direction ofdoctrine and polity for the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America. These means are stated clearly in Section 11.0 "Amendments" of the Constitution of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America. Section 11. 1 through 11.4 are as follows:

11.1 Amendments to the Confession of Faith, Catechism, Constitution, Rules of Discipline, Directory for Worship, and Rules of Order may be proposed to the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church or the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America. If received favorably by either General Assembly, all proposed amendments shall be referred to a Joint Committee on Amendments composed of the five members of the Permanent Committee on Judiciary of each General Assembly for preparation for the two assemblies for action.

11.2 When a proposed amendment to the Confession of Faith, Catechism, Constitution, or Rules of Discipline is presented by the Joint Committee on Amendments to the General Assembly of each church, on recommendation of each assembly the amendment may be transmitted to its presbyteries by three-fourths vote of the members thereof voting thereon, provided there is present and voting not less than 75% of the full membership of the assembly based on the complete representation of all its presbyteries.

11.3 An amendment to the Confession of Faith, Catechism, or Rules of Discipline shall have been adopted when, on its transmission by both assemblies to their presbyteries, a three-fourths majority ofthe presbyteries ofeach General Assembly shall have approved it and such approval is declared by each General Assembly to have been given. The vote of a presbytery shall be by simple majority.

11.4 An amendment to the Constitution shall have been adopted:

a. For both churches, when a three-fourths majority of the presbyteries of each General Assembly shall have approved it and such approval is declared by each General Assembly to have been given; each presbytery voting by simply majority, and,

b. For either church when a three-fourths majority of its presbyteries shall have approved it and such approval is declared by its General Assembly to have been given; each presbytery voting by simple majority. In such instances the amendment shall be identified as applicable to the Constitution of the church adopting it, and the original section to which the amendment was applied shall remain a part of the Constitution of the church rejecting it.

c. Presbyteries shall act upon an amendment referred by the General Assembly within the first year of the referral and report their vote no later than the next meeting of the General Assembly after the amendment was transmitted to the presbyteries.

THEREFORE, Arkansas Presbytery petitions the 2019 General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church meeting concurrently with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of America to place the following amendments to the Constitution before Presbyteries of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America as directed by Section 11.1 and 11.2 of the Constitution.

The Amendment to be placed before the Presbyteries of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and Cumberland Presbyterian Church in American is that the following paragraphs be added to the Constitution as 4.2 and 7.02 and the numbering of the sections 4.0 "Sessions" and 7.0 "Relations Between Ministers, Licentiates, or Candidates and Churches" be renumbered to include their insertion.

4.2 When a person is in a sexual relationship that is outside the boundaries of marriage as described in the Confession of Faith 6.17, with no desire to abstain, then such a situation makes that person ineligible to serve as an elder on the session of a church.

7.02 When a person is in a sexual relationship that is outside the boundaries of marriage as described in the Confession of Faith 6.17, with no desire to abstain, then such a situation makes that person ineligible to serve a church in any of the relationships stated in 7.01.

If amended Section 4.0 "Sessions" will appear as follows in the Constitution:

4.0 SESSION

4.1 The session of a particular church consists of the minister in charge and elders elected by the congregation. There must be a minimum of two elders, but the actual number shall be detennined by the congregation in accordance with such rules as it may establish.

4.2 When a person is in a sexual relationship that is outside the boundaries of marriage as described in the Confession of Faith 6.17, with no desire to abstain, then such a situation makes that person ineligible to serve as an elder on the session of a church.

4.3 In a church which has no pastor, or in the absence of the minister in charge or of the moderator appointed by presbytery, the session may meet and transact any business.

4.4 The session may be convened when two or more of its members so request. The minister in charge may convene the session at any time during or immediately following a regular service of worship and at other times by giving proper notice to session members.

4.5 A majority of the session constitutes a quorum unless the congregation has set a quorum otherwise; but any two elders, in conjunction with the minister may receive members and grant letters of dismission.

PRELIMINARY MINUTES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

4.6 The session is charged with pastoral oversight of the particular church and has the responsibility to: a. Call a pastor(also an associate/assistant pastor) subject to the approval of presbytery;

(Form for issuing a call to a pastor or associate/assistant pastor, see Constitution, Appendix 4 .) b. Receive members into the church;

c. Resolve questions of doctrine and discipline in the congregation;

d. Admonish or suspend members found guilty in a disciplinary hearing, subject to appeal to presbytery;

e. Urge upon parents the importance of presenting their children for baptism;

f. Grant letters of dismission, which when given for parents shall always include the names of their baptized children;

g. Ordain and install elders and deacons when elected and require these officers to devote themselves to their responsibilities;

h. Examine the proceedings and supervise the work of the deacons;

i. Establish and give oversight to church schools, Bible classes, fellowship and other organizations within the church, with special attention being given to nurture of the children;

j. Encourage the stewardship of church members, order and supervise collections for Godly purposes, and in general, oversee the finances of the church;

k. Assemble the congregation and provide for worship when there is no minister;

I. Initiate and coordinate the best measures for promoting and extending the work of the church;

m. Elect representatives to the higher church judicatories, and require on their return a report of their diligence and the decisions of the judicatory;

n. Observe and carry out the injunctions of the higher judicatories.

4.7 The session may designate two elders, either of whom, when authorized by the presbytery, may administer the sacrament of the Lord's Supper to the congregation.

4.8 The members of the session, excluding the minister, are the trustees of the church. They shall hold title to the property of the church and shall execute all transactions required by civil law. If it seems desirable the session may elect a smaller number of persons to serve as trustees. In this instance the trustees may act only as specifically authorized by the session. The tenure of office of such trustees may be for an indefinite period or for definite terms on a rotation basis.

4.9 Each session shall keep an accurate record of its proceedings which must be submitted to presbytery, at least annually, for review. Each session shall also keep a record of congregational meetings, of marriages, of baptisms, of additions, and of the death and dismission of church members.

If amended Section 7.0 "Relations Between Ministers, Licentiates, or Candidates and Churches" will appear as follows in the Constitution:

7.00 RELATIONS BETWEEN MINISTERS, LICENTIATES, OR CANDIDATES AND CHURCHES 7.01 A person may be called to a particular church to one offour relationships: pastor, associate/assistant pastor, stated supply, or interim pastor.

7.02 When a person is in a sexual relationship that is outside the boundaries of marriage as described in the Confession of Faith 6.17, with no desire to abstain, then such a situation makes that person ineligible to serve a church in any of the relationships stated in 7.01.

7.03 The office of pastor is to be held only by an ordained minister, whom the particular church has called for an indefinite time and to whom the presbytery has entrusted the spiritual care of the church, including the office of moderator of the session.

7.04 The office of associate/assistant pastor is to be held only by an ordained minister whom the particular church has called for a definite or indefinite time to fulfill various pastoral functions as outlined by the church issuing the call, and approved by the presbytery. In the absence of the pastor, the associate pastor may, with the approval of the pastor and session, serve as moderator of the session or of a congregational meeting.

2019 THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

7.05 The office of stated supply may be held by an ordained minister, a licentiate, or a candidate, whom the particular church has called for an indefinite time, or, in the case of an interim supply, for a definite time, for less than full time work. An ordained minister serving as stated supply may fulfill all duties and functions pertaining to the spiritual care of the church, including moderating the session. A licentiate or a candidate serving as stated supply may fulfill the duties and functions except moderating the session, administering the sacraments, and solemnizing marriages.

7.06 The office of interim pastor is to be held by an ordained minister who is invited by the session of a church without an installed pastor. An interim pastor may preach the word, administer the sacraments, and fulfill pastoral duties for a specified period of time not to exceed twelve months, while the church is seeking a pastor. An interim pastor may not be called to be the next installed pastor or associate/assistant pastor of a church served as interim pastor.

7.07 A person shall enter into one of these relationships with a particular church only with the approval of the presbytery in the bounds of which the particular church is located. The church session shall bear responsibility for the selection of the person, and the presbytery's approval shall relate to the person's ministerial credentials, commitment to the theology and government of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in America, and standing in his or her current presbytery, if any. The presbytery may authorize its board of missions to act on its behalf in examining the call and to give tentative approval to a relationship between a particular church and a minister, licentiate, or candidate, subject to formal approval at a meeting of the presbytery.

7.08 The relationship between a minister, licentiate, or candidate and a particular church may be dissolved only by presbytery, acting on the request of both parties, or on the request of one party if sufficient reasons are presented, or when, in the opinion of the presbytery, the well-being of the particular church demands it.

Note: After 7.08 the numbering went to 7. I 0, thus no renumbering was necessary.
